All computers in the new lab have access to the Internet, so students can check their E-mail and surf the Web whenever they choose.

ham said "I like it because my computer is not very fast on the Internet and the computers in the lab are state of the art."



"Extra, Extra, Greatest Ship Ever, the Titanic sinks, 1500 perish in the cold, dark Atlantic." These words made headlines across the world. The time was April, 1912 when the unsinkable sunk. The <u>Titanic</u> was built in Ireland and was the "largest, grand-

est ship in scale and size" of its time. There were approximately 2,200 passengers aboard the Ti-

tanic when it left South Hampton, England, and only 700 survived its would-be journey to New York. The <u>Titanic</u> exhibit at the Florida International Museum, located in downtown St. Petersburg, captures the true essence of that fateful early morning in April.

from room to room, you're able to see how the passengers lived, if only for a short time, on this grand ship. Every room in the exhibit accurately portrays the accommodations of <u>Titanic</u> itself. For instance, when you walk into

the cafe, everything, from the china to the pots and pans to the actual food that would have been served, is displayed. Afterwards, there's nothing better than walking out onto Titanic's deck and watching the stars as they would have looked on that infamous night so long ago. Also, throughout the exhibit, you can view artifacts such as jewelry, clothing, and other

personal items brought on board the <u>Titanic</u>. Along with these mementos, you can take a step closer to experiencing the loss of

the <u>Titanic</u> through the many photographs and murals depicting the images of passengers fortunate enough to be lowered onto life boats.

If you have not experienced this exhibit, don't worry, there's still time. The

Titanic will remain in port at the Florida International Museum, in St. Petersburg, until May 30. Boarding for this two hour crossing takes place daily between 9 am and 6 pm. Go to Europe in May With a New Inexpensive Basic Studies Course

Dr. Marco Rimanelli, Associate Professor in Political Science and fluent in French and Italiam, will offer an inexpensive May Session course, HUM 200 "Special Topic: Overseas Study," for 3 credit hours through Saint Leo's Weekend College and transferable to Main Campus transcripts. The cost break-down of this 18-day Overseas Tour to Paris, Florence, and Rome is \$1,950 (all-included with tax) + \$372 (\$124 per credit hour for Weekend College course) making it a total cost of \$2,322 all included. The tour price includes round-trip air-fare, 6 train trips, hotels (double occupancy with breakfast and dinner), and International Student ID Cards (gives travel discounts plus health insurance). The dates for the tour are May 6 to May 25. Course registration is mandatory for current Saint Leo students and must be completed before Friday, April 3.

Mandatory requirements for all are 1) avoid disorderly/drunken conduct and 2) attend every day tour (evenings are free).

Baseball Team is Booming!

On March 24, the Saint Leo Baseball team did something they hadn't done in almost two weeks, they lost. The Monarchs split a double header, beating Columbus State 8-2 at home and then losing to Eckard College, 11-10, on the road. Even the win snapped a mini-streak of sorts. The 8-2 victory ended a string of ten straight games in which the Monarchs had put 10 or more runs on the scoreboard.

The team has a record of 25-8 (2-1 in the Sunshine State Conference), and have bashed their way to a number 8 ranking in the country. They are led by the bats of designated hitter Jason Linkes, centerfielder Allen Dina, and right fielder Matt Gifford. Linkes is third in the conference in home runs with 11, twelfth in hits with 41, and sixth in runs batted in with 41. Dina, a senior, leads the conference in batting average, triples, and runs. He has also set a Saint Leo single season record with twelve triples.

Gifford, who is a two-time batting champ in the SSC, is third in the league in hits and first in doubles. Overall, the team is leading the conference in hitting and already has hit 48 homeruns and scored 301 runs. The pitching staff has done their job as well, pitching to a team earned run average of 4.96, and striking out 226 opponents. They have kept

the team in the game long enough for the bats to win it. Seniors Chad Liggins and Travis Jenke have been the most consistent starters and juniors Pat Bowen and Ted Fijalkowski have done their job coming out of the bullpen.

As the team begins its conference play, the deciding factor in the season will be the pitching staff. They will have to start walking fewer batters and giving up fewer home runs. And, the pitchers will have to continue doing what is required of them in order for the Monarchs to have any shot at the post-season.


The Monarchs next travel to Georgia to participate in the Columbus State Invitational Tournament.




