5-0 Men's Basketball Team on a Roll

Final Four, here we come! Okay, so maybe it is a little too early to be thinking about national championships, but that doesn't mean the Men's basketball team doesn't have something to celebrate.

On Tuesday, October 2, the Saint Leo Running Monarchs defeated the American University of Puerto Rico Pirates 102-82 in the Marion Bowman Activity Center. This was the Monarch's fifth win in a row and matched their best start ever.

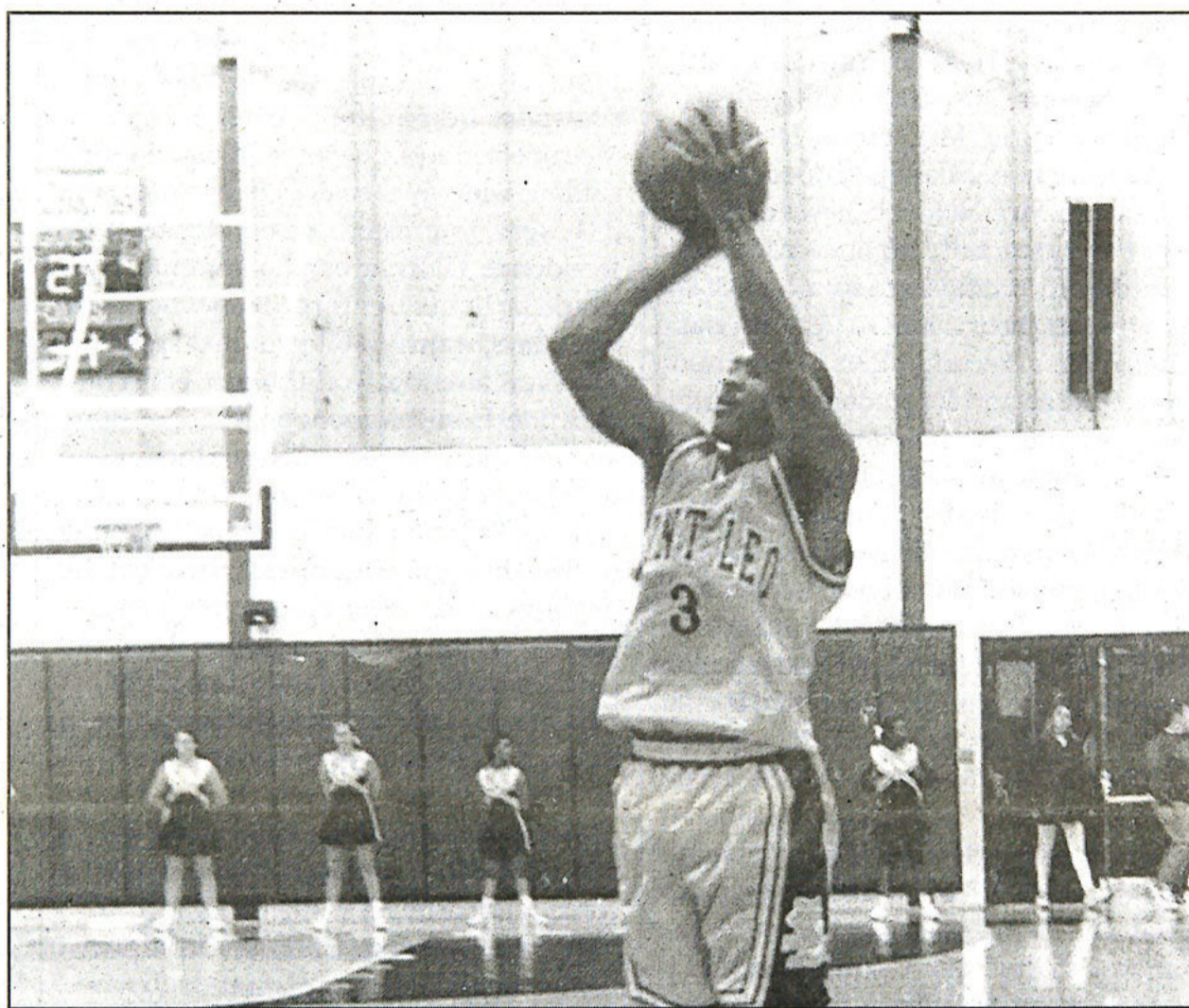
The game had an auspicious beginning as Senior Forward, Joe Philon, missed a slam-dunk on the opening play of the game. For the next fifteen minutes, the two teams played a tight game with neither team having more than a two-point lead.

The game would break open with about five minutes left in the first half. Senior Forward, Shawn Wilson, pinned a shot by the Pirates against the backboard. The Monarchs recovered the ball, and Wilson finished the play with a thunderous slam-dunk. That brought the crowd to its feet and seemed to unnerve the Pirates. They had a series of turnovers, and the Monarchs went into half time with a ten-point lead.

The Monarchs came out strong in the second half and never looked back. Sophomore Guard, Brett Slaughter, hit three three-pointers in a two minute span and ignited the Monarchs on an 11-3 run to begin the half. The Pirates would never get closer than 16 points the rest of the game. There was a scare towards the end of the game. Following a shot, Wilson somersaulted over on his back and came up holding his ankle. He was helped off the court and sat on the bench for the rest of the game. It turned out to be a sprained ankle.

Saint Leo was able to control the ball throughout the game. They also managed to dominate the inside game, not allowing the Pirates rebounds and second chances. The Pirates were forced to shoot almost nothing but three-pointers, and when their two top shooters, Wilfredo Pagan and Eddin Santiago, went cold they were not able to keep up with the Monarchs.

This win continued the Monarchs' much improved play. Gone are the days of uncontrolled passing and costly turnovers. Last year it seemed that every offensive drive would have six or seven looping cross-court passes. The Monarchs now

Like many other students here at Saint Leo, I have to do volunteer work. I work in the Security Office on campus. Normally my duties are answering the phones, filing the tickets written by the officers, and keeping the officer's radio log.

Often I hear the Security Office and its employees being criticized by the students. I find this particularly upsetting because, through my experience working in the Security Department, I have seen first hand all the services Security provides for the students.

Head of Security, Mrs. Jerome Helton, has a twenty-four hour a day-open door policy to any student. Mrs. Helton believes in the privacy of every student. Whenever someone enters the office and asks to speak to her, she immediately escorts him to her office and shuts her door. Security offers free transportation to the airport for students with airline flights. Security also escorts students around campus at night for their safety. In the Security Office there is a list of most of the local banks, pizza parlors, and gas stations. Security will also "unlist" your phone number from public access. Due in part to Saint Leo's Security Department, Saint Leo College is rated the safest in the nation. The office is open twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year. Whenever any student comes in with a parking ticket, Mrs. Helton listens to the situation and makes a fair judgment on whether or not to make it stick. There is an officer on patrol all day and night. Security has very close contact with the Pasco County Sheriffs Office. The Security Office is here to protect and help all the students. So, instead of criticizing our Security Department, let's begin to realize how valuable a resource they are.

Saint Leo Mourns the Loss of Brother Paul

Brother Paul Clarence Tennis, a monk of the order of Saint Benedict at Saint Leo Abbey, and a great artist, died of cancer, November 15, 1997. He was 72. Preceded by a 10:30 a.m. liturgy at the Abbey church, Brother Paul was laid to rest at the Saint Leo Abbey Cemetery, November 20, 1997.

He passed on, but his great works of art will live on always. He touched and inspired many lives through his creative and prolific art which he expressed in different ways. He did very beautiful woodcarvings and made bird houses, too. He made magnificent stained-glass windows which are seen in many local churches including the Saint Leo Abbey Church, Saint Francis Hall at Saint Leo College, and Helen Ellis Memorial Hospital's Chapel in Tarpon Springs. He also had a great experience with watercolors of which marvelous works are cherished by many in different places, including Saint Leo College and Pasco-Hernando Community College.

Brother Paul will be missed by his family, friends, and community. He was a man with a sense of humor, and his departure left a void. Mr. Joe Geiger, a retired Saint Leo College Art professor, commented on Brother Paul's unselfish way of life. He said that Brother Paul's works kept getting better as he grew older. Mr. Jim Hughson, currently a Photography professor at Saint Leo College, recalled the friendly conversations he shared with Brother Paul, which sometimes led to philosophical and spiritual dimensions. Brother Paul once said to Mr. Hughson that life wasn't as difficult as one might think if one turned everything around in a friendly manner. Commenting on Brother Paul's unconditional love, Brother Anthony, a monk at Saint Leo Abbey, said, "He smiled at us when everything seemed to go wrong and told us we're beautiful."

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An Update of the Affairs in Academics

Academic Affairs, with the guidance of the Vice President, Dr. Astolfi, has been working to "better address the needs and desires of students" in a variety of ways.

First of all, Dr. Mark Edmonds has been named the new director of the Learning Support Services Center. This center will incorporate tutoring programs, academic advising, and services for the learning disabled. It will also involve both the Writing Center and the Math Lab and Study Hall sessions, regularly scheduled and staffed with tutors four nights a week.

S.G.U.'s Academic chair, Sarah Hard, has also been aiding this improvement process through a survey. According to the results, internship opportunities are of top concern with the student population, followed by a Study Abroad Program and the creation a more coherent communications program. Now that this evidence has been collected, Academic Affairs is beginning to address these concerns.

With the help of the Academic committee and Dr. Astolfi's Advisory Board, a focus group is being created to examine the entire registration process. This will include the drop/add process, transfer credits, but also issues nonacademic in nature such as bill payments.

Another small committee of faculty and

one student will be focusing on the current basic studies curriculum. They will explore a number of questions, like what makes a Saint Leo education distinctive? What should the students be learning? Why is that important? And, how is the faculty going to go about doing that? This committee is already meeting and should be ready for discussion in the spring.

Yet another group formed to address the needs of the student is one chaired by Dr. Wilson and includes Dr. Reynolds and Dr. Rimmanelli. They are in the process of developing a proposal for the creation of a new major in International Business. This program may be available as early as next year.

Finally, in addressing the desires of all students, but especially those involved in the Honors Program, the Honors Council has been meeting to address a number of concerns with the Program. Some of these include student recruitment, the possibility of a community service component, and the examination of the current Honors' Mission Statement. The purpose of this Council is to work toward the development of a more cohesive Honors Program.

The purpose of the formation of these various committees is two-fold. First, it is addressing the needs and desires of the students, but it is also the first step in improving Saint Leo College's academic program as a whole.

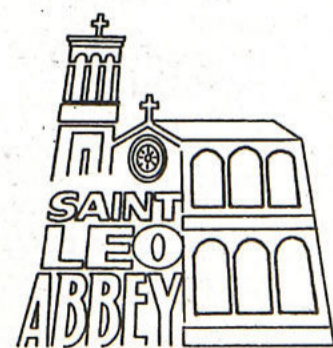

Grand total: \$2,613 (students with three credits), or \$3,126 (student with six credits), or \$2,100 (family/friend) for two weeks all included (food and registration).



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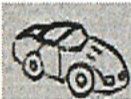
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Intramural Update

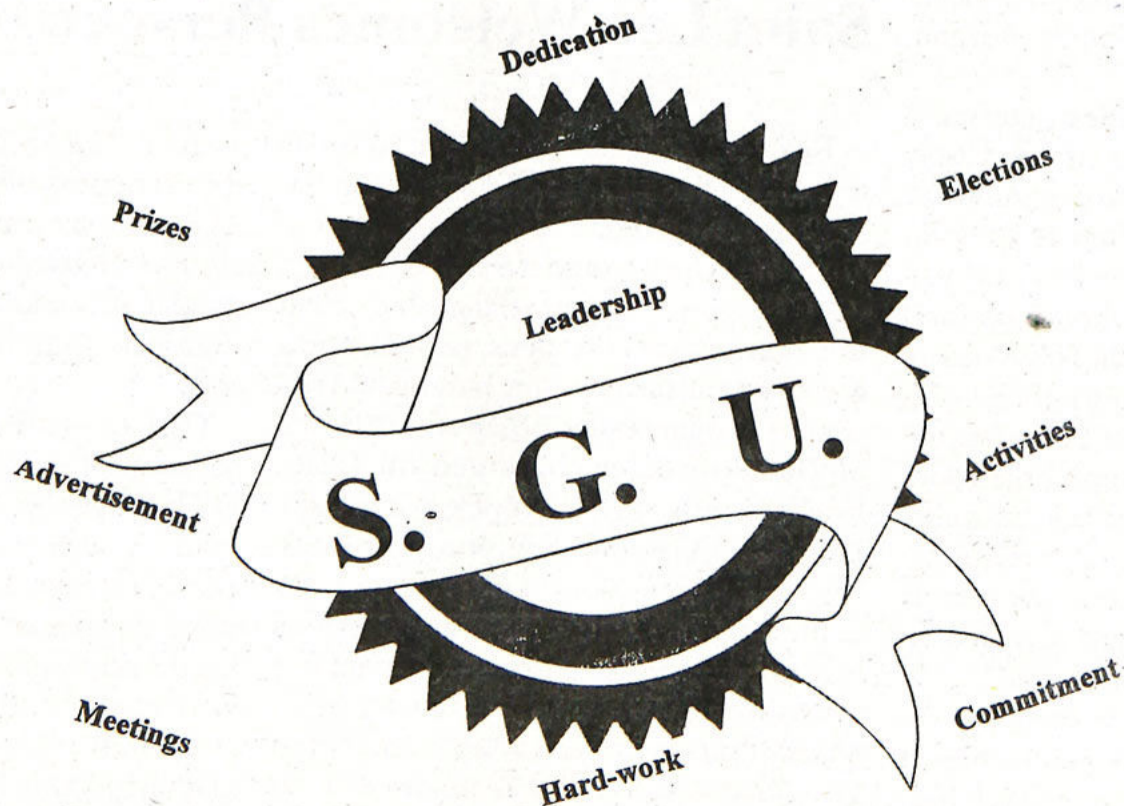

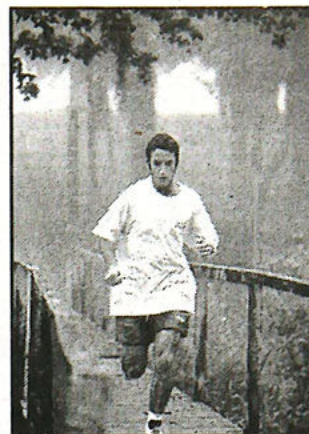

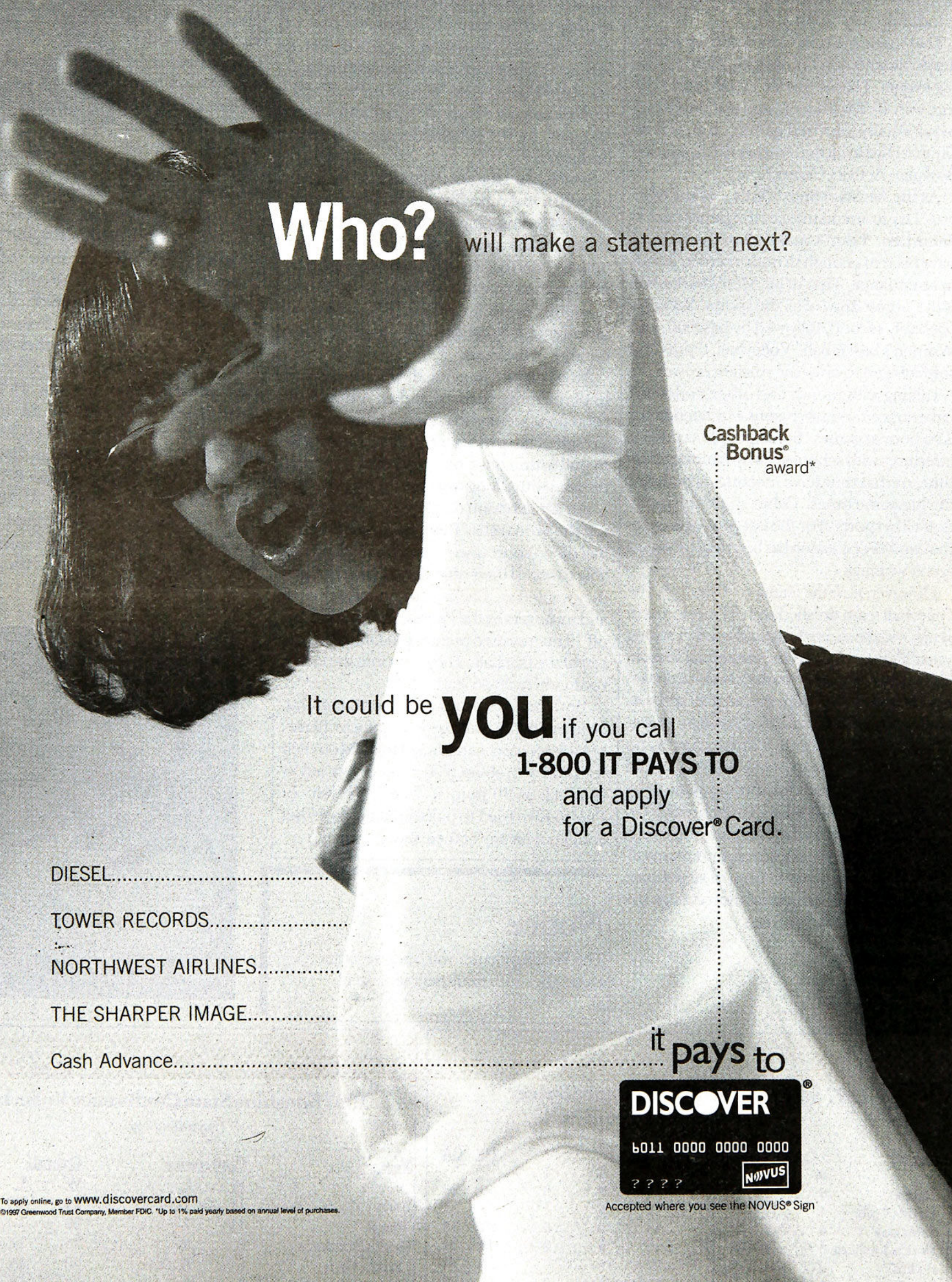
