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EDITORIAL

Where were you when the lights went out?

This is a question that has been asked with surprising frequency both this semester and last. Returning students may remember the recurring outages during the spring semester's exam week. The power has been turned off at the University College campus no less than twice this semester. This is odd because in September, Mr. Ben Donatelli, Vice President and Chief Financial Officer, assured the *Monarch* in a written statement that, "We normally expect the problem during the summer months therefore we do not expect this to occur this semester." In fact, within days after this statement was made, the faculty was notified to expect a power outage. When asked about this discrepancy, Mr. Donatelli merely said, "As I understand the two most recent power outages, they were the result of accidents involving TECO generation or transmission facilities." While I realize that Saint Leo University has no control over such accidents, this does seem to provide further evidence that the university's use of TECO's interruptible power rate (which allows them to cut the university's power whenever they deem necessary) may not be in its best interest. However, the university cannot even drop this undesirable plan because, as Mr. Donatelli said, customers must give TECO five years notice before any such change can be made.

It is ridiculous that a university is this dependent on the whims of an unreliable power company. If TECO cannot be trusted to provide power, then Saint Leo should make other arrangements. Mr. Donatelli told the *Monarch* that independent generators would be constructed during this year, but I have yet to see them. Saint Leo University is charging students a great deal of money; it seems only fair that students should be assured of electricity for lights, computers, air conditioning, heating, and even classes (many of which must be cancelled when the power stops flowing). According to Mr. Donatelli, the school is saving money by allowing TECO to turn off the power periodically. Should the university make money at the students' expense? At the very least, students should be given monetary compensation for those times when they lose the services they are paying for. Why should students pay for services that they are not receiving?

The Saint Leo Honors Program made an impression at the annual meeting of the National Collegiate of Honors Councils. This conference was held in Orlando from October 28th to October 30th. On October 29th, the SLU Honors Program and the DePauw University Honors Program showcased a seminar called "Good Computer". DePauw presented first, showcasing their honors website along with a student testimonial about the honors program and the website. Following them was the SLU Honors Program, and the presenting fell upon Dr. Hudson Reynolds, Director, and student Aurora Vaca. Many differences existed between the De-Pauw and the Saint Leo presentations: the most notable difference was the manner used by the presenters to showcase the web sites. Dr. Reynolds and Aurora Vaca presented the image of a structured honors program that allows its students to express themselves in their own way. The audience appreciated this approach, and this was evident from the questions directed towards the SLU delegates during and after the seminar. Additionally, the conference boasted a wide variety of seminars from which anyone could choose. On the 28th, Honors Program students Cynthia Daly and Shane Metzler attended a seminar called, "Leaders, Leading and Leadership in American Higher Education." On the 29th, honors students Shan Anderson, Aurora Vaca, and Janice Burford attended two seminars entitled "Utopia/

Dystopia" and "Cultivating Cultural Diversity." The students were not the only ones at the conference. Dr. John Wozniak, Dean of Liberal Arts and Sciences, showed his support of the SLU Honors Program by attending the "Good Computers" seminar. Dr. Astrid Vicas attended the computer seminar as well as the seminars "Workshop on Teaching Honors Courses" and

Honors Courses" and "Showcasing Service and Scholarship." Dr. Tyson Anderson made an appearance on the 30^{th,} for a talk given by Carl Safina (keynote speaker of the doors locked, not only the residence halls but also the vehicles. Drive with all doors locked and check around the car before getting into it each time. Students are also encouraged to walk in groups at night. Security does patrol, but it cannot be everywhere at once. If students do feel threatened at any time, they can call campus security. They are encouraged to be the eyes and ears of the security department and report any suspicious or unusual behavior.

The campus also offers a variety of assistance to residents. There is an emergency telephone service, with call boxes placed around campus. With the push of a button, this service places the call directly to security. This action allows security to locate and speak directly with the concerned party. In addition, the campus is patrolled twenty-four hours a day. There is even a security escort offered periodically during the night. Additionally, everyone associated with the school must register his or her vehicle to ensure that unwanted visitors are not allowed in. Last year, more lighting was added to help students feel more at ease in the evenings. Although it seems every detail is being attended to, there are always glitches in the system. Concerns have been



brought up about unmonitored, unescorted, same sex visitation, as well as about locking front doors of the residence halls. Students were given keys to these doors to ensure that only residents were being admitted, but no student has had to use them yet. Freshman Monique Williams stated, "I walked in one night at 3:00 am and the security guard was asleep." Obviously, some issues still exist. Another one of

these problems is the parking situation. As a result of a larger-thanexpected number of student drivers, parking is limited. Overflow lots have opened up, but this is part of what is causing the safety issue. Across the street from the Marmion and Snyder residence halls, one of these lots has been added. Students do not feel safe crossing the street late at night and are concerned with minimal lighting. Dr. Evelyn Vitale, Vice President of Student Affairs, agrees that safety definitely is an issue. She stated that "the overflow lot at Marmion and Snyder is hopefully a short term solution." For the time being, she is meeting with a committee of four students to address this issue. They are trying to install more lighting to make the lot safer.

Dr. Joanne MacEachran is the Director of the Learning Resource Center. This center is a combination of the Math Lab and the Writing Center. Its goal is to assist students with tasks such as tutoring, stress reduction, test taking hints, and note taking techniques. Dr. MacEachran is well prepared for this role, as she has been in learning resource positions for twenty-eight years. She received a doctorate in Reading and Learning Disabilities from Harvard. From there, she went on to become the Learning Specialist for the Athletic Department at the University of Washington. Following this job, MacEachran served in a similar position in New England for twenty-six years.

When she decided it was time for a "new





Saint Leo University's web site has a new look. The new format of the web page was designed so that it would be attractive, contemporary, and easy to access. According to Dr. Ed LaFontaine, there was a coordinating committee designed to oversee the website. This committee decided to enhance the old site and create a newer version.

There is more to this change than an urge to make the SLU web site more attractive to visitors. The Saint Leo University Handbook is now on-line as well. Before she left, Dr. Maureen Powers, Former VP of Student Affairs, made the decision to put Saint Leo's handbook online. The reasons for this are three-fold: first, more and more students are using the computers for everything — from word processing to surfing the net; second, it's cheaper; and third, other campuses can use our web site as a template or model for their own.

There is the question of printability, since the handbook is formatted to be seen through Adobe Acrobat only and is not printable at this time. John Rossiter of Computer Services is working to change the method of availability, as well as accessibility. The web site will soon have a table of contents with hyperlinks to sections of the handbook. 24-Hour Visitation Policy

This year, Saint Leo University has kept a policy of "open visitation" in all of its residence halls, except Marmion and Snyder. An "open visitation" policy means that members of opposite sex can stay in each other's rooms for as long as they want. In Marmion/Snyder, members of the opposite sex must leave the room by 2:00 am on weekdays and 3:00 am on weekends. "They [the students] haven't abused it, and I think that they handled the responsibility well," Director of Residence Life Julie Ciccarone said of the open visitation policy.

The implementation of the open visitation policy is a sign of trust and confidence in the upperclassmen of Saint Leo. "As students get older, they learn to handle more responsibility. I think this is an indication of that," Ciccarone said. "We haven't had any discipline problems as a result," she added.

Open visitation was adopted when students decided to sign a petition requesting it and present the

"Objectively, I have no problem with it," Freshman Sean Marshall said.

MEN'S BASKETBALL (6-1)

Men Win Six Straight...The Saint Leo men's basketball team won twice more last week to extend its winning streak to six games. The Lions defeated Palm Beach Atlantic at home in overtime and got past Nova Southeastern on the road to improve to 6-1.

Saint Leo 75, Nova Southeastern 59...Matt Hogarth scored a gamehigh 26 points and grabbed nine rebounds to lead Saint Leo (6-1) to a 75-59 win over Nova Southeastern Univ. in Ft. Lauderdale on Saturday night. Hogarth, a 6-6 sophomore from Manchester, England, hit 8-of-13 field goals and 9-of-13 free throws as the Lions won their sixth straight. The Lions had a 26-22 advantage at the half but used a 19-4 run early in the second half to pull away. Senior Brett Slaughter added 16 points and junior Gary Downing scored 10 in the win.

Saint Leo 100, Palm Beach Atlantic 97 (OT)... Senior Brett Slaughter had 24 points, nine rebounds and seven assists as Saint Leo (5-1) held off Palm Beach Atlantic

(4-5) for its fifth straight win at home on Wednesday night. Saint Leo led 83-81 with :02 left in regulation but Jim Harwood was fouled shooting a threepointer and hit two of three free throws to send the game into overtime. Matt Hogarth's two free throws with :48 remaining in overtime gave Saint Leo a 98-97 advantage and it held on despite hitting just two-of-six freethrows over the final 35 seconds. Daniel Palmer led Saint Leo with 27 points and James Turner added 18. Six players scored in double figures for Palm Beach Atlantic, led by Shelby Davis with 29.

Five in Double Digits... Through seven games, five players are averaging in double figures for the Lions. Guard Brett Slaughter is averaging 17.7 points and 7.3 rebounds per game in his fourth and final season. Sophomore Matt Hogarth is contributing 15.4 points and a team-leading 8.7 rebounds per game. Juniors Daniel Palmer and Gary Downing are scoring 14.1 and 14.0 points respectively while Jame Turner adds 10.6 points per contest. Palmer Moves Up Assist List... Daniel Palmer has moved up a spot on the school's career assist list. The junior point guard from Newcastle, Australia now ranks third all-time at Saint Leo with 295 assists. The record of 596 is held by Jim Wilson who played from 1983-87. Slaughter Career Point Watch...Brett Slaughter started the 1999-2000 season at No. 13 on the Saint Leo all-time career scoring list Seven games into his senior season, the 6-6 guard has moved into 10th all-time with 1259 career points. He recently passed John Fitzgerald who scored 1238 points from 1974-78. Joe Orchulli (1963-67) is the school's all-time leader with 1974 points. Up Next...The men's basketball team faces Florida Memorial on Monday night (Dec. 6) in Miami. It returns home on Friday night to host Thomas College (GA) at 7:30 p.m.. The Lions follow that up with a home game on Monday, Dec. 13 against West Florida. The squad then takes a few weeks off for Christmas break before returning to action on Jan. 4.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL (3-3)


Lions Even Mark at 3-3... The Saint Leo women's basketball team went 2-1 last week to even its season mark at three wins and three losses. Saint Leo, Florida Tech go 2-0 at SLU Sunshine Classic...The Saint Leo women's basketball team hosted its first SLU Sunshine Classic over the weekend. Florida Tech, Nova Southeastern and Webber joined Saint Leo in the two-day event. Saint Leo and Florida Tech both won two games with Nova and Webber going away with two losses. Saint Leo 73, Nova Southeastern 68... Tasha Ealey finished just shy of a triple-double on Saturday with game-highs of 22 points, 11 rebounds and eight assists for Saint Leo, who overcame a nine-point deficit in the second half to defeat Nova Southeastern 73-68. Trailing 50-41 at the 13-minute mark, Saint Leo used a 10-3 run to tie the game at 53-53 before taking its first lead since early in the first half at 57-55. Leading 64-63 with 2:26 remain-

ing, the Lions went on an 8-0 run to seal

the victory. Angela Newson added 14 points, nine rebounds and four steals while Anthia Casanova and Ebony Winn scored 10 apiece. The Lions avenged a 71-65 loss to the Knights in Ft. Lauderdale on Tuesday. Saint Leo 66, Webber 39...Saint Leo defeated Webber College 66-39 at home on Friday night. Point guard Tasha Ealey scored 20 and had five assists and Samantha Campbell added 11 points in the win. Saint Leo jumped out to a 17-3 lead to start the game and went into the half with a 40-15 advantage. The Lions held Webber to 26 percent

shooting for the game and forced 31 turnovers.

Good Week for Ealey....Guard Tasha Ealey had an outstanding week in leading the Lions to a 2-1 record. The 5-8 guard from Tampa averaged 17.3 points 6.0 rebounds and 6.0 assists over the team's three games. She scored 20 in the win over Webber and had 22 in the Nova victory. Ealey Scoring Leader...Through six games, senior guard Tasha Ealey leads the team in scoring averaging 13.8 points per game. The Tampa native also leads with an average of over five assists per game and is second on the team in rebounding (5.5 rpg). Junior Angela Newson is the squad's top rebounder pulling down seven per game and is averaging seven points per game. Junior Samantha Campbell is second on the team in scoring averaging 11.3 points per game. Up Next... The Lions will play a game on each of the next two Saturday's before taking off for Christmas. They are on the road this Saturday to face Webber College in Babson Park at 3 p.m. The squad returns home on Saturday, December 18 to host Berry College (GA) at 4 p.m.







8 Movie Review: Dogma






As the year progresses,




