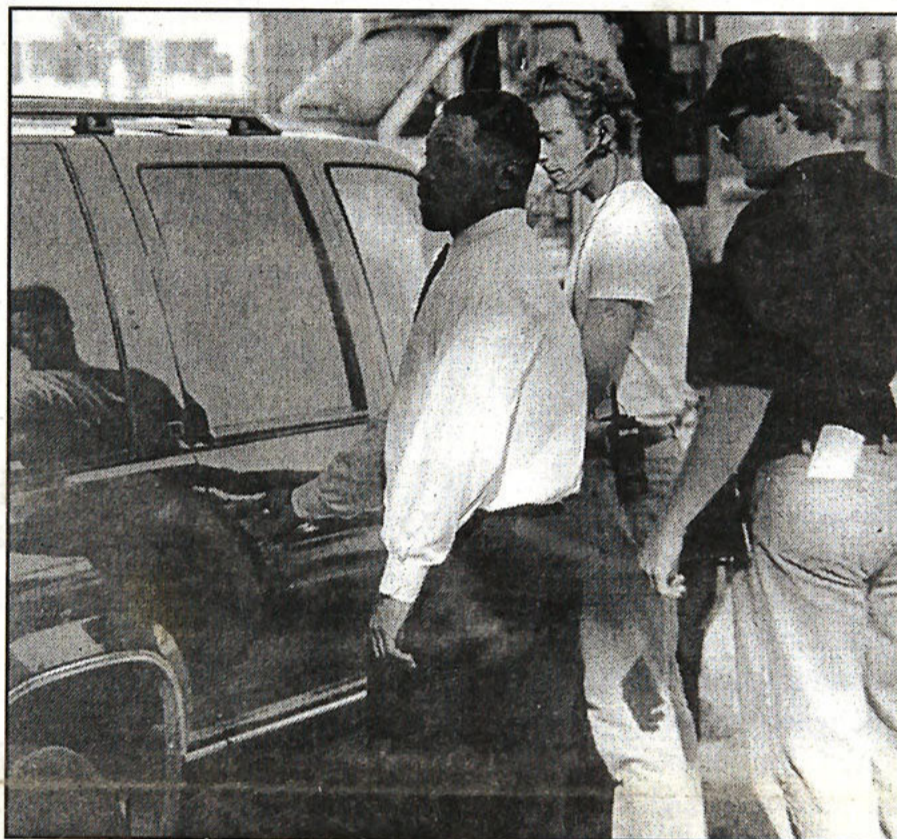

Donald Sutherland was unavailable for an interview. The project's next stop is the Orlando Airport.

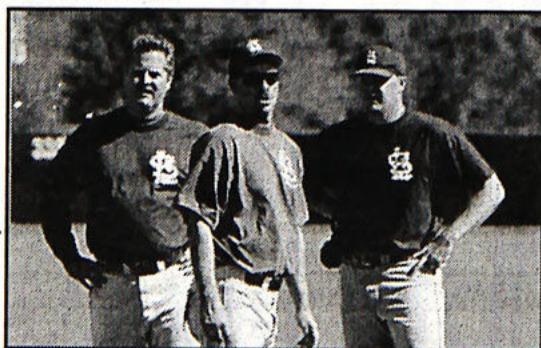
## Baseball Preview

Six seniors return to a line-up that led the Sunshine State Conference (SSC) last year with a .345 team batting average. Led by senior outfielder Matt Gifford this years team looks to finish strong in the division and make it to the play-offs. "We have a shot, and we're not counting ourselves out," new coach Ed Stabile

said of his hopes for the play-offs.

Despite having such an offensively loaded team, coach Stabile, who was an assistant coach at the University of South Florida last year, will have his work cut out for him. In order for Saint Leo to finish at the top of the

SSC, their pitchers will have to step forward and prove themselves. "We're looking for our pitching to keep us in the game and let the power and defense win it for us,"

the first-year coach said in a recent interview. The bats will keep them in games. But the pitching is needed in order to prove themselves the best.

The line-up will be led-off by senior Allen Dina. The centerfielder hit .407 last year. Batting second will be

senior shortstop Luis Rivera. Last year he was named a Third Team All-American and hit .364 with 51 RBIs. Gifford will hit from his customary third slot and play in the outfield. The Second Team All-American looks to defend his SSC batting crown.

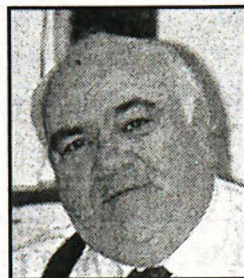

# Even More Changes in Residence Life

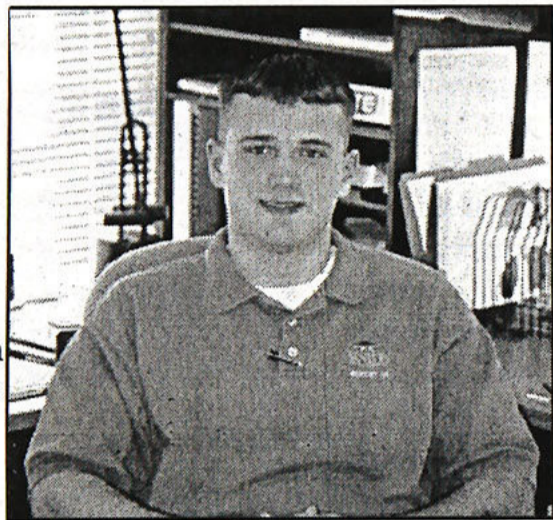

He said that he and Interim Assistant Director, Kari Knowles, have a new vision for Residence Life. In the past, students have viewed Residence Life staff members as unapproachable people who they can only turn to in times of crisis. The new mission of Residence Life, Jason said, is to improve the image of R.A.s (Resident Assistants) and "put students first."

He emphasized that the Residence Life Office is full of approachable people, and students should feel free to ask questions or voice concerns when they first arise. As he put it, "I'd like to hear from people at times when they're not in crisis. I invite students to come by the office and express opinions or give feedback." In keeping with their new vision, Residence Life is changing the application process for R.A.s. Prospective R.A.s are now required to submit a resume and letter of intent with their applications. Jason explained that this alteration is intended to make the process more professional.

In March, members of the Residence Life staff will attend an employer/employee convention called the

*Oshkosh Placement Exchange* in search of a new Hall Director for Henderson. For the first time, students will be involved in the interview process. Also, the Student Handbook will be reviewed and selected policies will be revised. As Jason put it, "We will use what worked and change what didn't work."

In the near future, Residence Life will ask the faculty to complete a personal interest survey. The goal of this project is to find ways in which students and faculty members can interact outside the classroom. He wants them to become dependable resources for students. Jason went on to explain that desk duty in Benoit and Henderson was recently consolidated in an effort to develop a greater sense of community on the East Side of campus. The goal was to provide an opportunity for residents in both halls to interact on a regular basis. Jason said he would like the residents in Benoit and Henderson to think of themselves as living in one building instead of two.

Joining Biggs on the right side of the infield will be Elizabeth Catrette who hit .259 for the Monarchs last season. She had the second highest fielding percentage on the team, .960. Filling the left side of the infield will be the most difficult task.
