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## Dr. Kirk Takes Saint Leo By Storm

n January 2, 1997, Dr. Arthur F. Kirk took office as the new president of Saint Leo College, succeeding Monsignor Frank Mouch, who announced his retirement in June of 1996. Dr. Kirk hopes to bring new vitality to Saint Leo College as it prepares to leap into the twenty-first century.

As one of his first acts of office, Dr. Kirk formed the Task Force on Missions and Goals. Dr. Kirk believes it is very important to know "who we are, who we serve, how they are served, why we serve them and why we serve them that way." This committee will reevaluate our college's goals. The new president believes that certain skills should characterize Saint Leo Students: "the ability to write and speak well and the ability to make [well prepared] presentations." Dr. Kirk also emphasized the importance of constantly improving the school and pointed out that Saint Leo provides value for each tuition dollar.

As president, Dr. Kirk also feels the need to know what's happening on campus. The president will appear at "Coffee and Conversation" from 9 to 11am on February 7 in the Nightly Grind. (the student coffeehouse located in the basement of Saint Francis Hall) Any

ur new director of Residence Life, David Seales, has many plans for the expansion of Saint Leo College Residence Life. David attended high school in Armada, Michigan student who would like to meet the new president is encouraged to attend. Dr. Kirk also expressed an interest in teaching a course and meeting with the Student Senate. The new president makes it clear that he wants to be visible in the eyes of Saint Leo College students.

Although Dr. Kirk "cannot categorically say that any class will be offered next semester," he "thinks languages [Spanish] should be offered...given our close proximity to Latin America." The new president also believes that exposure to the Arts is "needed by the students and very important to the College." "Having the Arts in Basic Studies is very important in selecting electives. This may be the only chance you'll have to take sculpture, pottery, painting, etc."

The President also announced that on February 1, 1997, the Internet Node will be online. "I am as anxious as any student [waiting for the Internet connection because] I have grown dependent on it [the Internet]. The February 1 date does not necessarily include access from the dorm rooms to the Internet, but dial-in capability will be included. Dr. Kirk stated that the initial set-up will handle 1000 accounts and 250 users to simultaneously access the Internet. E-mail accounts will be given to every faculty and staff member, full-time

student, and member of the administration. However, the President does not know how the Technology fee will be handled. The College's top administrator promised to review all student fees for next school year.

Dr. Kirk looks forward to meeting all the students, faculty, staff, and community members. "I think the people here are terrific. They inspire me as far as the potential of the institution."

before going to college at Ferris State University in Big Rapids, Michigan. He graduated there with a degree in Human Resources and Business and went on to do his graduate work in Higher Education Administration at the University of Missouri. He graduated in 1996. He arrived at Saint Leo on January 2, 1997.

Even though his office still needs some work, David already has plans and goals for students living here at Saint Leo. Two main objectives have been set. The first is what David describes as "a re-engineering of the Residence Life Department." He would like to see residents treated more like customers. "Since the students are paying for living here, they should be able to assist in making decisions on the place where they live." David said. "It should feel like a home."

The second objective is for residents to

feel they are empowered. David plans to steer clear of an institutional atmosphere. He is aiming for more student participation in hall programs. This is a difficult task due to the large amount of students that prefer to go off campus in their free time, than participate in campus events. One way David plans to set up a better sense of community is to establish a Residence Hall Government. This type of program has not recently been utilized at Saint Leo, and could be an exciting new way to establish campus community.

"I have truly been impressed by the staff and students here at Saint Leo. It's made a better transition from Kansas City to Saint Leo."



#### Men's Basketball

Against Husson College (9-4) all five Saint Leo starters scored in double figures while holding off a late charge by Husson College. The Monarchs led by eight late in the second half but three three pointers by Tony Tobin brought Husson within two with just :19 left in the game. After a Leo turnover with :03 remaining, Husson failed a three point attempt and the Monarchs won 80-78. Junior Joe Philon set a Monarch record with six blocks, and the team also tied the school record for blocks, with twelve. Freshman Brett Slaughter led the team with 19 points, followed by Shawn Jennett(17), Daryl Brooks (15), Tony Blyth (13), and Austin Ojukwa (10). Austin also picked up 15 rebounds.

The Monarchs went on to drop their next two against Merrimack College (5-4) and Bentley College (7-2). Against Merrimack, Junior Joe Philon set a school record with seven blocked shots and Senior Shawn Jennett scored a game high 21 points. Against Bentley, the Monarchs were unable to overcome a 13-0 run as they fell 85-69, and to 5-6 on the season. Daryl Brooks hit five three pointers and 20 points total.

The Monarchs wrapped up their non-conference schedule with a 77-45 win over Crown College. Senior Joe Philon led the game with 21 points, blocked four shots, and had three steals. Leo's high pressure defense forced 29 Crown turnovers in the game. Brett Slaughter led Saint Leo with 10 boards, while Austin Ojukwu added nine points and nine rebounds in the win.

Through 12 games, Daryl Brooks leads the Monarchs in scoring (13.3 ppg), assists (3.6 apg), steals (2.1), and three point shooting (.459, 17-37). In the Sunshine State Conference he is tenth in scoring, third in steals, third in 3-point shooting percentage, and ninth in assists. Shawn Jennett is second on the team in scoring, averaging 12.1 per game while shooting .789 (45-57) from the free-throw line. He also among the leaders in the conference in these categories. Joe Philon is leading the SSC in blocks (3.2) and is in the top 15 in rebounding and field goal percentage. Freshman Austin Ojukwu is fourth in the SSC in rebounding averaging 7.8 per game and is the tenth in blocks at .93 per game.

Heading into conference play the Monarchs will be without Joe Philon for 4-6 weeks because of a stress fracture in his foot. In their first conference game the Monarchs held off the North Florida Ospreys 55-52 in overtime. Brett Slaughter hit a twenty -two foot jumper and Daryl Brooks also added a three in OT as the Monarchs edged the Ospreys. Austin Ojukwu led the way with 13 points and 12 boards, while Shawn Jennett added 12 points.

Despite 15 points by Freshman Brett Slaughter, Ojukwu's 14, and 13, by both Brooks and Jennett, the Monarchs lost a tough one to the University of Tampa (11-2, 2-0). St. Leo headed into the locker room at the half trailing by one. At the start of the second half the Tampa went on a 16-6 run. With 1:37 remaining, Austin Ojukwu brought the monarchs to within seven of the Spartans. That was not enough though, as the Spartans won 80-68. The Monarchs fell to 7-7, and 1-1 in conference play.

The Monarchs next conference game was against Florida Tech. Despite a 30-25 lead at the end of the first period, the Monarchs still lost the game. Daryl Brooks had 18 points, 13 in the first half. Shawn Jennett scored ten. Austin Ojukwu had six rebounds, while Brett Slaughter had 9 points including three three pointers and 5 boards.

Saint Leo improved it's conference record to 2-2 with a 68-53 win over Eckerd College. After leading by three at the half, the Monarch went on a 10-0 run with 10 ninutes remaining to clinch the game. Daryl Brooks scored 15 second half points, for a season high 23, and added 8 rebounds. Shawn Jennett wracked up a double-double with 12 points and eleven rebounds.

The Monarchs dropped yet another one, this time to Florida Southern, 81-72. The game was not as close as the score would dictate. After an uninspired first half, the Monarchs came back in the second a little more determined. The bridged the gap a little in that second half, by the Moccasins came back with too much. Saint Leo now stands at 2-3 in conference play, 8-9 overall.

### Women's Basketball

Over Christmas break, the Lady
Monarchs participated in the Lynn University
Double Tree Shoot-Out in Boca Raton, Florida.
In the opener of the tournament, St. Leo- faced
the host, Lynn University. The Monarchs were
defeated 81-70. Stephanie McKnight led the
Monarchs with 16 points, shooting 6-of-7 from
the field. Chanita Olds added 15 points and
Telica Phillip scored 13 in the game.

St. Leo faced UNC-Pembroke in the tournament's consolation game. Trailing at the intermission, the Monarchs used a 9-0 run to take

the lead in the second half. Stephanie McKnight hit two free throws with :18 remaining to hold onto a 61-58 victory for the Monarchs. Telica Phillips led St. Leo with 17 points and seven steals, while Dametria Newsome added 15 points. Freshman Telica Phillips was named to the Double Tree Shoot-Out All Tournament Team. She averaged 15 points, five boards, 4.5 steals and two assists in the two games played.

Senior Angel Marshall leads the Sunshine State Conference in blocked shots. She has 19 blocks for a 1.7 average. Telica Phillips leads the team in scoring averaging 12.7 points per game, while Stephanie McKnight is close behind with 11.3 points per game, 59 assists (team leader). Adriene Holmes averages 10 points per game, with 4.2 boards per game, and an average of three steals.


The Lady Monarchs entered their first conference game with a 6-6 record against the University of North Florida. Holding off a late rally by the Ospreys, St. Leo won a close one, 65-61. This is the first time since 1989 that the Monarchs have won their opening SSC game. Stephanie McKnight and Telica Phillips each scored twelve while Angel Marshall added three blocks.

St. Leo's next faced the Spartans from the University of Tampa. Tampa started the second half with a 12-0 run and never looked back winning 106-83. Tampa's full court press forced 30 turnovers en route to victory. Telica Phillip and Stephanic each scored 17 and Angel Marshall added 15.

Despite 26 points (11-16 FG's), 3-for-4 in three point attempts, seven boards, 4 assists and 4 steals by Telica Phillips and ten points by Angel Marshall and Maryland Brown, the Monarchs lost to host Florida Tech 82-69 in Sunshine State Conference action.

Under the leadership of Telica Phillip, the Lady Monarchs knocked off Eckerd College 75-69. Phillip had game highs with 17 points, 9 rebounds and 7 steals. Chanita Olds and Stephanie McKnight added 14 and 11 respectively.

Despite a last second rally, the Lady Monarchs still came up short against short against Florida Southern, losing 68-63. The Monarchs fell to (8-9) and (2-3) on the season. Chanita Olds and Demetria Newsome led the team with 11 points.

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
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

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

#### MAKE VALUABLE PROFESSIONAL CONTACTS


