Horgan Essay Contest



is back. In *The World Is*Not Enough, James Bond
once again saves the

Pierce Brosnan reprises his role as the daring British secret agent in this most recent addition to the James Bond series. Brosnan starred in two previous Bond films, Golden Eye and Tomorrow Never Dies.

The World Is Not Enough begins in typical Bond fashion, with a thrilling boat chase and a dastardly deception, which sets the stage for a series of double-crosses and betrayals throughout the movie. Bond goes on the job, protecting a beautiful oil magnate, Elektra King (Sophie Marceau) from a vengeful assassin. While tracking the assassin to a Soviet weapons storage facility in Kazakstan, Bond meets Dr. Christmas Jones, an American scientist helping to deactivate the facility. The two team-up and face the would-be assassin, Renard (Robert Carlyle). Renard escapes,

however, and manages to steal a nuclear device. During the encounter, Bond discovers that Renard and his supposed target, King, are actually working together to make King's oil company more powerful and to exact revenge on M, Bond's superior, for an earlier offense. Bond and Jones square off against Renard and King in Istanbul, Turkey, where Renard has commandeered a Russian nuclear sub to destroy the city, M, and a rival oil pipeline.

The World Is Not Enough is the last Bond movie to feature Q (Desmond Llewelyn), 007's master of gadgetry and high-tech spy devices. Llewelyn died in a recent car accident. Llewelyn had been planning on retiring, however, so his replacement, played by John Cleese, was introduced in the movie.

praise from Saint Leo
University students. "I
liked it more than Tomorrow Never Dies—definitely more. Pierce Brosnan is a good Bond,"
Freshman Renee Durette

the best; definitely the

Supernova was released on January 14; but if you hurry, you should still be able to find it in theaters. If you like action, science fiction, or psychological drama—this movie is definitely worth checking out. My only complaint was the


Faculty Profile: Dr. Hudson Reynolds

Dr. Hudson Reynolds is the co-Chair of the Social Sciences Department and Director of the Honors Program. He has taught at Saint Leo University for 19 years, during which time he has specialized in constitutional law, political philosophy, and domestic politics. He currently serves on at least a half dozen committees, as well as being a representative to the Faculty Senate. In addition to these official duties, Dr. Reynolds assists the faculty in learning to use technology to

enhance their courses. "Last spring, Terry Reders in their classes, and we'll be offering it again this spring," Reynolds

Dr. Reynolds considers his most important duty to be the Honors Program. He was the original director of the program, which he shaped for eight years. Three years ago, at a time when 35 students were enrolled in the Honors Program, Dr. Reynolds returned to being its director. Today, there are over 80 students enrolled in the Honors Program.





Dr. Reynolds attended undergraduate school at Clairemont College, where he studied Political Science and Literature. He attended graduate school at the New School for Social Research in New York City.

There is far more to Dr. Reynolds than his duties as a professor, however. He enjoys the personal contact he gets with students at Saint Leo the most. His students see this aspect of his personality, and they appreciate it. "Dr. Reynolds is very interested in the welfare of his students. He always has time to help them and even after they've finished his class he still invites them to visit and offers his advice," Freshman Annette Carey said.

The Honors Assistant, Freshman Renee Durette, works with Reynolds on a day-to-day

basis, giving her a closer perspective on him. "I get to know him a little more and see a different side to him. I see him as a boss and mentor rather than just a professor," Durette said.

When he isn't teaching, helping students, or fulfilling one of his other many duties, Dr. Reynolds enjoys several pastimes, the primary one being quiet reading. He also enjoys raising salt water fish, collecting jazz albums, and traveling to historical sites around the world.

Over the past 19 years as a professor at Saint Leo, Dr. Reynolds considers his work with students to have been most important to him. "My biggest accomplishment is to have more than two dozen students go on to law school," Reynolds





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Sports Update

MEN'S BASKETBALL (11-5, 1-3)

Men Drop Two... The Saint Leo men's basketball team dropped a pair of Sunshine State Conference games last week. The Lions lost to Eckerd at home and Florida Southern on the road to fall to 11-5 overall, 1-3 in SSC play. Florida Southern 91, Saint Leo 78... Innocent Kere scored 20 points, including 16 in the second half as No. 2 Florida Southern pulled away from Saint Leo Saturday night in Lakeland. Sophomore forward Matt Hogarth led all scorers with 24 points, while senior guard Brett Slaughter added 14 points and junior guard Daniel Palmer added 13 points, six rebounds and seven assists. The Lions led by as many as seven early and led by five when the Moccasins went on a 9-2 run over a period of 2:12 to take their first lead. The Lions trailed by only one (37-36) at halftime, but saw the Mocs go on a 10-2 run (six by Kere) over the first three and a half minutes of the second half and slowly built the lead to as many as 13. Both teams shot well in the first half, shooting 52 percent from the floor. The Mocs continued that hot shooting, hitting 56 percent of their shots in the second half, compared to 37 percent shooting for the Lions. The Lions did connect on 63 percent of its shots from 3-point land in the second half, as they drained 11 threepoint baskets in the game.

Eckerd 75, Saint Leo 72...Clevon Dunbar scored 13 points and grabbed seven rebounds to lead Eckerd (13-2, 3-0) to its eighth straight victory with a Sunshine State Conference over Saint Leo (11-4, 1-2). Eckerd used a 7-0 to take a 69-62 lead with 2:37 remaining and the Tritons held on. Lester Chang-Fong and Jeff Kliewer added 11 points apiece while Dwayne Smith came off the bench to score nine and grab seven rebounds. Matt Hogarth led Saint Leo with 22 points and six rebounds. Daniel Fallon added 12 points, eight rebounds and seven assists in the loss.

Hogarth Takes Over Scoring Lead... Matt Hogarth averaged 23 points last week to take over the team scoring lead. The sophomore guard is now averaging 16.2 points to lead five Lions in double figures. Brett Slaughter is second on the team at 15.9 with Daniel Palmer (15.4) and Gary Downing (15.0) not far behind. James Turner is pitching in 10.7 points per contest.

Launching Three's... A good deal of the Lions' SSC leading 85.8 points per game have come from long range. The Lions lead the SSC averaging 8.1 three's per game. The squad is 130-for-354 and on pace to set the school record for three's made in a season. In addition to three-pointers and scoring, Saint Leo also leads the conference in assists averaging 17.69 per game.

Slaughter Career Point Watch... Brett Slaughter started the 1999-2000 season at No. 13 on the Saint Leo all-time career scoring list. Sixteen games into his senior season, the 6-6 guard has moved into 8th all-time with 1389 career points. Kevin McDonald (1977-81) ranks 7th all-time with 1415 points. Joe Orchulli (1963-67) is the school's all-time leader with 1974 points.

Barry, Rollins This Week... Saint Leo hosts Barry University on Wednesday night at 7:30 p.m. Barry heads into the game with an overall record of 6-10 and a conference mark of 0-4. The Bucs are coming off a 65-60 loss to Florida Tech. Saint Leo spilt with Eckerd last year, winning on the road 64-59 before falling at home 74-68. On Saturday the Lions will be in Winter Park to face Rollins College.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL (5-11, 0-4)

Still Seeking First SSC Win... The Saint Leo women's basketball lost two more Sunshine State Conference games last week, dropping its overall record to 5-11 and its conference record to 0-4. The Lions fell to Eckerd at home on Wednesday and to Florida Southern in Lakeland on Saturday. Florida Southern 87, Saint Leo 35...Alicia Evans scored 19 points, while Tasha Smith added a double-double (17 points, 11 rebound) effort in a lopsided victory over Saint Leo in Lakeland on Saturday night. Senior Tasha Ealey led the Lions with nine points and four assists. Junior Angela Newson grabbed a game-high six rebounds. Saint Leo trailed 7-6 early then saw the Moccasins go on a 12-0 run for a 19-6 lead. The Lions chipped away and pulled to within five with six and a half minutes to go, before the Mocs went on a 17-4 run to close out the first half with an 18 point lead. Large runs in the second half broke the game open. Poor shooting and turnovers continued to plague the Lions as they dropped their fifth straight game, and fourth in conference play. Eckerd 58, Saint Leo 54...Felecia Felton scored 28 points and had eight steals to lead Eckerd (5-9, 1-2) to a Sunshine State Conference win over Saint Leo (5-10, 0-3). Eckerd led by as much as 25 points in the second half and was up 51-32 with

8:35 remaining. Saint Leo then used a 22-3 run to tie the game at 54-54 with :26 left to play. Julia Huddleston then connected on all four of her free throw attempts for the Tritons down the stretch as they held on. Tasha Ealey led Saint Leo with 18 points, six rebounds and six assists. Ebony Winn came off the bench to score 13 points as the Lions lost their fourth straight.

Ealey among National Leaders... Senior guard Tasha Ealey leads the Lions in scoring and assists, averaging 11.8 points and 5.6 assists per game. Her 5.6 assists per game is good enough to lead the Sunshine State Conference, and the Tampa native is currently 18th in the nation in Division II in assists.

Ealey Leading Scorer... Saint Leo point guard Tasha Ealey leads the team in scoring and assists, averaging 11.8 points and 5.6 assists per game. She has been the team's high scorer in eight games this season, including the last three in Sunshine State Conference play.

Other Leaders... Junior Angela Newson is the team's leading rebounder, averaging 6.4 rebounds per game. The 5-7 forward has been the team's leading rebounder in eight games this season including all four games in SSC action. Freshman Ebony Winn is second on the team, averaging 6.1 rebounds, while Ealey is third at 4.9. Newson is also second on the team in scoring, averaging 9.2 points per game. Junior Samantha Campbell is third at 8.8 points per game.

Barry, Rollins This Week... Saint Leo hosts two teams that are currently in a four-way tie for the lead in the Sunshine State Conference.
