On September 9, 1997, the eighth president of our College, Dr. Arthur F. Kirk Jr. was inaugurated. The ceremony was held at 11:00 a.m. in the Marion Bowman Activities Center. Presiding over the mass was Rt. Rev. Robert N. Lynch, Bishop of the Diocese of Saint Petersburg.

A president with new ideas and changes in mind that are already apparent, Dr. Kirk has had a strong background in small colleges. He held positions at Raritan Valley Community College in New Jersey and College Misericordia in Pennsylvania. Most recently, he was President of Keuka College in New York for 13 years. His doctoral dissertation was "Strategies to Affect the Survival of the Small College," which assures that Dr. Kirk has had "hands on" experience dealing with the smaller school and ways to improve smaller college systems.

Dr. Kirk received his B.A. and M.A. from Kean College of New Jersey and His Ed.D. from Rutgers University. He has had five listings in "Who's Who in Education," in education, finance, emerging leaders, the east, and international. He is a member of the Young President's Organization, Empire State Chapter, the executive committee of the Independent Colleges and Universities of Florida, and the board of the Pasco County United Way.

Dr. Kirk's eager attitude has formu-

## Dr. Astolfi, more than just words...

Dr. Astolfi, Saint Leo College's new Academic Vice President, has a rich resume of experience. His previous position as the Academic Vice President and Professor of History at Siena College, two miles outside Albany New York, shows that he is not unfamiliar with his new position or its responsibilities. Prior to that, he was the Dean of Arts and Sciences and a History Professor at Clark University, of Worcester, Massachusetts for twelve years.

When asked what he thought of Saint Leo so far, Dr. Astolfi had some encouraging remarks. "I find it to be a place of both opportunities and challenges. The most pleasant surprise so far is the quality of faculty, students, and programs. The potential is here to do some outstanding things. One of the most difficult things is that Saint Leo seems to suffer from an inferiority complex. There are many better things here than we are willing to talk about, and it is time for us to start."

When asked what his job entails, Dr. Astolfi puts leadership on the top of his list. "I am expected to provide leadership for all of the academic programs in the institution. I am also responsible for working with faculty to create a stronger curriculum, in addition to faculty development and issues of student learning. In short, anything that is primarily academic in nature is my responsibility."

"Right now, I feel that I must get us to focus on what makes a Saint Leo education distinctive. We, as a community, must ask the question of what we want our students to learn, why we want them to learn it, how we expect them to go about that process of learning and, finally, how we measure our success" Dr. Astolfi said.

Changes have already been noticed on campus this semester. Dr. Astolfi plans on contributing to the positive trend. "The first thing that we will do is address the question of student support services from an academic perspective."

"We need to train and evaluate advisors and bring career services together with academic advising so that students can see where what they are doing now can take them. We have already started that process with students in their first year. Dr. Mark Edmonds is working with me to start a study hall program. First year students who perform badly after the first semester will be given the opportunity to participate. The sessions will be staffed with tutors for Math and English. It will meet for fifteen hours a week, and we will recommend that students attend anywhere from six to ten hours. Students who would appear to be candidates to leave the institution for academic reasons after the first semester will be given the opportunity to stay on the condition that they sign a contract indicating that they will attend these sessions for no less than ten hours a week."

"I am a great believer in experiential education. I think that each major should have embedded in it either the opportunity for significant research or work experience at an internship sight, and both should carry credit. Students should have opportunity to do either or both," Dr. Astolfi said.

According to Sharon Wormser, a junior biology major, "Dr. Astolfi is about more than just words; he is about action. He is also very approachable which makes him an ideal Academic Vice President for the students of Saint Leo College."

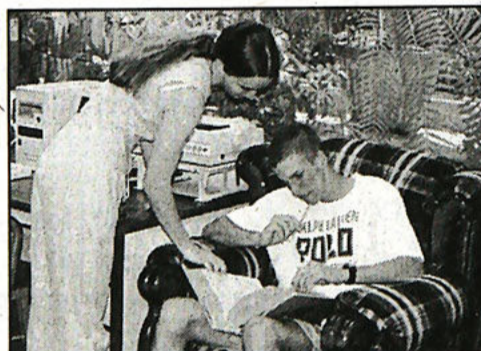

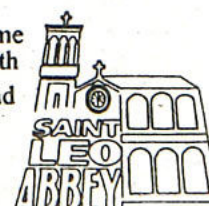
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# From the Sports Desk

With a new year of sports under way, it's time to see how much the Saint Leo sports program has grown in recent years. Over the past four years, the sports teams at Saint Leo have grown more than might be apparent to some incoming students.

When I arrived here three years ago, the sports program was in the beginnings of a rebirth. Our teams had few winning records, in fact, most had pretty bad records.

### DON'T GET SCAMMED ON YOUR WAY TO COLLEGE!

Look for 6 signs a scholarship search may be a scholarship scam!

1. "The scholarship is guaranteed or your money back." No one can guarantee that they'll get you a grant or scholarship. Refund policies in writing -before you pay.
2. "You can't get this information anywhere else." There are many free lists of scholarships. Check with your school or library before you decide to pay someone to do the work for you.
3. "May I have your credit card or bank account number to hold this scholarship?" Don't give out your credit card or bank account number on the phone without getting information in writing first. It may be a set-up for an unauthorized withdrawal.
4. "We'll do all the work." Don't be fooled. There's no way around it. You must apply for scholarships or grants yourself.
5. The scholarship will cost some money. Don't pay anyone who claims to be "holding" a scholarship or grant for you. Free money shouldn't cost a thing.
6. "You've been selected" by a 'national foundation' to receive a scholarship, or "You're a finalist" in a contest you never entered. Before you send money to apply for a scholarship, check it out. Make sure the foundation or program is legitimate.

NEED MONEY FOR COLLEGE? Check with your school guidance counselor or local librarian for free information about current scholarships before you pay someone for the same -or similar - scholarship lists. After college he plans to try playing soccer in Europe for a few years and then move back to the United States to work on Wall Street.

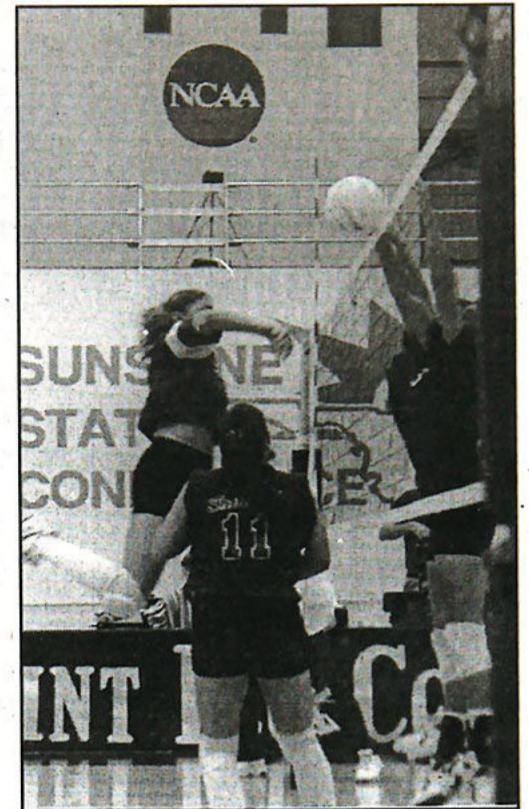
