

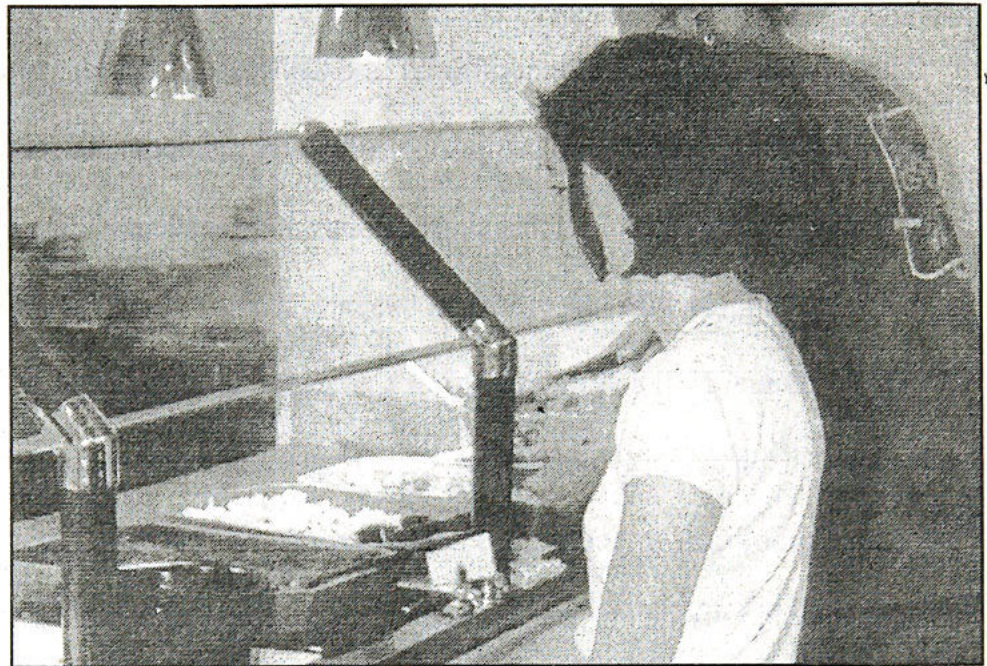


Students React to Cafeteria Changes

Saint Leo College's cafeteria has undergone some changes since last year, and these changes have met with a mixed response from Saint Leo's student body. Ms. Kathy Hillard, Assistant Manager of Food Services, is proud of what her department has to offer this year. Some new features have been added, and some old features have been changed for this year's food line-up. "Showtime Cooking" attempts to add variety to every lunch and dinner with things like stir-fry and various carved meats. The cafeteria tries to cater to health conscious students with the addition of more vegetarian dishes. Both the salad and deli bars contain a wider variety of choices than they had last year. Perhaps, most importantly, the lunch hours have been extended from 11:30a.m.- 1:30p.m. to 11:00a.m.- 2:00p.m.. The dinner hours now range from 4:00p.m.- 8:00p.m.. For students who are unable to come to the cafeteria during its operating hours, the Cage Snack Shop and Subway are available.

Despite the good intentions of the Food Service staff, not

all students approve of the way the cafeteria is run. Junior, Tammy Cade is less than thrilled with the cafeteria's hours. She complains, "I have a late class, and I have to skip dinner on Wednesday night. This type of complaint is common. The Cage is now serving food after the cafeteria's hours, but that only started a couple of weeks ago. Subway only opened in the last few weeks. A supplemental system only works when the supplements are available. Even now, the meal plan doesn't apply to Subway; however, Bonus Bucks, Monarch Money, or cash may be used.

Senior, Amanda Camp feels that, "It's food. It's not bad. They just need more variety." The need for variety is a complaint voiced by many. Jamie Palandro, also a Senior, thinks, "It's horrible." However, she is not totally negative: "There are certain things that good, like the stir-fry." Not everyone is displeased. Leigh Wazocha, a Junior who recently transferred from PHCC, enjoys eating in the cafeteria. She points out that some colleges don't even have a cafeteria, while Saint Leo serves full meals. She finds the selection to be both varied and wholesome. Ultimately, it is up to the reader and the eater to decide what they think of the changes in the Saint Leo cafeteria.

Director of Admissions Arrested for D.U.I.

As seen in the Tuesday, September 22 issue of the **Pasco Shopper Newspaper**. St. Leo-- Conrad Hinckley, director of admissions at Saint Leo College, was charged with drunken driving last week in Hernando County. Hernando sheriff's deputies said Hinckley, 44, of Dade City, was driving with an amount of alcohol in his blood nearly twice the level at which Florida law presumes impairment. He was also cited for driving with an expired driver's license from the Caribbean island of Antigua, the Hernando Sheriff's Office reported. The sheriff's report said Hinckley was pulled over Thursday at 10:30pm on Spring Lake Highway. The deputy accused Hinckley of running a stop sign and nearly losing control of his car. Hinckley, who told deputies he had drunk half a bottle of wine, failed several road sobriety tests, the sheriff's report said. His blood-alcohol level registered at about 0.14 percent. The level at which impairment is presumed is 0.08 percent.

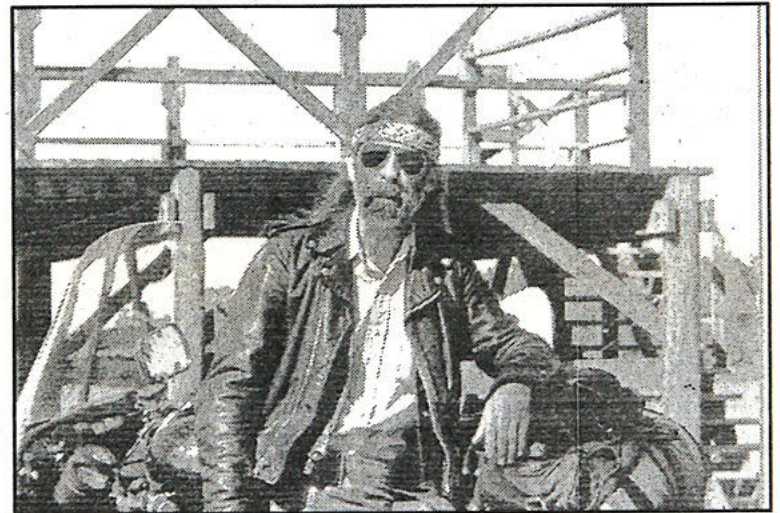
A Plea to the Residents of Saint Leo College

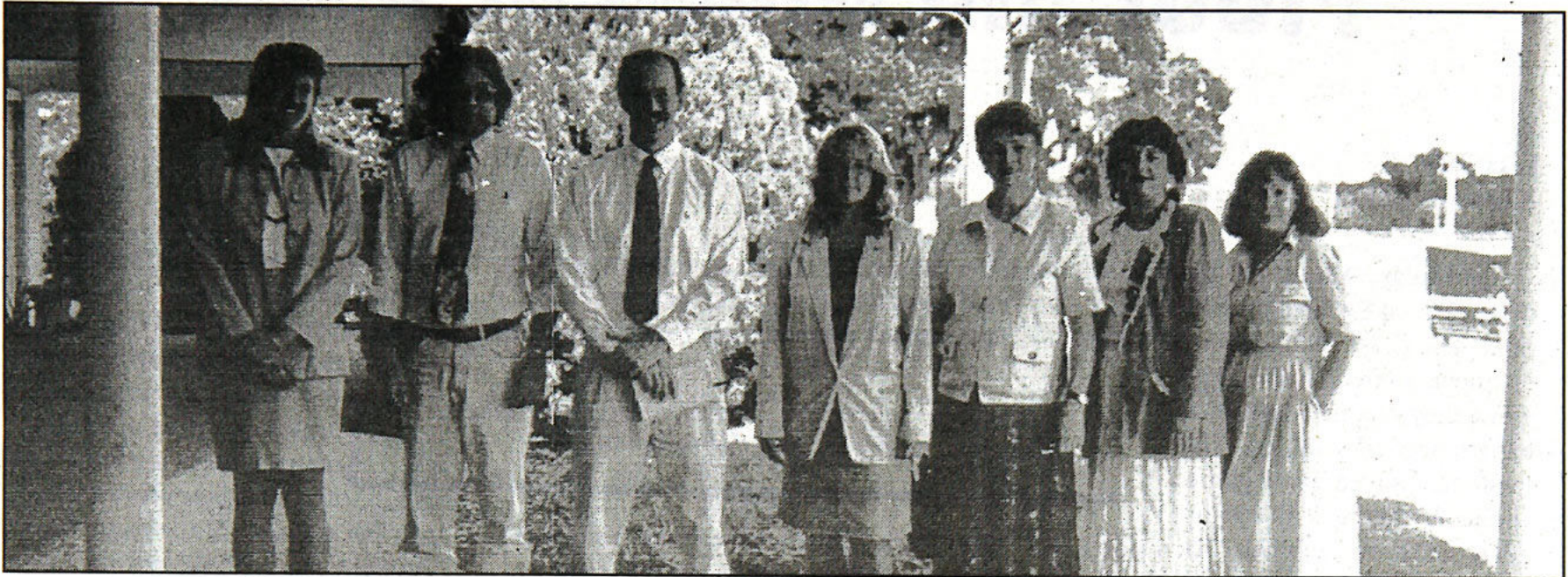

Dr. Sharon Rebecca Carr is a new Visiting Assistant Professor of Physics and Mathematics. Dr. Carr holds a Ph.D. in Interdisciplinary Education and her M.A. in Educational Supervision from the University of South Florida and a B.A. in Animal Science from the University of Florida.

Dr. Karen Hahn is the new Director of ADA Learning. Dr. Hahn has taught undergraduate courses in elementary education and in the specific disabilities program for Saint Leo College as an adjunct professor. Dr. Hahn holds a Ph.D. in Curriculum and Instruction with a specialization in Special Education and cognate in Educational Leadership from the University of South Florida and M.S. from the College of New Rochelle.

Dr. Marilyn Hall joins us as a Visiting Professor of Accounting. Dr. Hall has taught for us as an adjunct faculty member on campus and at MacDill AFB. She holds a D.B.A. from Nova University.

Dr. Joy Innis and Dr. Adrienne Shannon are sharing a position as Directors of the Arts Program and as Assistant Professors of Music. Accomplished pianists, they come to us from Western Canada where they were performing and teaching. Both have Ph.D.s from Ball State University. Dr. Innis has her B.A. from The University of Toronto; Dr. Shannon has a B.A. from The Juilliard School of Music. They have performed throughout Asia, Canada, and the United States.

Dr. Edward LaFontaine joined Saint Leo College as the Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs for the Freshman Year Experience in August. He was Dean of Students and Associate Professor of Sociology at Keuka College from 1986

through 1998. In addition to administrative duties, he will teach Sociology and freshman experience courses. He received an M.Ed. from St. Lawrence University and an M.S. and B.S. from The Ohio State University. He has his Ph.D. in Sociology from the University of Kentucky.

Dr. Patty O'Grady joined the Education faculty as a Visiting Associate Professor of Education. In addition to teaching, she will complete our study of the area needs for B.A. and M.Ed. programs in Special Education. She was an Associate Professor of Education and Department Chair at the University of Maryland College Park and at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore, where she restructured the Special Education program to meet state and federal guidelines. She has her Ph.D. from the University of Maryland.

Dr. John Pantzalis is our new Associate Professor of International Business and Marketing. He earned his M.B.A. in Finance and International Business and his Ph.D. in Marketing from the University of Arizona. He has taught at University of Arizona, Oklahoma City University, City University of New York, and the Guangzhou Institute of Foreign Trade in Guangzhou, China.

Dr. Jacci White is our new Assistant Professor of Mathematics. Her doctorate was conferred last month from the University of Central Florida. Her B.A. is from Rollins College, where she was Most Valuable Player on the Volleyball team. She has extensive experience in developmental math education and provides us with the ability to revise our math curriculum to meet students' needs.

Mr. Stephen Wingreen joins us as a Visiting Professor of Computer Information Systems. He received his M.S. from Florida State University and B.A. from Southeastern College. He will also be working with Dr. Moorman to design and develop at least two courses for presentation on the Internet.

Awareness course and an Introduction to

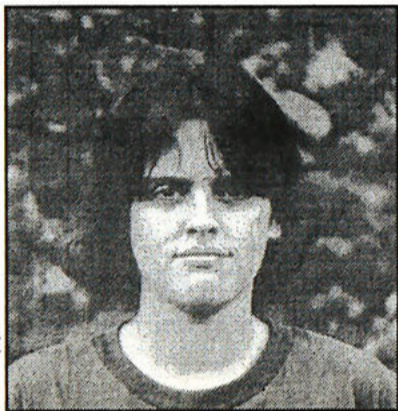

The majority of the freshman class brought cars with them from home. Therefore, they do not really find themselves secluded from places they

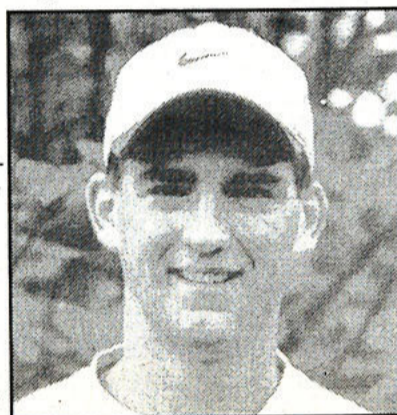

It was at the Institute for Black Catholic Studies (IBCS) of Xavier University of Louisiana, whereby in family-oriented togetherness, students, faculty, staff, guests, friends, guest speakers, and elders joined hands to celebrate their gift of life and that of others.

It was a three-week program, and each day began with an active and uplifting Morning Praise, which was expressed in rhythmic music, drumming, dance, a short play, scripture, prayer, healing, and personal reflection. Every participant was welcome to share his or her personal skills and creativity in this function, either by planning, facilitating, participating, or just enjoying it. Classes followed immediately after and continued till four o'clock. Between classes, we had our lunch break, which was preceded by the Eucharist celebration.

The Institute offers an opportunity for intellectual, professional, and spiritual growth within the Black Catholic

context of Xavier University and New Orleans. As an interdisciplinary program, the Institute curriculum explores its various components from diverse African American views. The curriculum includes Theology, History, Pastoral Theology, Spiritual Aesthetics.

Every summer, the Institute for Black Catholic Studies offers Certification and Enrichment Programs, which fall under four divisions: Master of Catechist, Youth Ministry, Leadership in the Faith Community, and Vocation / Formation Enrichment. These three-week programs are spread over three summer sessions, and all students in Certification and Enrichment, choose two major courses from Doctrine, History, Scripture, or Liturgy. They also, participate in seminars in Black Religious Expression, which includes Art, Dance, and Drama.

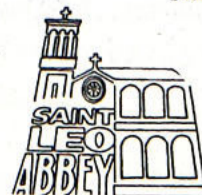

Residence Hall Restrictions Revised

Many students who live on campus are very pleased with the new rule changes. For those of you who do not know, visitation hours have been altered. The new rule that applies to Henderson, Benoit, Roderick, and Alumni is: a person of the opposite sex will be permitted to visit a student's residence hall until 2:00 a.m. during the weekdays (Sunday-Thursday), and there is twenty-four hour visitation over the weekends (Friday-Saturday). On holidays, when there are no classes the following day, there is also twenty-four hour visitation. Marmion/Snyder's visitation is: persons of the opposite sex are allowed in a student's room until 2:00 a.m. during the weekdays (Sunday-Thursday), and over the weekends until 3a.m. (Friday-Saturday). On holidays, when there are no classes the following day, visitation is allowed until 3a.m.. No co-habitation is allowed in the residence hall rooms. This means that two people of the opposite sex can not be living together on campus, in the same room. The repercussion for disobeying these rules is documentation. Documentations are recorded with Residence Life, and punishments for disobeying the rules are decided after assessment of the particular case.

This change of visitation rules was made by the Board of Trustees. Dr. Arthur Kirk and Dr. Maureen Powers supported the decision. There has not been a prob-

lem with students opposing this decision. Helen Santamaria, a sophomore who lives on campus, states, "I think that the new rules are good. They give students more freedom, and a better chance to show responsibility." However, these new rules can affect students who have roommates. It is still necessary for students to be respectful of their roommates. The residents must agree with each other and feel comfortable in their living area. After all, everyone should feel comfortable in his/her own room. Amy Gougherty, a Resident Assistant for Henderson Hall, gives her opinion, "As long as people respect each other and their roommates, the new rules should not be a problem. Residents must live responsibly, and it will be fine. It really all comes back to personal responsibility and respect for roommates."

There will be a meeting this month in which implementing a Judicial Board will be discussed. This Judicial Board will consist of students, faculty, and staff. The purpose of the board will be to hear the appeals of students cases. Jason Zelesky, Director of Residence Life, is in favor of this board, "This will give the students, who felt they were unfairly dealt with, a chance to appeal their case." In cases when a student has been, for example suspended, he/she would be able to present his/her case to the Judicial Board and state reasons for the unfairness of the repercussion which was applied to him/her. The board will then review the case.

Many have probably seen Mike duDomaine running or biking around campus, but few know the story behind the athlete. He is a senior Secondary Education major, and a member of the fledging cross-country team at Saint Leo. So far this season he has competed in two meets for Saint Leo. In the first meet, he placed 33rd out of approximately 102 runners. That constituted a 5th place conference finish. He followed up that performance with another 5th place conference finish in a meet at Melbourne. Other teams in the conference include Eckerd, University of Tampa, Florida Southern, Lynn, Florida Tech, and F.I.T.

duDomaine's athletic endeavors go beyond the cross-country team. He is currently training for the Atlanta Marathon in two months. In January, he will race the Walt Disney Marathon. Besides competing in marathons, he also competes in

triathlons. The triathlons usually include a one-mile swim, 10k run, and a 25 mile bike. A couple of his goals include breaking 35 minutes in a 10 k, three hours in a marathon, and finishing a triathlon in four hours and thirty minutes. In the year 2000, he hopes to qualify for The Ironman in Hawaii.

Mike puts in close to one hundred and thirty-six miles a week: 30 running, 100 biking, and six swimming. Carbo-loading is the biggest part of his diet, coupled with drinking a lot of water. Beyond his running, which he began his senior year in high school, he is a member of Tau Kappa Epsilon, Ambassadors, student athletic committee, and is a Resident Assistant. His fraternity brother and cross-country teammate, Dennis Jones, stated that "Mike is the hardest working person I know. He trains religiously, has a lot of endurance, and has a lot of big plans for the future." This Georgia native is definitely one of Saint Leo's most visible examples of athletic dedication and determination.

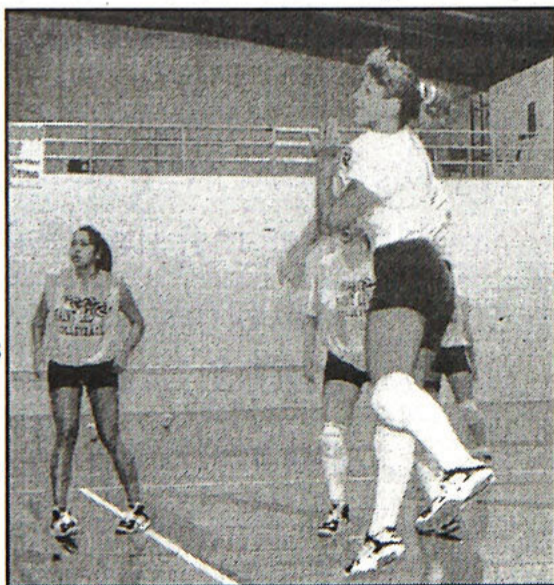

The 1998-99 **intramural sports** began with a softball tournament. The nine teams have signed up to play in the tournament, and two teams are co-ed. The teams will play in a double elimination tournament. All games are played on the softball field at 4:30 p.m. or 5:30 p.m., Monday-Thursday. The next intramural sport will be flag football.

The **women's basketball** team for the upcoming season is a mixture of six returning players and seven new players. The returners include three seniors, Telica Phillips, Kelly Kohn, and Donna Ferguson. Last year's team achieved the most wins in the school's history with a 16-14 record. The new players include two juniors and five freshmen. Coach Hayes looks forward to an exciting year, "We have such a strong combination of young and old, which gives us a good mixture, and I hope our leadership will step-up and deliver when we need it."

The **men's soccer** team has been ranked as high as 14th nationally, but this season has been one of adjustment. The team has seventeen freshmen, so they rely heavily on senior leadership from former Sunshine State Conference player of the year Jon Akin. He lead the nation in scoring his sopho-

He finished 6th out of 51 runners and was named Sunshine State Conference Runner-of-the-week. The women's team ran a 5k and tied with Eckerd for third place. The team was lead by Megan and Kathleen Houtsma, with times of 21:49 and 22:33,

and finished 10th and 11th individually. First year Coach Juby Aryssia is excited about the hard work of his team: "Although talent helps in this sport, you can achieve more in distance running through hard work and training." His team trains very hard at 6:00 every morning.

The **women's volleyball** team stands at 9-6. Coach Lent expects a strong finish from a young team which starts two freshmen and one sophomore. They have conference play to come, and Coach Lent has one main goal, "I want to receive a regional ranking." They will have the opportunity within the next two weeks when they play three regionally ranked teams. They rank second in the Sunshine State Conference in serving with an average of 2.62 aces per game. Shelby Jordan and Sarah Doctor each have 30 aces, which ranks them 3rd and 4th in the SSC.

The **men's basketball** team broke school records with a tie for second place in the conference. Coach Hanks looks forward to a more mature team which includes starters Brett Slaughter and Daniel Palmer. The Monarchs have brought in a strong recruiting class for the upcoming season. Coach Hanks is encouraged by the promise of a very talented team, "We're proud of the improvement our basketball team has made and, we're excited to continue to make further advancement."

There will be a new class offered in the Spring of 1999. The class will be entitled Journalistic Writing, and it will be taught by Mr. Kurt Van Wilt. It has been approximately five years since this class has been offered here at Saint Leo College. If it goes well next semester, and class enrollment is sufficient, it will be offered either every other Spring or every Spring semester.

The course will work on improving the students' format for writing journalism. The students will write stories, and the professor will critique the stories. There may be cases when the students are able to act as journalistic reporters and write stories regarding campus activities. The students will be able to choose their own interests to research and write about.

Professor Kurt Van Wilt, plans to use Saint Leo College's school newspaper, The Monarch, as a reference and aid throughout the course. Some of the articles written in the course may be submitted for publication in the school newspaper. In addition to integrating with The Monarch, the class may also be able to experience other forms of journalistic publications. Mr. Van Wilt hopes to offer a field trip to a major newspaper to explore the different aspects of putting together and printing a newspaper.

Journalists employed with various newspapers will be scheduled to speak to the students in this course throughout the semester. This will give the students an insight on what goes into forming articles. This is a very exciting opportunity for students who are interested in a career in journalism and those who are interested in general writing.
