Are the New iBooks Here to Stay?

SAINT LEO – With the new Apple iBooks, the question is how do they measure up?

This is a question a lot of people are asking.

Saint Leo University decided to switch over from PC to Macintosh.

The new iBooks provide students with wireless capabilities. For those computer illiterate people, wireless gives students the ability to go on the Internet without the use of Internet cables.

"I have to admit that I did a triple take when I received an email over the summer that indicated Saint Leo was to become a wireless campus and that Apple would be providing the hardware for this endeavor," enclosed Dr. Kevin Kieffer, associate professor of psychology.

Kieffer added that his disbelief was because the news of Saint Leo choosing Apple was a dream come true. Kieffer has been an ardent Macintosh user for nearly a decade.

A major complaint that people have is that the iBooks do not have a floppy drive, which makes it even harder to transfer PC applications to Macintosh.

John Stansel, an employee at the Apple store in the International -Plaza mall located in Tampa, believes that Apple stopped the floppy disk drive being a standard with the Apple models. Apple believes this to be a cost-cutting option.

"Four percent [of users] do not use them [floppy drives]. Thus, the floppy drives are obsolete," explained Stansel on Apple's decisions.

Stansel detailed that people can use an Ethernet cable to crossover PC and Macintosh information. People can also burn CDs of their information to

Aftermath: A Story of Survival after Date Rape

Date rape happens frequently, but a lot of girls are afraid to come forward.

SAINT LEO - "Christine" never thought that it would happen to her. She had always thought that she was safe with her cousins and her friends. As she later found out, that wasn't enough to keep her protected against being a victim of date rape.

"How it happened is not really all that important," she said. "It happened. I can't go back and erase it." So why is she now talking about what happened to her? "I began to realize that this was not something that happened to one person per city. Date rape happens frequently, but a lot of girls are afraid to come forward. Well, it took me about three years to come forward. It's not easy."

The obvious question is, "Why didn't you go to the police after it happened?" It's a question that she's heard in relation to other rape stories. "What were the chances that it would go to trial? What were the chances that I wouldn't be revictimized at the trial?"

She has a good point.
Bonnie Campbell, a former official with the U.S. Justice Department, told Marie Claire magazine that, "There is a bias against women in court. Most of the players in the courtroom are men, and one of their greatest fears is that they will be falsely accused of rape. The question 'Is she telling the truth?' inserts itself into every case."

Rather than deal with public humiliation with the trial,



transfer to a different computer.

"We are also realizing that the additional computers (we more than doubled the number of student computers) taxes our networks and our Office of International and Technology (OIT) staff. We also need to step up the training for faculty, staff, and students to get even better educational results," explained Kirk.

In September, there were a few sessions for students to learn how to use the iBooks.

On October 18, at 3 p.m., OIT offered a tutorial in Selby Auditorium for the faculty.

Professors can use the new iBooks as a great teaching tool. Students can bring the iBooks to the classrooms, where they can access the Internet, take notes,

and share information.

"What makes the iBooks most beneficial, in my opinion, is their ease of use and software support. Students can now do projects differently than they would with other types of computers," explained Dr. Rebekah Thomas, professor of biology. More and more faculty are using the iBooks in the classroom. The iBooks are lightweight, making it easier for students to carry them to class.

"With the iBooks in the Students also find that the special Apple compatible printers and external floppy drive cause inconveniences. Students complain that they do not always have time to run to the library.

"The only thing that the iBook is good for is to throw it up against

the wall to the point that it is unrecognizable," said freshman, Erin Portice.

Although students feel this way, administration believes the iBooks are the way to go.

In response to students' complaints about the iBooks, Reynolds stated, "What the campus is missing is imagination! The faculty needs instruction. The students need time to adjust to the

new technology. And OIT needs to know what we want to do with the iBooks."

Reynolds added, "As Machiavelli observed, human beings do not take kindly to change. Peevish shortsightedness is capable of doing great damage to the future."

"So, in sum, I believe that the move to transition the campus to a wireless university was indeed a leap in the right direction, and I have been thoroughly impressed with both the machines and support provided by Apple," concluded Kieffer. as well as the possibility that her friends wouldn't believe her, Christine remained silent. She described the years of silence as "Hell. Pure hell. I couldn't tell anyone. I was convinced that anyone who looked at me knew that I had been raped and that I was 'damaged goods."

The silence took a heavy toll on all aspects of her life. "My grades suffered greatly. I was supposed to have graduated a year ago but I couldn't," she said. "My GPA and credit hours were insufficient. I couldn't get into a decent medical school with what my grades were." As a result, she is attending an extra year to bring up her GPA.


"My relationship with my family was strained as well. How could I tell my parents? 'Hey, mom and dad, I was raped," she said. "I could just see how they would react. It would kill them. How could I do that to them?" To this day, she still has not told her family about the assault.

"My grades dropped dramatically. I was withdrawn from my family and friends, and I couldn't bring myself to go to work," she said. "I was so depressed that it was just a struggle to get out of bed in the mornings. I would just lie in bed and cry."

"I had people in my classes wondering where I was and what happened," she continued. "But after a while, they didn't care. They came up with stories about why I wasn't there. They didn't know. Judging from the remarks they would say to my friends and me, I just knew that they wouldn't understand. They wouldn't believe me. That made me feel even more isolated from everyone."

Christine struggled for three years before finally revealing the assault. She still refuses to name her attacker. "I know that I could probably report him, but what good would that do me now? It's been three years. I just want to heal and live my life again."

There are things that can be done if you, or anyone you know, has been raped. According to the Rape And Incest National Network, the first step is to notify the police immediately. Preserve all physical

evidence of the attack. Don't shower, bathe, douche, or brush your teeth. Save the clothes you wore at the time of the attack in a paper bag. Don't disturb the scene of the attack.

Also, the Rape And Incest National Network suggests going to a hospital emergency department or a specialized forensic clinic that could provide medical care for sexual assault victims. If you suspect that you were given a date rape drug, get tested for it. Write down as much as you can remember about the assault, the circumstances, and especially the description of the assailant.

Looking back now, Christine admits that she could've reported the assault. "But I didn't think anyone would believe me."

"Michigan is simply the best," Borg said.


When sports fans are not on the field or watching their favorite game they use that same drive in their everyday lives.

MUSIC IN REVIEW by Mark Relano

Twenty of the Greatest CDs You Should Have in Your Collection

This list in no way attempts to rate or categorize CDs, but, instead, supplies the reader with a wide spectrum of music that is of the highest standard. Many music genres are covered, and the titles are in alphabetical order. Part 1 of a 2 part series.

Barcelona: Freddie Mercury and Montserrat Caballe – Mercury, lead singer for Queen, blends Pop, Gospel, Rock, Opera and Instrumental music with lyrics in Japanese, Spanish and English sung by himself and Spanish opera star Caballe (Kuh-by-yay). Some critics trivialized the mixture of rock and opera, but most loved its innovation. The title song "Barcelona" was the opening anthem for the 1992 Olympics held in Spain. The lyrics to "The Golden Boy" and "The Fallen Priest" were written by Broadway and film's Tim Rice. This was the CD that exposed me to opera and got me listening to artists like Puccini, Leoncavallo and Verdi. This disc is essential for those who want to expand their musical horizons.

Beauty Stab: ABC - This sophomore CD is totally different than any of ABC's others. Dance/Pop tunes like "The Look of Love" or "Be Near Me" do not exist on this experimental and dark Alternative Rock disc. Instead, witty, political and social lyrics are accompanied by rock and roll exploration. Strings drive the reflective and mesmerizing song "By Default by Design" - and rousing, fast-paced tracks such as "Unzip" and "Love's a Dangerous Language" contrast the discs two or three slower numbers. This is an early attempt at Alternative that went unnoticed by the masses, but it is a worthy contribution to the genre. The title of the disc captures its essence: it's appealing and dangerous. Best of: Al Jarreau - In the tradition of George Benson, Jarreau takes Jazz and fuses it with Pop, Rock, Blues, R & B and ballads. His flawless, high tenor voice accentuates jazzy numbers like "Boogie Down," and his polished vocals on love ballads such as "After All" are unequivocal. Jarreau sings the theme to the hit show "Moonlighting" and experiences divine euphoria in the touching and inspirational "Mornin'." Jarreau's style is undeniable, and this CD is great for large dinner parties or intimate romantic ones, and it's great to piddle around to or just kick back and relax to. Best of Al Jarreau also has the hit "We're in This Love Together" and a remake of "Since I Fell for You." Candy-O: The Cars – Besides containing the radio hits "Let's Go" and "It's All I Can Do," this CD offers the epitome of 70s and 80s Rock and Roll. Synthesizers and edgy guitars make this disc a "musthear." The Cars were underrated, and if one listens to this CD, one will understand what a creative force the band truly is. "Dangerous Type" is one of my all-time favorite Cars songs, and it is difficult not to rock about while spinning this indelible disc of electronically backed, Hard and Pop Rock tunes. Each track is well crafted and catchy, and the production values are unrivaled.

Cross of Changes: Enigma – Some may recall Enigma's only top ten hit "Return to Innocence": the song merged Pop and Chant music with an American-Indian-type vocal. This is reminiscent of the entire CD. It is a surrealistic journey into spiritualism via musical relaxation and lyrical meditation. Music is emphasized over lyrics on this disc, but for the effect, it works. One can close one's eyes, and become entranced by the sultry, lush vocals and moderate tempos the disc exudes. Elements of Chanting, Pop and Rock mix with cultural and ethnic instruments and sounds like Indian, Arabian, Oriental, Turkish, and American-Indian. Perhaps the best song on the CD is "The Dream of the Dolphin," a beautiful and soothing track that brings one back to a state of calm.

Defining Moments: Saga – Many have probably never heard of Saga. This Canadian group had hits in the early 80s like "On the Loose" and "Wind Him Up." This CD is a compilation of some of the band's best songs. Saga's utilization of multi-layered synthesizers and progressive, guitar-chord structures gives the band its unique rock sound. Every track on this CD is forged meticulously with painstaking perfection to produce a wonderfully inventive and immensely enjoyable disc without commercialism or ostensible contrition. Saga is an extremely talented band that few know about but should be exposed to. This collection of Hard Rock, Pop, ballads and sophisticated "electronica" make Defining Moments just what the band entitled it: defining.

Delicate Sound of Thunder: Pink Floyd – In August of 1988, Pink Floyd recorded a series of concerts: the result was a live masterpiece. Floyd's two-disc set is the apotheosis of how a band should sound live. Lead guitarist and chief songwriter David Gilmour manipulates his guitar the way an experienced, crooked accountant manipulates his books – with precision, expertise and creativity. The live version of "Comfortably Numb" is sung in a lower and more intriguing manner and is played slightly different from the original. One can say that either version is sensational in its own right. Floyd also plays such tunes as "Learning to Fly," with its computerized synthesizers and industrial-like percussion and classics such as "Wish You Were Here," with its acoustic and vocal simplicity. Delicate Sound of Thunder is everything a live recording should be...and more.

Eden: Sarah Brightman – This CD blends the Surreal with Opera, Pop, Chant, Soft Rock and ballads. Brightman's crystal clear and inspirational vocals make songs like "In Paradisum," "Nella Fantasia" and "Deliver Me" leap from the speakers into one's soul. The soprano does an Italian version of Celine Dion's Titanic love theme called "Il Mio Cuore Va" and also performs a mellow rendition of Pop/Rock band Kansas' "Dust in the Wind." Brightman even writes lyrics for several of the CD's original compositions. Brightman, when using her vocals in a somewhat lower range than her high soprano, as she does on most of Eden, has the most pleasing, voluptuous and harmonious of all female voices. Illustrations of her vocal talent are evidenced in this melodious melodrama of musical magic. Even God might have considered forgiving Adam and Eve while listening to Sarah Brightman's Eden.

The Ego Has Landed: Robbie Williams – Williams is a former member of Take That and has had a solo career for a number of years. He is very popular in Great Britain, and this disc is a combination of his first two successful CDs released in England. The song "Angels" was a hit a couple of years back in the U. S., but no other hits have followed in America. This CD offers Alternative Rock, Dance and Pop with sometimes campy, sometimes poignant, lyrics. Williams duets with Neil Tennant of the Pet Shop Boys on the dance track "No Regrets" and toys with ideology and homelessness in the up-tempo "Jesus in a Camper Van." "Lazy Days" is a rip-roaring, rock and roll "jammer" that kicks off the CD, and Williams takes on the malevolent, backstabbing girlfriend theme in the musically and verbally caustic "Karma Killer." Williams' follow-up to The Ego Has Landed was a musical catastrophe, but this disc is the exact opposite – every track is musically sound, with clever, meaningful or ethereal lyrics.

Haddaway: Haddaway – Everyone is familiar with Saturday Night Live's take on Haddaway's hit "What is Love," but many may not know what a great CD this really is. Haddaway's one and only CD takes Techno, Dance and Pop to new levels, even doing a solid rendition of Bob Marley's Reggae classic "Stir it Up." One of the disc's preeminent tracks is a sentimental, mid-tempo song entitled "Mama's House," and, another favorite, "Shout," a super-charged, electronic dance track, gets the blood pumping. The programmed synthesizers in this song, and on the whole CD, are exceptional. If one ever has the need for a good dance disc, check out Haddaway. One may envision Will Ferrell and Chris Kattan "body-bouncing" a defenseless female when spinning this disc, but it will only add to the CD's already vibrant, upbeat flavor.

Lions Finish Season at .500 after Loss to Florida Southern

The Lions played one of the most demanding schedules in Division Two the year.

SAINT LEO - Saint Leo University men's soccer team season came to an unfortunate end with a 3-1 loss to Florida Southern University.

After being surprised with two quick goals in the first ten minutes, the Lions (8-8-2, 2-4-1 SSC) were not able to recover. However, this didn't stop the Lions from fighting. The Lions kept knocking at the Florida Southern Mocs goal, but were unable to capitalize on most of their chances.

Junior forward Ryan Smith knocked hard in the first half, but shots deflecting off the cross bar, nicking the post, and a few remarkable saves from Mocs goalkeeper kept Saint Leo from opening Southern's door.

Saint Leo continued to dominate in the beginning of the second half by putting high pressure on Southern's defense, but the Mocs would still not open the door for the Lions. Southern countered off a Lion's corner kick to put Saint Leo down 3-0, and along with a Lion's player receiving a red card, diminished Saint Leo's hope for a season over .500.

Tony Rosso helped the Lion's cause with a penalty kick in the final minutes, but the lone goal was not enough, as the Lions were unable to send its seniors off as winners.

Senior captain Jason Brando felt down about the lost, but thought the season was one of the better ones he has had in his

"I had a great time playing this year, but wish we could have finished up a little better. This was one of the better seasons we have had in my four years," Brando said. "I'm going to miss putting on a Lion's uniform, but by going .500 against a tough schedule, the future is looking excellent for this team."

The Lions undoubtedly had one of the most demanding schedules in Division Two.
Playing six games against top 15 nationally ranked teams, the Lions went 1-4-1. With the Lions starting three transfers, as well as three freshmen, the team was expected to start off a little slow. After losing three of the first five games, the Lions went on a

winning binge. Saint Leo went 6-0-1 in their next seven games, and played perhaps their best game of the season in a 3-2 loss to Christian Brothers University.

With soccer, you need to have a few breaks here and there, and unfortunately for the Lions, the breaks didn't go their way in the last half of the season. By losing four of their last five games, the Lions ended up in a disappointing tie for fifth in the Sunshine State Conference.

Although the Lion's season did not finish the way they wanted it to, a few individual players had honors throughout the season. Junior forward Federico Polo was a Sunshine Conference player of the week, as was freshman forward Tony Rosso. Rosso was also named the Sunshine State Conference Co-Freshman of the Year.

Team leaders were Rosso finishing the season with 24 points (10 goals, 4 assists), Polo with 15 points (6 goals, 3 assists), senior forward Stash Adams with 11 points (5 goals, 1 assists), and junior midfielder Claus Hagerdorn with 10 points (3 goals, 4 assists). Junior goalkeeper Charlie Long ended the season with a 1.77 goals against average.

Coach Fran Reidy thought the season had its ups and downs, but also looked forward to next season.

"The level of our competition was high, and I thought we were successful, even though we only beat one team that was nationally ranked," Reidy said. "We had a slow start to the season by adding

six new starters, (three freshman/ three transfers) but I was pleased with the development of our team."

Reidy believes next season the team will do better.

"The prospects of the future look good, and with the nucleus of our team back next season, we are definitely capable of being better than .500," he said.

Since the Lions are only losing four seniors (two starting), the outlook for next year is terrific. With hard work in the spring, as well as the additional new recruits, the Lions should be ready to challenge for their first ever Sunshine State Conference soccer title.
