## Remembering Dr. Hoerber

On October 2, Dr. Daniel R. Hoerber, former Saint Leo Vice President for Academic Affairs, succumbed to cancer. Dr. Hoerber's life work was in Catholic higher education, and he helped to improve academic standards here at Saint Leo, and also at Mercy College in Detroit, Michigan.

Daniel Hoerber was born on November 20, 1941, in St. Louis, Missouri. He was educated at Pontifical College of Josephinum, in Worthington, Ohio. He later received a Master of Arts Degree and a Doctorate in philosophy from Southern Illinois University. Dr. Hoerber was also a Marine Corps veteran who served in the Vietnam War.

Dr. Hoerber went on to become the Division of Creative and Liberal Arts dean and Vice President for Academic Affairs at Mercy College in Detroit. He accepted the Saint Leo position in 1991, and worked here for two years before leaving the position last September.

While some did not approve of the changes he made in some departments, others felt that he helped to make

Saint Leo academic programs much more competitive with those in other schools.

Mr. Jerry Dyer said, "Dr. Hoerber was very instrumental at improving academic quality at Saint Leo. He was effective in improving the academic review process, and I personally enjoyed working with him during his tenure at Saint Leo."

According to Dr. Edwin Doran, current Vice President of Academic Affairs, Hoerber "reorganized the academic divisions and his major contribution was the Academic Program Review."

The Academic Program Review assessed the quality and marketability of the many major options Saint Leo College offers to students.

Professor Terry Danner stated, "Dr. Hoerber was successful in revising the Criminal Justice Program and bringing it up to date. It was good to work with him."

Dr. Hoerber's accomplishments will continue to be felt here at Saint Leo. The outstanding academic accomplishments of the students mirror his efforts.

## College Plans New Entrance

Last year's removal of the "St. Leo College" arch initiated interest in an extensive project to beautify the main entrance. This project will be completed in two phases.

The first phase of work on the main entrance should begin later this semester and be completed "hopefully by the end of January," Mr. Weicherding, Vice President of Business Affairs said. This part of the project includes installing a new roof on the buildings surrounding the front entrance and building the new parking lot and tennis courts.

When this work is finished, the road work will begin. The main drive will be closed. Access to circle and library parking areas will be through the tennis court when it is converted to parking. The service road parallel to 52 will still be open. Mr. Weicherding said that they anticipate completion before the 1995 commencement.

The removal of the arch preceded the project, and the plans to improve the entrance originated at a later Board of Trustees' meeting. An alumni board member stated that the entrance should be renovated. He and other alumni pledged \$6000 for a row of palm trees lining the main boulevard.

Later, the B.O.T. decided that further improvements should be added, said Mr. John Weicherding. The president and three trustees agreed to give

\$20,000 each year for the next four years to the beautification project, and in this way the project is completely supported by pledges.

Architect Jim Robbins planned the design so that a median will divide the two lanes of the main entrance. This driveway will use what is now the parking area, which will be narrowed three feet on each side.

Palm trees and shrubbery will line the median and both edges of the main driveway. The tennis courts near Security will be replaced by a new parking lot, and new tennis courts will be built next to Henderson.

Bowman Activities Center, Crawford and Lewis Halls, Security, and CDL will each receive a new roof. Mr. Weicherding told Kim Almand in a prior interview. A pavilion will connect the CDL and Security buildings. Wing-like extensions bearing the college name will either be added to the existing pillars or be part of two new pillars.

Other changes are also planned beyond the main entrance as part of the project. At the lake front, there are plans to enlarge the dock, and build volleyball courts and a sheltered picnic area. Mr. Weicherding said. Roderick will reopen in mid-December or early January. Selby Auditorium is to receive new carpeting and chairs. The locker rooms and pool will also be improved. Several other ideas are not yet finalized.

R.E.M.-Monster-CD-. The name here foreshadows the outcome. This record is a monster. It is a guitar-drenched album of great songs. The lyrics deal with sex and relationship problems. This is a break from the death-type ones on their last album. The song "Let Me In" was written for and about Kurt Cobain. Also, the album is dedicated to Michael Stipes' friend, the late River Phoenix. This is going to be a huge album for them.

DGC Rarities Vol. 1-CD- is a collection of unreleased songs by various David Geffen Records recording artists. Hole, Nirvana, Teenage Fanclub, Counting Crows, Weezer, Sonic Youth, and St. Johnny all have good songs on this CD. But, Beck steals the album with a song that sounds like Dylan at his best. This is a good CD to get to hear some bands that are new to you.

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## Neutralizing Saddam

Well, he's done it again. Of course, it is difficult to guess at what a man such as Saddam Hussein is thinking. But, it appears that he is testing the resolve of the world, or, more realistically, that of the United States. Amazingly, it appears that the Iraqi madman may be able to garner some support from at least two nations in his quest to overturn the United Nations peace plan.

For those who have not followed the chain of events, Hussein began by amassing troops on the Iraq-Kuwait border. When this action caused a quick American response and U.S. troops began to deploy to Kuwait, Hussein began to pull his troops back. However, Saddam was not finished yet. Some Iraqi troops ended their rearward movement within striking distance of the Kuwaiti border. Now it appears that the Iraqi soldiers will complete their retreat.

Perhaps the most disturbing aspect of this whole affair is that Russia and France appear to be willing to accept the Iraqi leader's actions. Russia is brokering a deal with Iraq that looks, at this point, to be a soft reaction to this blatant attack on the integrity of a border that was only restored three years ago by a massive world effort. France, at one point during the second Iraqi troop buildup, was warning the U.S. not to make this last aggressive act by Hussein an excuse to further U.S. desires in the Middle-East. The French may be saying that Saddam deserves a break. However, France has an economic tie that they would very much like to renew. Iraq, before the Persian Gulf War, was a main supplier of oil to the French. So, France is willing to turn a blind eye toward Iraq and only worry about their own economic affairs. After the way France suffered in World War Two at the hands of a somewhat similar aggressor, it is unbelievable that they would take this attitude.

But why would Russia go soft on Iraq? Since the breakup of the Soviet Union, Russia has attempted to

continue to influence the politics of the world. In the past, Iraq was a major purchaser of military supplies from the Soviet Union. Also, these two countries were allies at the time of the Persian Gulf War. It is easy to forget that the Soviet Union had military advisors in Iraq during the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait. Also, keep in mind that with the dire circumstances of the Russian economy, the Russians find themselves dependent on the sale of military goods. Surely, at some point they would like to renew military sales to Iraq. So, consequently, it is easier to understand the "soft" Russian deal.

Considering the Russian and French desires, this new aggressive behavior does not seem as stupid as it did when it first occurred. President Clinton has shown a tendency to talk tougher in foreign policy than he was willing to act, so why not test his commitment to Kuwait. Also, it was worthwhile to see if the American people would support tough actions in the Persian Gulf while, simultaneously, maintaining almost 20,000 troops in Haiti.

What is most important is that, Saddam discovered that the United Nations will not allow his hostile movement. From this point, Hussein can decide what actions he will take to end the enforcement of economic sanctions against his country with an excellent understanding of the deepness of the world communities' resolve to stand against him. Of course, an ordinary leader would have understood the resolution that the Persian Gulf War symbolized.

At this time in Iraq, the United Nations enforced economic sanctions are taking a heavy toll. Food is becoming scarce, and every day that these sanctions remain in place is another day that repair parts are missed for the Iraqi military machine. Modern military equipment is dependent on constant maintenance. It is possible that Hussein may not be able to mobilize any more equipment than he has with his latest bullying tactic.

There should not be any lifting of

the sanctions until all of the conditions that the United Nations put forth are met. This latest action from Saddam has made it apparent that these sanctions are having an effect, and that the Iraqi leader is becoming desperate. This is an opportunity to neutralize Hussein, and it must be used as such. Saddam is a threat to world peace and must be eliminated. President Clinton must continue the policy of the preceding administration and remain steadfast in his desire to end the Hussein regime

Note: A few other areas to keep a sharp eye on.

Haiti- The U.S. is hoping for a peaceful transition to the Aristide government. The Haitians should not expect too much, too soon from the restored President.

Israel- The peace process is speeding up in the Middle East, in spite of the Israeli soldier recently killed. It is difficult to be optimistic about this region of the world, but things may be looking up.

Germany- In recent elections, Helmut Kohl retained power by a small majority. He will need much luck and political savvy to keep his policies moving.
