# Robert Ruday: A Student Affair

Over the summer Saint Leo College lost a friend and an able administrator. Dr. Robert Ackerman resigned as Vice President for Student Affairs to become Dean of Student Affairs at the University of Nevada in Las Vegas. Mr. Robert M. Ruday, formerly Dean of Student Affairs at the University of Albuquerque, has been chosen to take Dr. Ackerman's place. Mr. Ruday has an undergraduate math degree from California State College and a Master of Arts in College Union Management from New York University.

Mr. Ruday is happy to be here. "For 15 out of 22 years in higher education, I've worked in small Catholic institutions; so I feel right at home and comfortable with Saint Leo College." Mr. Ruday has two main objectives, to "provide the best service to students and build on the pride of students, faculty and staff we have here."

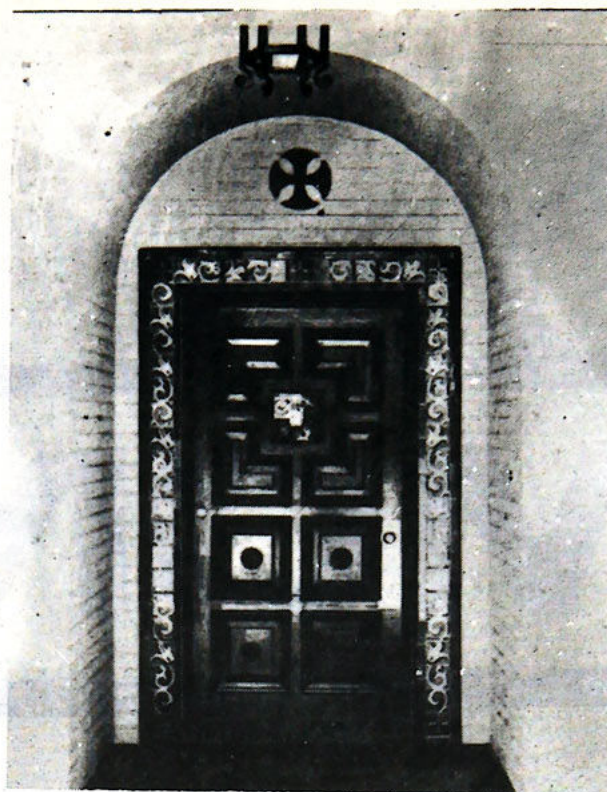
He would like to see the following changes take place in student affairs. One of the first changes he mentioned will involve the College Union Board. "I would like to see College Union Board offer more than just social activities," he comments. He believes C.U.B., should expand into cultural, recreational, and educational activities. In that same area of the college he foresees, "I'd like to work with the students in activities to establish a workshop that would hope to teach students to learn and refine their leadership skills."

Mr. Ruday also brings with him an anti-drug message. In regard to drug pushers, he states, "If I get substantial information you're pushing drugs, you're out." In regard to drug users he remarks, "We will deal with it immediately

and effectively." Among the other losers from the Ruday appointment will be vandals and cigarette smokers. "Alcohol is no excuse for destroying property," he explains. With regard to cigarette smokers, he reminds, "I'd appreciate it if you didn't smoke in my office." Political extremists won't like Ruday either. "I don't believe people should work outside the system," he proclaims.

Mr. Ruday has a unique philosophy. "The growth of the individual is very important to me but at the same time so is the preservation of the group's integrity," he reveals. "My policy is to work with students, assist them, and help them develop their maximum capabilities," he describes.

Mr. Ruday has many admirers in the administration. President M. Daniel Henry said, "I'm particularly pleased with the fact that Bob is not only a fully qualified professional, but also a very good person." John Fiengo, Vice President for Development added, "Mr. Ruday not only has the credentials for the position, he also has the personality, ambition, and sense of humor for the job. He is a tremendous asset for Saint Leo College." Sr. Mary Clair, Director of Residential Life, sums up her colleagues' opinion of Ruday by saying, "We in Student Affairs are excited about working with Bob Ruday. His dedication is already evident. How many people do you know who would start work a week before their contract begins, because they know their presence is needed? I have found Bob to be very supportive and very concerned about students and their needs."

## Peace Comes To Saint Leo



FLORIDA CATHOLIC PEACE MOVEMENT RELOCATES TO SAINT LEO ABBEY

Pax Christi-Florida, a regional branch of the International Catholic Peace Movement, has announced the relocation of its State Office to Saint Leo Abbey in Pasco County within the Catholic Diocese of St. Petersburg. The organization had previously been based at St. Augustine Church in Gainesville.

At the invitation of Abbot Patrick Shelton, OSB, Pax Christi has set up its office within the Abbey's retreat center facilities. John Frank, State Coordinator of PCF has also been hired by the Abbey to direct the retreat operation. Pax Christi-Florida hopes to eventually funnel much of its peace educational programming through the retreat and conference facilities at the Abbey.

Speaking of the new relationship, Abbot Patrick said, "Peacemaking has always been a central part of Benedictine spirituality. 'Pax' is the Benedictine motto. Those of us who have responded to the monastic vocation have a distinct role to play in the Church's witness to peace and justice in the nuclear age." Abbot Patrick, himself a member of Pax-Christi along with fellow-monk Fr. David Draim, was involved in the formation of a national group known as Benedictines for Peace.

As a regional branch of Pax Christi-USA, the Florida organization seeks to establish peacemaking as a priority of the Church's ministry in Florida. Pax Christi members commit themselves to a life guided by the Gospel principles of nonviolence and justice for all people. Since its inception in Florida in 1982, the movement has engaged in a variety of educational programs and activities that seek to integrate a Christian spirituality of peace with direct action around such issues as nuclear disarmament, Central America and capital punishment. As an International Catholic movement, the organization dates back to 1946 in post-war Europe.

Speaking of Pax Christi's mission, Frank said: "The 1983 Catholic Bishops Peace pastoral challenges the church to be at the service of peace. This challenge, they tell us, is not marginal to the Church's ministry, but lies at the very heart of its mission. This will require structures and programs for peace education and action on behalf of peace. Pax Christi is one such means for accomplishing that task."

"We in the Florida Pax Christi movement look forward to our new relationship with the monastic community of Saint Leo Abbey, as well as the Benedictine sisters of Holy Name Priory and the academic community of Saint Leo College. Peacemakers continually struggle with the need to integrate the contemplative with the activist element of their work. We are hopeful that our affiliation with the Benedictines will nurture a spirituality that grows out of the dialectic between prayer and action within the context of contemporary social reality."

## Coaches: 2 Runners: ?

At the start of this year, something happened to Saint Leo's cross-country program that hasn't happened before: There were more coaches than runners. Some coaches of other sports talk about "rebuilding their team" or "we're going through growing pains right now." Saint Leo's two new cross-country coaches will be using phrases like "starting from nothing at all and making something out of it." Instead of "a rebuilding of the team" a more accurate assessment would be a "rebirth of the team."

Gone are all-conference runners Matt Coyne and Ken Taylor. Between the men's and women's team there are a total of five runners coming back. To qualify as a team, you need five runners for both the men's and women's team. Both head coach Mike Duggan and assistant coach Bob Quarteroni are new this year. Duggan started out in cross-country as a runner and student assistant at Oshkosh High School in Wisconsin.

Coach Duggan has a bachelor of science degree from the University

of Wisconsin in journalism and a master's degree from the United States Sports Academy in Mobile, Ala. He is originally from Oconomowoc, Wisc.

"I don't expect us to win the U.F. (University of Florida) Invitational. I would like to see us have a close knit group with a pleasant atmosphere, have some fun along the way and work towards peaking at mid-season. Hopefully all this will carry over to the freshmen and sophomores for next year."

The second half of the coaching staff is Bob Quarteroni, the Director of College News at the College. Bob's cross-country experience is simple: "I ran a marathon at Atlantic City in 4 hours and 11 minutes last year."

Coach Quarteroni has a bachelor of arts in journalism from King's College (Pa.) and a master's from Penn State. He was the sports editor for the Centre Daily Times at University Park for seven years.

Monarch Notes: David Lee (a graduate from USF) will be the sports medicine assistant for the College. The Saint Leo Monarch Invitational is on Saturday, Sept. 20.

## Volleyball Set For '86

With six top recruits and six returning starters, the 1986 Saint Leo College women's volleyball team opens the season with a young team that has no juniors or seniors on the roster.

New Coach Sandi Patton is confident that the Monarch volleyball program is headed in the right direction. "I think we're going to surprise some people this year," Patton said. "Since we have some very good athletes here, I think that our youth movement is a positive thing that won't hurt us by any means," she added.

Patton said that she hopes to improve on last year's 11-12 (3-5 in the Sunshine State Conference) record. "Our goal is to finish third or better in the conference," Patton said.

Patton said that Tampa and Florida Southern have always been the top two teams in the conference and Rollins has been third. "We want a shot at those three teams. We want a run at them to try and knock them out," she added.

According to Patton, in order to place in the top three in the conference, the Monarch freshmen will have to develop their skills rapidly. "Our freshmen do have good

athletic skills," Patton said.

Julie Hanes, a 5'11" hitter from Brandon, leads the recruits. "Julie is an excellent all-around player who knows the game and communicates well with the other players," Patton said.

Other recruits include Nikki Townsend of Land O'Lakes, Tonya Dix of Seffner, Kim Otis of St. Augustine and Jeanne Brinkman of Tampa.

Leading the returning starters are hitter Sandy Hotwagner of Oak Forest, Ill.; and Susan Weicherding, an all SSC all-around performer last year from Brandon. Returning hitters are Vicky Herma of South Bend, Ind., and Missy Martin from New Port Richey. Mary Majewski, also from South Bend, and Kathy Guerra of Pompano Beach are returning setters.

According to Patton, the Monarchs will rely on team height. "We have very good hitters and blockers," Patton said.

The Monarchs will be tested this year by a typically tough schedule, highlighted by three tournaments and the always tough SSC foes. The first Monarch home contest is against Rollins Sept. 16 at 8 p.m.

## Soccer Team Shoots For Winning Season

The Saint Leo College soccer team will blend experience with youth under Coach Hal Henderson this season.

Seven starters are among 13 returning players from last year's 6-10-2 team. Five Monarch losses last season were by only one goal.

According to Henderson, who enters his third season as Monarch mentor, the Saint Leo soccer program is headed in the right direction.

"I feel I'm on track with my original goals," Henderson said.

"Our goal for the first year was to straighten out the program and respectability was our goal for the second year."

"This year we'll play more teams on an even level and beat some teams we haven't been able to beat in the past," Henderson said. "We're going to get Saint Leo above the .500 level this year," he added.

Leading the Monarch offense is junior Jim Murdaugh. "He racked up nine goals and six assists last year and we're expecting big things from him this year," Henderson said.

Lone senior Kevin Wilson anchors the defense. Other returning starters include junior Rusty Murdaugh, Kirk LaBelle, Glenn Bialy and Chris Croghan. Sophomore Ken Finch, the back-up last season, will be in goal.

Despite an experienced lineup, youth is still a keynote on this year's team. Top recruits include All-Hillsborough County midfielder Mauricio Jaramillo from Tampa-Hillsborough High School; Mike Philpott, a defender from Tampa King High; midfielder Jeff Scooler from Leto High; and Midfielder Scott McFadden from highly ranked Ridgewood High. Other area recruits include Jon Bonin from Springstead High and Joe Wagner from Ridgewood High. Coming to Saint Leo from Virginia Beach, Virginia is Brad Alexander.

According to Henderson, the Monarch's face a tough schedule this year. "We'll be playing always-tough Sunshine State Conference opponents including perennially ranked Tampa, Rollins and Saint Thomas. We'll also clash with top
