### Is Radiation Beneficial?

(RP) Hormesis is an expression used in physiology, referring to the rather remarkable fact that small doses of many poisons are stimulatory. This has been recognized for chemical and biological toxins: for esample, tiny doses of antibiotics will stimulate the growth of relatively dormant bacteria that they were supposed to kill.

One of the internationally recognized experts on hormesis is Dr. T.D. Luckey, professor of biochemistry at the University of Missouri, who in 1945, discovered hormesis in dietary antibiotics. In 1969, he was intrigued by data suggesting that Japanese who received 11 to 120 roentgens of radiation in the 1945 atomic bomb blasts, appeared to live longer than those who received either larger doses or none at all.

After investigation, Luckey found a tremendous amount of uncollected literature supporting his hypothesis, and the scholarly book he published 11 years later is likely to remain the standard reference for many years to come.

[Hormesis With Ionizing Radiation, CRC Publishing Co., Boca Raton Fl.) Both Luckey's research and lab experiments indicate that "radiation is essential for optimum reproduction." His conclusions are carefully worded, supported by overwhelming evidence, and unambiguous. For example, "The argument that low doses (of radiation) give harmful effects in pro-portion to the dosage is invalid."

"Radiation hormesis can provide more efficient use of resources, maximum production of grains, vegetables, and meat, and incresed health and longevity.'

### **Good News Department**

(RP) At least 11 things-popcorn, for instance-actually do not cause cancer, according to the American Cancer Society, which is launching a campaign to counter a widespread notion that "everything causes cancer." A new brochure entitled Eleven Things That Don't Cause Cancer contains

such things as fresh air, high-fiber foods like popcorn, and lean meats such as chicken.

Vegetables are OK, too, and exercise is not a cancer risk. Also included are sitting in the shade and a good laugh.

### Another Look At Military Forces

(RP) Director of Defense Research & Engineering, William J. Perry, in the 1979 report to Congress, states that technology is America's "strongest advantage" and that precision guided munitions achieve the "single greatest potential for force multiplication." He states that "we can greatly enhance our ability to deter war without having to compete tank for tank, missile for missile, with the Soviet Union.'

Secretary of Defense Harold Brown stated in a talk to the Commonwealth Club of San Francisco: "We don't necessarily care whether the Soviets have nore tanks than we do-we do care whether, in the event of Soviet attack, we are able to throw it back, rather than simply outdistancing the Soviets in numbers of tanks or any other single item.

We could duplicate Soviet capabilities, but it would not make sense to do so. Our interests are different. We do not need 4 million men, 45,999 tanks or 10,999 surface-to-air missile launchers. We need whatever it takes to protect our interests.

According to the defense-posture statement made by Dr. Brown to the Congress in 1981, "The best estimate of survivability of U.S. ICBMs is approximately 25% in 1981, 20% in 1982, 10% in 1984, and 5% in 1986.'

### "Small Borrowers" Are Crying For Help on **Interest Rates**

Everywhere I go in Florida people tell me they cannot afford home mortgages. They cannot afford to finance a car. They cannot buy farm equipment and supplies. The high cost of financing has eliminated their

Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volcker. Membership would include chairmen of the Council of Economic Advisers and the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, the Secretaries of Commerce, Agriculture and Housing and Urban Development, and three citizens representing small business. housing and small farms to be appointed by the President. The committee would also produce guidelines placing limits on the huge amounts of credit being used for conglomerate takeovers and mergers. What I'm seeking is a dual prime rate system such as was set up during the 1973-74 credit crunch when lenders set aside some money to lend to small borrowers at lower rates Will this work? It did before, and I believe our lenders will respond in good faith to a flexible, voluntary set of guidelines as to how much they will lend and at what rates. Bankers are responsible businessmen who care about their communities and the nation's economic health, and I think we could count on their support. Unless there is some sort of near-term relief, there will be tremendous pressure on Washington to either roll the presses and inflate the money supply or give in to mandatory credit allocation. These are not desirable options.

Small businessmen are telling me it is difficult to get credit at any price. Yet, they see tens of billions of dollars made available to huge companies for takeovers that produce little, if any, economic benefits for the country as a whole.

Readily-available capital is essential to small bussinesses struggling to compete in the market, but when we get into a credit crunch like we face today, it is the small borrowers who get squeezed out.

For many this problem has reached the crisis point; for some small businessmen, particularly builders, it's too late. The calls for help are increasing daily.

I have just introduced legislation which, if approved, would provide some relief, I believe. It would create a Committee on Interest Rates and Availability of Credit to establish voluntary guidelines for lending institutions to assure an adequate flow of credit to small borrowers. My proposal calls for these guidelines to be set by Oct.1.

For the past five years Saint Leo College has been doing nickle-dime repairs on all six of the tennis courts.

These courts were asked to be repaired last April but the coach was told that after the enrollment was up over a thousand, they would be able to do it financially. The reason the college is having to

do this asphalt and painting repair is because of the damage from the summer rain. No one was here to sweep the rain puddles off the courts. This resulted in the rain eroding the asphalt away.

The black splatches you see on the courts by St. Edwards are asphalt. There will be three layers of asphalt paved on the courts. After the

asphalt is hard and dry three coats of greenpaint will be applied. For the first time the courts will be outlined professionally. The Monarch asked Coach Crosby to comment on the repair work. He replied, "I'm very happy about having courts we can now be proud of. We'll be able to have collegiate matches on these courts without being embarassed when other teams come to compete here at Saint Leo's.'




School is going well. I'll really start learning something when I get some sleep though, so far I have pulled about six "all-nighters".





So the Sarasotian, who is marred and lives in Hillsboro County, will continue to preach his sermon on society, to society, as long as there is a society.


### Old Greece Visited By Saint Leo College





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




Stephanie Phillips may be one of the most talented young ladies at Saint Leo College. Why is this so? Because she is a national champion in baton twirling.

Stephanie has been baton twirling since she was six years old. Since then, she has won eleven State Championships and five National She has also Championships. coveted the title of Miss Majorette of Florida, four times. This year she won the National Collegiate Two Baton Twirling Championship and the nineteen year old Two Baton Twirling Championship in Indianapolis, Indiana. 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practices three hours a day, and three months before the competition is slated to take place. Her competition teacher is Mr. Brooke Going. Mr Going comes from California to teach Stephanie the steps necessary for competition baton twirling. He has been her teacher for eight years. He is one of the best baton twirling teachers in the U.S. because of his creativity and talent. He will be in Dade City next week to prepare Stephanie for her next competition.

Presently, Stephanie teaches two classes on baton twirling to grade school and junior high school students. In these classes she is teaching Basic Fundamentals and hopes one of her students will be able to perform this year. She teaches Summer Camps across the country in New York, Mississippi and three places in Florida -Daytona, St. Petersburg and Orlando. These camps last three and a half days.

When asked what her most thrilling moments in baton were she replied, "When I won my first National Championship at 16, and when I performed for a basketball game at the Universtiy of Florida and received a standing ovation." When questioned about what her most disappointing experiences were she answered, "Two weeks before the Nationals I pulled a hamstring and one year I lost the Miss Majorette of Florida title by half of a point."

When asked what a future goal of her's would be Stephanie responded, "I would like to be a teacher of baton in Europe during the summer."

So said Coach John Swart after the Saint Leo Monarchs had defeated the Clearwater Christian College with a score of six goals to one. "They will have to play well with no slip-ups," he added. Well, the Monarchs did slip-up, at least eight times when Tampa's attack overcame their defense and placed the ball in their net. At the end of the frist half the score was 5-0. Saint Leo had taken no shots at Tampa's goal. They were out-played and out-smarted on many occasions. Basically, there was little opposition for Tampa. It was not until the second half that the Monarchs began gaining momentum. Their presence on the field was at last felt by the Tampa players. Five minutes into the second half, Stephen Martel #29 of Saint Leo, after a good pass by #11 Michael Sears, placed the ball in the back of the net. The Tampa players were beginning to get careless with their hands and feet. Two of their players were given yellow cards for
