Sadat's Assassination Discussed On "Kaleidoscope"

SAINT LEO FL.-The impact of the assassination of Egypt's President Anwar Sadat on the Middle East was the topic of discussion on the October 25 "Kaleidoscope" program which aired over WTVT, Channel 13, at 8:30 a.m.

DR. JOHN J. McTAGUE, JR., Associate Professor of History at Saint Leo College, who traveled to Egypt this summer, gave his viewpoint of the political situation in Egypt at that time, enhanced by his expertise in Middle East history.

McTague holds a Ph.D from the State University of New York at

Buffalo, a Master of Arts degree from Fordham University and a Bachelor of Arts degree from Siena College and has been a member of the faculty at Saint Leo College since 1976.

Program moderator, Charles Hampton, delved into Sadat's personal career as President of Egypt, the open relations policy of Egypt with Israel, the impact of Sadat's assassination and how it may have affected the sale of AWAC planes by the United States to Saudi Arabia, and other pertinent issues with Dr. McTague.

Scholarship Bank Announces New Scholarship Grant Programs For 1981 Academic Year

Now is the time for students to apply for new scholarship and grant programs available through private sources, according to The Scholarship Bank.

Director Steve Danz announced today that several new programs were accepting applications for the 1981-82 school year. Among the new programs:

BPW Foundation: Offers financial aid for the "non traditional female student" in any field. A number of the available scholarships are for older students who have been out of school for a number of years.

Exceptional Student Fellowships: This nation-wide undergraduate scholarship program offers aid in accounting, pre-law, math, engineering, computer sciences and

business-related fields. The donor has also indicated a number of summer job opportunities.

According to the director, the new limitations on federally-funded financial aid make it mandatory for students interested in private funding to apply early. The Scholarship Bank specializes print-out of the private, off-campus and non-governmental financing sources available. There is a modest fee for the service. Students desiring further information and a questionnaire to key into the data bank of over 25,000 sources should send a stamped, self addressed envelope to: Scholarship Bank, 10100 Santa Monica Blvd., #750, Los Angeles, CA. 90067.

Governor's Internship Program Looking For Applicants

Gain valuable experience, obtain college credit and receive \$1000 while taking an active role in Florida's government.

Representatives from the Governor's Office will be at the University of Central Florida on November 3 to conduct interviews. Call area code nine zero, four, eight eight-two eight one seven to schedule an appointment. Or stop by the Monarch Office and pick up an application form.

When did the Governor's Internship Program begin?

November 1978.

Who is eligible?

Juniors, seniors and graduate students either attending a Florida university or retaining Florida residency. A "B" average is strongly recommended.

How are students selected?

Students are selected by an interview screening process which consists of two interviews with the Governor's Office Staff. The first interviews are conducted at convenient locations near your home university.

What academic interests are encompassed in the program?

A wide range of interests including such areas as History, Government, English, Public Administration.

Where do students work and how long are the internships?

All placements are located in Tallahassee within various units of the Governor's Office. The internship program parallels the academic calendars of Florida colleges and universities.

What types of positions are available?

Positions are in offices such as Cabinet and Legislative Affairs, Planning and Budgeting, Minority Affairs and the Energy Office.

Can participants in the program receive academic credit?

Yes, college credit can be obtained on an individual basis at the college discretion of each university based on departmental requirements. Also, some students do attend class.

Is there any compensation for work as an intern?

Yes, students receive a stipend of \$1000, issued directly to the intern during the semester to help defray tuition expenses.

A Saturday bus service from Saint Leo College to Tampa has been announced by Saint Leo Security. The first trial run will be on Saturday, October 31, at 10:00 a.m., 2:00 p.m., and 6:00 p.m., with the bus leaving from Security and Marmion and Snyder dorms. Drop off points will be at Tampa Bay Mall and University Square Mall.

Security warned that, "for this service to be a weekly event, it has to be self supporting. The students

must utilize it in order for it to break even." The cost of the venture will start out at \$4.00 per person, round-trip. The more people who use the service, the more the price will go down. Security has estimated the cost could go down to \$1.00 per person if the three Saturday bus services are full bus loads.

Students will also be able to hook up with the city transit from the University Square Mall to the downtown Tampa area.

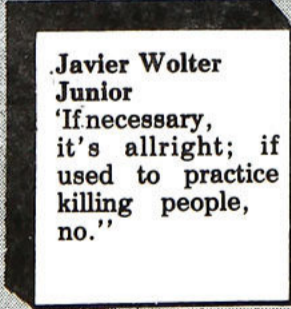

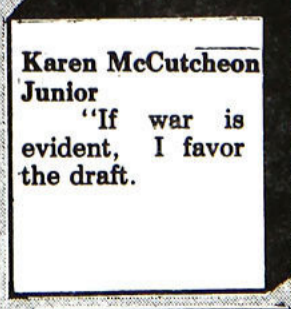

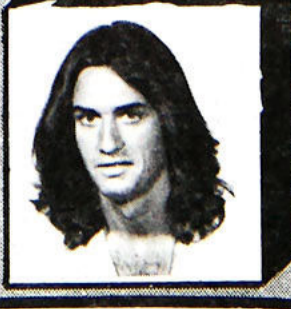

Is There A Draft In Your Future?

Can you feel the draft breathing down your neck?

The Central Committee for Conscientious Objectors warns that the reinstatement of draft inductions may be closer than you think.

"The resumption of draft registration for 18-year-old males makes it very important that all Americans think through their beliefs about the problems of war and the draft," said Larry Spears, Director of CCCO's Youth Campaign.

Also, the Supreme Court ruled on June 25 that registering men but not women for the draft does not violate the U.S. Constitution. According to Prof. Peter Goldberger, an attorney and teacher at the Villanova University School of Law, Villanova, Pa, "This decision brings us a step closer both to prosecutions of non-registrants and to resumption of draft inductions." The exclusion of women from registration will make it easier for Congress to reinstate the draft.

One consequence of the Court's decision, commented Goldberger, is that it should remove any doubts that anyone may have had about the close connections between registration, a "real draft", and mobilization for war.

"The position argued by the government's lawyers and adopted by Justice Rehnquist flatly contradicts the bland public relations statement of Selective Service that registration and "the draft" are altogether different propositions," said Goldberger.

During the oral argument of the case, Solicitor General Wade H. McCree, Jr. admitted that "you can't separate" the questions of registration and the draft. The Court described registration as "the first step in a united and continuous process designed to raise an army speedily and efficiently."

CCCO is also concerned by what it perceives as President Ronald

Reagan's retreat from his 1980 statement of opposition to draft registration.

"The increasing likelihood of a draft," said Spears, "is causing concern for a growing number of high school and college students."

With the elimination of the student deferment in the mid-70's, the classification available to the greatest number of young people is conscientious objection. A conscientious objector is someone who is opposed to participating in war on the basis of deeply held moral, ethical, or religious beliefs. During the time of a draft, anyone recognized by their draft board as a conscientious objector would then serve two years doing alternate civilian service.

Spears stated that over 27,000 draft-age individuals have already registered with CCCO through its conscientious objector card. "These cards are available, free of charge, from CCCO, P.O. Box 15796, Philadelphia, Pa 19103. they simply state 'Because of my beliefs about war, I am opposed to participating in the military.'"

"The usefulness of this card," commented Spears, "is that it provides a record of an individual's opposition to war. This COcard will help to demonstrate to the military that hundreds of thousands of young people will not serve in the armed forces. Support for conscientious objection, along with the large number of non-registrants and the vocal ANTI-DRAFT MOVEMENT MAY HELP TO DETER Congress from establishing a peace-time draft."

CCCO was founded in 1948 as the Central Committee for Conscientious Objectors and has served continuously since then as a national, non-profit agency counseling young Americans facing the prospect of military service, and those already in the military.

From The Office Of Senator Lawton Chiles

Spraying paraquat to destroy marijuana crops in Colombia and other foreign countries, using U.S aid to do so, has been approved by the Senate.

The provision, reversing a prohibition against such support that has existed since 1978, was initiated by U.S. Sen. Lawton Chiles of Florida and made a part of the foreign aid authorization bill passed last night by the Senate.

Many law enforcement officials have called paraquat spraying a key to gaining control of the massive drug smuggling industry that has overwhelmed the state of Florida.

Chiles agrees.

"The most effective means of stopping the drugs is at their source," he said. "Any enforcement strategy that does not include an effort to cut off the drug supplies in producing countries such as Colombia is doomed to failure."

Chiles' legislation also requires the federal Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to monitor any spraying program for health effects. The prohibition was imposed because of fears that sprayed Mexican crops might be health damaging to users in this country.

Sen. Chiles cites federal studies by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (now HHS), the Department of Agriculture and a United Nations Narcotics Laboratory study group as proving negligible effects.

"The real damage is coming from the crime and corruption caused by smuggling and the health risk resulting from increased use of more and more potent marijuana," he said.

I am in favor of having a draft system in the United States. The protest of the 60's; the disenchantment of the American people concerning Viet Nam; and the general social unrest of the era caused many changes. One major change was the elimination of the draft system. Justified or not, eliminating the draft system did serve to pacify the American people. Now, as world events seem to move towards "who's carrying the biggest stick", we have to accept the fact that there is a need for highly qualified personnel to meet the demands of leadership. The only way we can obtain individuals is through a draft system. Ideally, we could become isolationists and not concern ourselves with what other countries are doing, but we all know that our direction at the moment will not permit us this luxury. Under the current volunteer system we are not attracting individuals with potential

expertise. What alternative do we have? If we are to remain a powerful Nation, we need qualified manpower as a deterrent factor.

Having lived in numerous foreign countries, I become aware of the importance of living in America and being an American. I, for one, advocate "Freedom at all cost". I like the way we live, the ability to make our own choices and the opportunity to travel freely, to mention only a few freedoms. In order to retain these advantages we must ask ourselves: "Do I have a responsibility to my country?" Freedom and responsibility are two sides of the same coin. You can't have one without the other. One way to serve our Nations' needs and fulfill our responsibility for living in a free country is through military service.

At issue is the question concerning the method which military manpower requirements are to be met. Either we draft individuals or induce them to enlist by offering sufficient rewards (i.e. wages and benefits) in the labor market. For several reasons, I prefer the latter of these two choices.

First, assuming some given level of manpower, a draft shifts some of the real burden away from taxpayers and onto the individuals drafted. From an economic perspective, being drafted implies that one is forced to forego a better alternative. Higher wages could be offered, thereby meeting any enlistment quota. The difference between the wages paid draftees and the higher wages necessary for inducing voluntary enlistment represents a real loss for those drafted. By the same logic, government pays higher wages than necessary, therefore, qualified applicants stand in line for the jobs.

Second, the market approach offers more flexibility. By manipulating wages and benefits, new entrants can be attracted to, or existing personnel can be retained in, any specific component of the military labor pool. If the ready reserves require beefing up, increase the incentive; if skilled technicians are leaving increased incentives will retain them.

Third, a draft requires that arbitrary criteria be established as a basis for eligibility. Questions concerning sex, age, physical and mental condition, religious preference, etc. must be answered; the criteria finally chosen must necessarily be discriminatory. Recall the many loopholes in the draft system in the past.

Finally, the market alternative is more consistent with the ideals of a free society. Voluntary choice, rather than governmental force, better serves these ideals.

The advice she gives to other students is to: "Set your priorities straight, but leave some time for yourself."

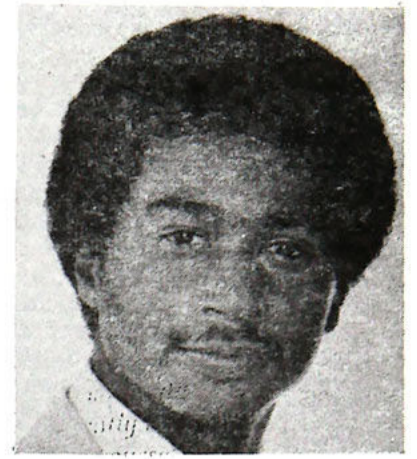
