Ideas from Yesterday-Thoughts for Tomorrow

The following editorial appeared in the SPIRIT of 70 last year and because of the importance of it we are re-printing it here in the MONARCH this year. The letter following it is from Father Robert, it speaks for itself.

There are only two purposes by which power from a higher authority can be delegated to the members of this society; 1) to provide for the common good of the community, and 2) to prevent harm and annoyances to others. Their own gains are not sufficient reasons to warrant this authority. Does the administration of this college have the right to dictate certain principles just because; it will make them happier, in their opinion it is the right thing to do, and simply because they feel it is the right thing without actually giving reasons for their actions. I think not!

I challenge each and every one of you to speak out, to demand reasons for their actions instead of idly sitting back and grumbling about the behavior of the administration of this college. This accomplishes nothing! If our opinions of legislation in this college are not heard and recognized (not necessarily agreed with) then we are being deprived of the basic rights upon which this country was established. The administration of this college has indicated that they are willing to consider our opinions if only we will present them.

I dare each of you to demand the "whys" behind every action and every rule that is

created by our administration. There is no reason why we should accept their policies and then do nothing but complain about the "new rules". Demand their reasons! Ask yourself, why did they do this? Challenge yourself, are they justified? And if you feel they are not, then ask yourself, if I don't like it, what am I going to do about it?

But few do challenge them. If there is a new rule to be passed, if there is an issue brought before the administration, we must present our views concerning it. But, how do we do this? There are approximately 515 freshmen. Can we not unite and through our elected officials voice our opinions to the administration? The administration owes us the respect to listen to our opinions and we in turn should respect theirs. We must step back out of the picture and take an objective view of the policy in question and (even if refused by the administration) if we truly feel we are justified in our requests, we must present it to them again and again.

Why don't the students show more initiative in presenting their ideas to the Administration? As members of the College community, the students do have a say in college policy which affects them.

The present structure of the College affords the student the opportunity to make known his ideas on many matters. The Student Government is not an arm of the Administration; it belongs to the students, so why not utilize it? Week after week very few, if

any, students attend the Student Government meetings. I would like to think that so many students would attend that the meetings would need to be moved into the cafeteria rather than tucked away in a corner of one of the lounges. What about your class meetings? How many attend them? Why not bring pressure to bear on your elective class officers to do something? How many students know about the SEAB meetings? As with most things, interest must show on the "grass-roots" level before it can have any influence on the higher.

In your desire to make changes--and undoubtedly some changes are needed--certain principles must be adhered to. Any changes must be in keeping with sound Christian principles, spring from unselfish and sincere motives, promote the welfare of the College, and uphold its image. Moreover, the student who en-

dorses a change must put his reputation on the firing line and not quail when required to back his endorsement. The present code of dress, which was to be student-enforced, is a point in fact.

In closing, be assured that the Administration of the College is open to any and all suggestions which arise from a genuine desire to help.


...dog nearly itched to death
