## ANNUAL JAYCEE FUN DAY

SAN ANTONIO - This small central Florida city is looking forward to November 4 and the Annual Jaycee FUN DAY which this year features "Fun for everyone - 1 to 100". The main event around which FUN DAY is built is the Rattlesnake Roundup beginning October 30 and culminating November 4 at which time prizes will be awarded for all live rattlers over three and a half feet in length. A \$50.00 prize will be awarded the person bringing in the heaviest rattler. The Roundup is intended to attract professional snake hunters in an effort to lower the rattler population in the surrounding area. The Jaycees will dispose of the critters to institutions which will use them to prepare medicines which use their venom as a base.

The Family Fun will consist of an afternoon of planned activities in San Antonio's City Park, beginning at noon and continuing till dark. Throughout the afternoon, Art Bass, a daredevil snake expert who operates the Living Wonders Serpantarium in Titusville will perform the dangerous feat of milking the snakes brought in during the Roundup.

At 2:30 p.m. the first elimination heat race in the Jaycee International Gopher races will be held. Heats will be held during the afternoon on the half hour with winners of these races coming shell to shell to determine the overall winner. This event is steadily building in interest with brightly painted gophers being entered from all over the nation as well as one which will be prodded on by Harry Yiasemides of the Island of Cyprus. It is rumored that a gopher driver from Great Britain will appear on the scene for training exercises soon.

Two of the prime contenders - 'Fern' and 'Culligan Ma'am' - recently appeared on TV where a grueling test of speed and stamina showed Fern the winner by a nose.

Other items of interest are a chicken Bar-B-Que scheduled for 5 PM till 8, and at 9 PM an open air record hop hosted by the disc-jockey Mike Puto of the Lion's Den.

A family of Miccosukee Indians will be on hand throughout the day wearing their colorful native dress and displaying their wares from a genuine Indian Chickee (hut).

All in all it looks like another great FUN DAY for the San Antonio Jaycees and those who will come from miles around to witness the days activities.

## THE ARCH BISHOP

Archbishop Joseph Patrick Hurley, who was bishop of St. Augustine, died Monday, October 30, at Mercy Medical Center in Orlando. Hurley became ill while attending a recent Synod of Bishops in Rome and returned home Wednesday for treatment. Funeral services were held at noon Friday. A Requiem Mass was celebrated at the Cathedral of St. Augustine. The service was preceded at 11:30 a.m. by an Office of the Dead. Burial was in San Lorenzo Cemetery, St. Augustine.

In 1919, Hurley was ordained and his first major assignment was secretary to Archbishop Edward Mooney. Fifteen years later, he became an attache of the secretariate of state in

Rome. Also in 1934, he was named domestic prelate and was given the title of Rt. Rev. Msgr. In 1941, he was made U.S. representative on the General Superior Council of the Pontifical Association for the Propagation of Faith. Four years later, Hurley was appointed Papal Nuncio for Belgrade, Yugoslavia.

Pope Pius XII named him to be the sixth bishop of St. Augustine on August 19, 1940.

Governor Claude Kirk spoke highly of the archbishop by saying, "Forthright in his convictions, dedicated in church and himself in the many projects he undertook. Florida is indeed fortunate to have had such a man among the religious leaders of our state."

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
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# SOCCER TEAM WINS AGAIN

Last Sunday, after four frustrating months of watching Richard Petty and his now famous Plymouth pass them by, Ford finally won a race on the NASCAR circuit. In winning the American 500, which was the last major stock car race of the year, Ford had seven cars finishing in the top ten.

Even with their overwhelming victory on Sunday, the racing season has been a nightmare for Ford. On the NASCAR circuit, Ford was in the winners circle fewer times than the old grey mare.

Ford's nightmare was Chrysler's dream. Richard Petty and his blue Plymouth dominated this year's NASCAR circuit from start to finish.
