THE KIND SQUARES USE TO MAKE MODEL AIRPLANES

Each year around the country of the United States a new kick is discovered by the teen-age generation. Such have been the mixing of Aspirin and Coke, the eating of Benzedrex Inhalers, and the inhalation of lighter fluid fumes. One of the newest forms of shall we say, "getting high", is glue sniffing more commonly called "huffing". This has already passed through the Northern states and is now becoming popular in the Southern states. Acquiring possession of glue is rather easy. It is not as unattainable as most other drugs which may explain for it's widespread use.

A fourteen-year-old glue sniffer explains: "You take a tube of plastic glue, the kind squares use to make model airplanes, you squeeze it all out in a handkerchief, see. Then you roll up the handkerchief into a sort of a tube, put the end in your mouth and breath through it. Man." (Time '62) (After a few years of use, it was found that 'a better head' was produced if the glue was squeezed into a paper bag, the bag held up to the nose and mouth, and deeply breathed.) And it's dangerous. An early report states that "It has a definite effect on kidneys." (made by Doctor Alan K. Done, director of the Poisin Center, Salt Lake City Hospital intently habit forming and that a tolerance is built up and more is needed.

It is not actually the glue itself but the volatile solvents that make it dangerous and intoxicating. Acetone, Butyl Acetate, and Toluene are the basic intoxicants. Of the some-odd sixteen thousand people handled by Robert Cooper, Chief of the Street Club Project in New York City, he claims that 15% were sniffing glue and the number is in-

creasing. In Denver, 1960, there were thirty arrested on glue-sniffing charges. In 1962, one hundred thirty four were arrested, same charges.

Kicks are cheap but the effects are violent. The goof ball user loses coordination, slurs words, and may very possibly kill himself with an overdose. A later report on glue-sniffing contradicts a previous statement made. (Newsweek '62) "Glue sniffers, while not physiologically addicted can do equal damage (as the goof ball users)". Some of the prover effects are burned out nose membranes, liver damage, perforations in the gall bladder, destruction of the bone marrow, blindness and possible, very possible, death. According to one psychologist working with the Juvenile Court in Washington, D.C., personalities of glue-sniffing teens resemble those of alcoholic adults. Says Doctor Lawrence Frost: "There is the same history of dependency.

(They are) persons who can't face up to things."

I have given some of the facts, opinions, and statements of notable authorities on the subject of glue-sniffing. Now I would like to give a description of the actual process and hallucogenic state acquired by the inhalation of these deadly fumes.

The glue is placed in a paper bag with the edges rolled down. The bag is placed around the nose and mouth and held tightly in place. The fumes are breathed heavily in through the nose and exhaled through the mouth. The first sensation is that of watery eyes. This stops as soon as the nasal passage grows accustomed to the intoxicating fumes. The next feeling experienced seems as though you are being 'glued together'. The whole body becomes numb to the point that you feel nothing at all in your whole system. You can't move but who cares because the dreams are so 'great' at this point

that you see, hear, or sense nothing. A great blackness comes over you and the color flashes are there, just like you read about. It's just like you're here but you're a million miles away. Don't knock it until you try it." This is the point when the huffer becomes a con artist. It's too late then, but he could care less. With his head buried in a bag he doesn't see the outside world anyway. Nor does he care.....





DEAN OF MEN ADDRESSES RESIDENTS ON RESPONSIBILITIES

 During the past week Dr. Rodwick, Dean of Men, spoke to all male resident students. His subject was student responsibility. During these talks, which were given in small groups, Dr. Rodwick pointed out that this year's St. Leo college student is enjoying more freedom than ever before. Along with this freedom, the student has the responsibility of not abus-

ing it. Are we as college students facing up to this responsibility?

Most of us appreciate the freedoms that have been granted us this year. Some of us feel that the college is still too restrictive and that more freedoms should be granted. All of us would miss them if the freedoms we enjoy now were taken away. Can we who feel this way, justify the actions of the 5% who cannot handle the

responsibility that they have now?

As Dean of Men, Dr. Rodwick stated that: "I will and must maintain a definite position on the enforcement of student policy. Unless all of the students comply with this policy there will be no new freedoms granted."

Saint Leo is a small college and because of this, each and everyone of us are integral parts of this institution. The actions of one

of us reflects on all of us. If these actions are irresponsible such as drinking, ect: the whole student body will suffer. The image of Saint Leo College will suffer. You, as an individual will suffer.

Do we by OUR manner of dress, by OUR action, by OUR speech, present a positive image of OUR college? That is the question that each of us, as individuals, must ask ourselves.

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ANOTHER WAY TO FINISH THE TRIMESTER EARLY

A special message to colleges and universities from the Chemical Specialties Manufacturers association, Fifty East Forty-First Street Street, New York, New York 10017.

Reports which indicate that aerosol glass-chillers have been implicated in the death of seven persons in the sixteen to twenty-one year age group in the last year are of deep concern to the aerosol industry. The fluorocarbon in these products reportedly was collected in a balloon and then the concentrated vapors inhaled. The user apparently expected an intoxication or similar experience. Since fluorocarbons are regarded as relatively non-toxic and safe for use in aerosols, students may believe that confining the concentrated vapor in a balloon to inhale, while excluding oxygen, is also harmless. This is not the case; it may have fatal consequences. Thus, this appeal to you to explain to students that this gross misuse - deliberate inhalation of the highly concentrated vapors has caused death. Undoubtedly, when the students are made aware of this possible consequence, the practice will cease.

It is not known how widespread this fad is, and each school is asked to judge whether a reporting of the facts to the students in the school is indicated. There is always the risk of creating an interest in something that is considered to be new and unusual for producing abnormal mental or physical stimulation.

The tragedy of a death is sufficient justification for the industry to ask your cooperation in helping to avoid the exposure of unknowing students to these possibly serious consequences. While the highlighting of a problem may result in creating interest in it rather than terminating its use, the industry has, because of these deaths involving glass-chillers, decided to make this information available to responsible persons who have intimate contact with those in the sixteen to twenty-one year age group.

Cagers Win Opener - Many Mistakes But Aggressive Play

Mike O'Brien scored 27 points and won a place in the starting lineup as the Monarchs defeated the talented Florida Memorial squad 119-74 last Friday night.

The 6'7" 215 lb. Chicagoan turned in his fine performance in only about two quarters of play. Dave Lewis (19), Dan Makosky (14), and Clyde Alexander (11) were the other double figure scorers. The game was a real crowd-pleaser but Coach Howie Fagan had other thoughts.

"We made many mistakes, we'll have to improve in all areas," Fagan explained, "but Lewis and Alexander excelled with their aggressive play. With Clyde's backboard control we can limit our opponents to one shot for perhaps three of ours," he pointed out.

Biscayne College provides Leo's next competition tonight and Saturday in Miami. Their 6'3" 185 lb. ace Bob Fairclough who averaged 21 points per game against the Monarchs last year led them to an overwhelming victory over Drake College last week. Two juniors, one senior, one sophomore, and one freshman comprise the Biscayne team which lost two out of three to Saint Leo's last season.

The PBX board is custom engineered to aid Saint Leo in handling the communication's problem more efficiently.

Manning the board are two regular attendants and student help from 8:00 am to 10:00 pm all week.

All incoming calls are extended by a key set to the station indicated. Stations (other phones) on campus are able to exchange calls by using a transfer button. All stations can reach outside by just dialing nine.

This system links all campus phones to a common intercom.

Five manual PBX switchboards located in the library, social science office, Holy Name, student affairs office, and the new science building will aid in answering calls.

Mrs. Joanne Lord, Florida Telephone Corporation, Leesburg Office, trained attendants for the job.

Students desiring private phones are asked to call the local telephone company for information.

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ACCREDITATION


Saint Leo College, which graduated its first four-year liberal arts class in April, received full accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools on Wednesday, November 29, 1967.

Accreditation of the coeducational College was announced at the Southern Association's annual meeting in Dallas, Texas, and will be retroactive to the first graduating class.

The swift accreditation was made possible by a change in Association rulings last year, making a new four-year college eligible to be accredited after graduating its first class. Association examiners spent several days on Saint Leo College's campus this Fall and during the Fall of 1966.

The Rev. Stephen Herrmann, President of Saint Leo College, telephoned first news of accreditation from Dallas where he was attending the Association's annual meeting.

"In all humility, it is still a very great honor to thus receive full membership among institutions of higher learning at the first possible moment of eligibility," Father Stephen said.



KARATE TEAM SPONSORS OPEN TOURNAMENT

Last Sunday (Dec. 3), the Saint Leo College Karate Team played host to some thirty visiting teams who came from all over Florida to participate in the first "Open Tournament" ever to be held at Saint Leo. The tournament was said, by many experts, to have been perhaps the best tournament held in Florida to date.

Only one team from the original five that had been entered by the college fought

their way to the semifinals. That team was Team A which was composed of some of the finest Brown Belts on the College Squad fought excellently until their entrance into the final competition. It seemed to me, that the team lost the momentum they had been building up with each previous round of elimination. Without this momentum they invariably lost their next two fights and were eliminated from the competi-

Harrington Appointed Chairman

On Tuesday evening, Dec. 5, 1967, at the open meeting of the Student Government Association, Chris Hoff announced the formation of the Fact Finding Committee. Dennis J. Harrington was appointed chairman and instructed to choose his own people. Mr. Harrington's choices are as follows: John Dux, Resident Advisor of Benoit Hall; Thomas Smith, Advisor in St. Edward's Hall; Donna Gill, Advisor in the New Dorm; Robert Quinn, Sophomore S.G.A. representative; Peter DeLuca, writer for the Monarch; Edward Baker, Freshman Day Student.

The essential purpose of the committee is to find answers to the questions and problems of the students of Saint Leo College.

The committee has stipulated that it will follow a set procedure. This procedure will be as follows: 1) receive problems in writing from the student body; 2) check all sources of information in order to find a solution; 3) get concrete answer which must and will be definite, concise and clear; 4) conduct a special gripe session with interested students; 5) a suggestion box will be put in the student center to aid in receiving the questions and problems; and 6) all questions and answers will be put in the records of the S.G.A.

It is imperative that the students realize that their questions and problems must be submitted in writing with their signature and that the answers of the committee will be published in the Monarch and no where else.

IS THERE CENSORSHIP?

The Student Government Association, realizing the prominent role that academics plays in college life, has formulated a commission composed of students elected as student advisors to the Dean of Academic Affairs.

Discussion and recommendations are being made on the part of the committee concerning academics and curriculum and are forwarded through Dean Flemming to the College Academic Affairs Committee. The ultimate purpose of this committee is to help Saint Leo College in its constant endeavor to develop a superior academic curriculum, promoting the intellectual growth and development of each member of our community.

The Academic Affairs Committee of the SGA is composed of thirteen members representative of each class, each division, and a wide range of Grade Point Averages: four seniors - Chris Hoff, Terri Henderson, Catherine Moberly, Valerie Clarke; four juniors - Pat Hayes, Linda Cumbee, Jay Kenny, John White; three sophomores - Marge Bowland, Dennis Harrington, Tom Smith; two freshmen - to be appointed next semester - if interested, write Box 389.

Meetings are generally held on every other Wednesday, at which time, minutes are taken and sent to each divisional chairman.

This year, certain problems have risen that the Academic Committee feels should be made known and straightened out in the minds of all concerned.

1) What can be done to stimulate interest in reading? Although the subject has not been thoroughly covered, it is the feeling of the committee that the student body (on the whole) does not take an active interest in reading. One suggestion offered was a college required reading list or possibly a Great Books Club.

2) Some students reported that their General Seminar leaders are censoring the GSR reports that are being handed into Fr. Stephen's office. The Saint Leo College Faculty Handbook 1967-68, states that, a college wide seminar is held each Tuesday at ten A.M. in the cafeteria. Immediately following the program, the discussion groups meet in the assigned places with individual faculty members as group coordinators. While it is hoped that the faculty will allow the senior members of the group to act as discussion leaders, the faculty member also serves as an advisor and counselor to each of the individual members of his group and should arrange for regular appointments with his students. It is not, then, the place of the faculty GSR coordinator to censor minutes of the weekly seminar, but instead, to serve as advisors and counselors.

Each year Saint Leo College progresses in its efforts to offer intellectual fulfillment. Problems arise in all institutions and it is the responsibility of all of the institution to solve them. It is imperative that each administrator, faculty member and student ask himself, "What are the problems concerning academics on our campus?" Why, if advisory grades are maintained, will 41.5% of the student body be on Academic probation? Is there a lack of communication between faculty and students? Possibly between faculty and administration? Are the academic problems on our campus so severe that they constitute an environmental change? Should faculty members be expected to lower their standards of teaching to enable the student body to pass their courses? It is necessary for the college to be more selective when choosing their students; even at the expense of not fulfilling its quota?

We could go on and on posing questions attempting to stimulate reaction---but the real question is, "What suggestions do YOU (the readers) have to help improve the academic atmosphere on our campus??"

First of a Series

PROPOSED NEW CONSTITUTION

The Constitution of the STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE

We, the students of St. Leo College, A Catholic, co-educational institution of higher learning, striving to achieve a unity within the whole, and pursuing to educate ourselves as a Christian Institution do hereby set forth this Constitution of the student body of this organization.

Article I Name

Section 101 The name of this organization shall be the Student Government Association (S.G.A.) of Saint Leo College.

Article II Objectives

Section 201 a) to direct an encourage student activities

- b) to represent student opinion
- c) to be a mediator in student, faculty, administrative and community student affairs
- d) to encourage high moral integrity
- e) direct student discipline

Article III Membership

Section 301 All full time students shall be members of S.G.A.
