## Administrative Change New Dean and Upgrade of Professional Program

Two significant changes in the Administrative structure of Saint Leo College were announced yesterday.

Dr. Robert J. Marsh was named Dean of the college and Saint Leo's professional program was given a status equal in rank to its arts and science programs.

The Rev. Stephen Hermann, O.S.B., president, said the steps were taken to enhance Saint Leo's prospects of accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools next December.

Prior to this year, a college was required to graduate three classes before it became eligible for accreditation. Changes voted in the last general session of the association made accreditation possible for Saint Leo this year. The college has already been granted Early Recognition as a candidate for admission.

Father Stephen said the revamping of Saint Leo's professional program was in line with current trends nationally to provide greater depths for teacher education. The new program, directed by Dr. Clara Olson, dean-emeritus, upgrades the Institute for Creative Teaching which she founded.

## S.G.A. TAKES A TRIP

The S.G.A. members present at the Chensiqut Hill Conference split up into three groups. The Constitution Committee, Parliamentary Committee and the Agenda and Budget Committee.

The Constitution Committee amended the present S. G.A. constitution; the main revisions were the proposal

that the President and Vice President of the S.G.A. will be elected by the entire student body rather than by the representatives and the power of recall of any S.G.A. representative shall be granted to the students on the basis of a petition signed by forty per cent of the student body, and a

majority vote.

The Parliamentary Committee was responsible for acquainting the representatives with Rogers Rules of Parliamentary Procedure, now being employed at all S.G.A. meetings. This committee also proposed and set up the constitution for a disciplinary court comprised of the Dean of Student Affairs, the Dean of Men or Women, two male and one female member of the Sophomore and Freshman classes. This court will represent the final appeal within the student body. The jurisdiction of the court will cover all minor infringements on campus and all major infringements passed on from the Inter-Dorm Council according to the Student Handbook.

The Agenda and Budget Committee worked on setting up the S.G.A. program for the coming academic year and allocating the funds. Several new committees were set up under this division, including the Facts and Answers Committee to receive questions from the students, check all possible sources for concise, definite answers and report the results to the students. In connection with this, special gripe sessions will be set up, and a suggestion box put up in the Student Center.

In the plans for the year's agenda, several proposals were made. First, a semi-formal dinner dance sponsored by the S.G.A. - Bingo will be continued, being held monthly - the most original new idea initiated was the suggestion of a Regatta Day, for sports activities open to the entire school; if the response is enthusiastic enough, this may be expanded to a Regatta week-end.

## Sigma Beta Bring Soul To Leo

Next week on November 18, the brothers of Sigma Beta are to present Saint Leo's first soul spectacular featuring LEWIS CLARK, The LOVELLS, and the BLUE NOTES.

Soul is a work that has many meanings. In the pop world of today it is an intensely dramatic performance by a singer, projected with such feeling that it reaches out and moves the listener. We are quite sure that LEWIS CLARK will give Saint Leo just such a performance.

Clark represents SOUL, the pure negro soul. Lewis Clark has long been a favorite on the Florida scene. This is witnessed by an extended stay at Dino's in Tampa. His success has not been limited to just the Florida area. He has been featured at such places as the "Apollo" theater in New York City. One of his recent hits "Dog ain't a man's best freind" has worked its way into the top forty tunes in Florida "Green Power", another Clark record, will soon be released nationally.

The Blue Notes are primarily a rhythm and blues group. They have attained widespread popularity at places such as Yale, Harvard, Wesleyan; and numerous schools in the big ten.

## A Kappa Theta First: Study Each Teacher

Undoubtly the only way for better grades in the teacher. As the old saying go's if you can't fight "em, join em". Therefore learn how to work with your teacher.

Working with a teacher is not necessarily brown-nosing. You have to work with people all of your life, so you better start while you have a chance.

Here are a few hints to look for when studying each teacher.

What part of the course does he like best? What part does he like least?

Watchout for the small points that your teacher spends a lot of time on--- he likes those points.. They may be on a test. Does he like arguments in the classroom? (Not boxing matches of course, but an intelligent discussion on different problems.) Some teachers don't, it may be best to keep your mouth shut. Don't irritate him.

Find out about your teacher from students who have already had him. Find out what kind of test he gives, essay questions, true and false, multiple choice or the like. What kind of answers does he like? Good understanding of the main idea? Tiny details? You'll have to adjust your studying to his tests.

Does your teacher have his good days and bad days? Remember, Mondays are just as hard on teachers as they are on you.

Make an appointment with your teacher. It can be helpful, but be sure to have something specific that you want to talk over; he may not have time for just small talk.

The National basketball Association got under way a few weeks ago and the mini-dynasty which the Philadelphia 76ers started a year ago, when they replaced the Boston Celtics as the world champions, looks safe for another season.

New York, a team with young talent, is not yet ready to replace Boston as the No. 2 team in the East. In the West, the title is up for grabs. San Francisco has the best center in basketball in Nate Thurmond, but without Rick Barry, they will have trouble retaining their title. 
