Mr. Williams informed me that Saint Anthony's urgently needs 6000 pints of blood in order to meet their increasing demands. In return for one acceptable pint of blood, the donor and family become members of the hospital's Blood Assurance Plan.

This Blood Assurance Plan covers the individual, his mother, father, brother, sister, grandparents and their children for one year, from the date they give in 1967 to the same date in 1968. This donation of one pint of acceptable blood allows you to get the necessary amount of blood if needed, to cover the above mentioned people for one year, inclusive from the date donated.

I have spoken to Mr. Mike Lannon, President of S.C.A., and he has informed me that S.C.A. will give a cash prize to the class with the biggest per centage of donors. There will also be a plaque given to the winning class, from

Mr. Williams, Director of the Blood Bank.

#### National

Last Monday, Democratic National Chairman John M. Bailey accused Republicans of "an opportunist game" on Vietnam. He predicted President Johnson's popularity would rise to a height once the Republican Party is required to take a firm stand on the Vietnam war.

The Republicans were advised to moderate their criticism of the Administration's War Policy by Senator Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania. In a speech at the Senate meeting Senator Scott cautioned the members of his party against making their party into the "peace at any price" party.

Maybe we will see an agreement between the major parties of our nation. From this could come a solution

to the Vietnam war.

#### Elections

#### World

Newsmen who saw the body said Guevara had been shot in the throat and groin and that his

# SPOTLIGHT---

Well here we go again. Surprised? We are. It got a little tense after the last time we placed a pen on a pad for this column. None the less, we're peddling more trash and radical ideas again this week, so just sit back and get sick or fall asleep. It will only hurt for a second.

Throughout the United States, students are being trained in a democratic process from kindergarten to their senior year in high school. Learning about the "Father" of our nation who never told a lie, about the "American Way" and about government of the people, by the people, etc. It seems to us that it is a shame that after twelve years of training for a democratic way of life, most students then proceed to further their education in a "communistic" society.

The average college community today is quite similar to societies that exist in nations behind the Iron Curtain. Don't get us wrong, we didn't say all colleges, there are a few exceptions such as Berkley and other large universities; however, in most institutions there exists a definite totalitarian policy be it benevolent or not. We are being prepared for a democracy in a dictatorial atmosphere.

Perhaps this is merely to show us how bad it really is, but we could not say.

But bad or not it does exist today.

In order to show reasons for such a statement let us compare the policy making bodies and persons of authority in a college of this size with the policy making bodies and persons of authority in the Soviet Union

The number one 'honcho' in the U.S.S.R. is supposedly the Premier, and in the college community the similar position is held by the Chancellor. However, in reality both the Soviet Premier and the college Chancellor are merely figureheads and have mostly honorary power. The Premier presides at the opening of Congresses and usually performs speaking tasks at official banquets, etc. This can be paralleled by the Chancellor in his officiating role at degree granting exercises and other such programs.

As in the Soviet Union the real everyday power in a college is delegated to an apparent number two man. The Soviets call him the First Secretary and the collegiate term is President. The First Secretary of the Party and the President of the college are actually the powers. Being at the peak of administrative ladder, they give policy decisions to the lower officials.

The number one policy making body in the Russian

State is the Presidium, which is presided over by the First Secretary. On campus we again find the equivalent in the Board of Trustees, which incidentally has a seat held by the President of the college.

The second most powerful group in the red government is the Secretariat, which is headed by the First Secretary. This body directs the day by day activities of the Party and thus the masses. In college the Secretariat appears to be similar to the body of administrative officials (the combined Deans), who are appointed by the head of the college, the President. To an extent, the Deans direct the day by day lives of the student body (the masses), by controlling admissions and directing student affairs which include sign-in policies, dorm inspections, dress codes, etc.

Following the Secretariat on the power scale is the Central Committee, which in theory is a powerful body, but in practice it is dominated by Party members and the number one Honcho. It approves the policies of the First Secretary. In comparison, the faculty is an important body on campus, but dominated by the higher officials of the college. The faculty usually has no choice but to approve the

policies of the President.

The least powerful body in the communist society is the Party Congress. In theory it is a powerful body, but in practice it is weak and meets irregularly. By approving all policies of the First Secretary, it acts as a "rubber stamp" Again the parallel can be drawn to a campus body, the student government. Theoretically, a voice of the student body, yet in reality it acts merely as a pacifier for the "masses".

Many other comparative similarities could also be mentioned; however, due to the lack of space, they can not be brought to light. Since this is a "Democracy" Comrades, we believe that one important difference must be stated. This difference is freedom; the freedom to stand up for what you believe in.

## Grievance Committee Report Reasons

The following report has been submitted to the MONARCH staff by the Student Government Grievance Committee. Below they have listed the various grievances of the Student Body followed by the reasons, as explained to them upon their investigations.

1. Laundry: The same fee is charged as in previous years although pick-up and delivery has been discontinued. Reason: Protection of the students from theft and excessive claims against the school for lost laundry.

2. Language Fee: Each student pays a language fee whether or not he is taking a language. Reason: The school needs more money.

3. Key Deposit: On the form attached to the tuition fee there was a clerical error stating that key deposit was covered by tuition.

Reason: This was a clerical error. Mr. Christiansen: "This is not legally binding".

4. Crowded Rooms:  
Male: Some rooms are handling more people than originally planned for. Reason: None given. Students wishing compensation for this should make an appeal through Mr. Christiansen.  
Female: Anticipated facilities are lacking. Any female student who has paid the sur-charge will be reimbursed.

5. The price of books:  
Reason: School needs more money. List price is charged for all books. The school thus receives approximately 30 % profit.

6. Bus service: Students have no bus services this year. Reason: 1) The cost of

repair for damages to the buses last year was too much - \$9,000.

2) The cost for operation this year would be \$21,000.

SOLUTION: For the above mentioned reasons the Board of Directors of Saint Leo discontinued bus services.

7. FOOD: The grievances concerning quality and quantity.

REASON: 1) inflation (15%) over last year.

2) Authorities do not know what students want to eat.

Mr. Christiansen's Suggested Solution:  
Form a food committee to formulate suggested menus.

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# IF YOU ARE IN FIRE STRIKES

A special message from the Security Office concerning fire.

1. Warn others to get out of the building or area.
2. Give the alarm--Call Dade City Fire Department at 567-2121 San Antonio Fire Department 588-3581 or 588-4361 or Pasco Sheriffs office at 567-5131. These numbers should be recorded and kept near every phone on campus. Speak slowly and plainly--give the location and the extent of the fire. Then, wait to answer any questions.
3. If the fire is still small, use an extinguisher on it.. Stay low (out of heat and smoke). Use a sweeping motion from the edge inward and the bottom upward. Stay out of confined places and if the fire gets

bigger--get out and close all doors behind you!

4. Remember, a scream or smell of smoke can create panic. Keep "cool". Avoid the crowd, look for alternate Fire Exits. If smoke thickens, stay low--close to the floor. If lights go out, follow along a wall, until you feel a doorway. If your escape is blocked, close doors behind you to hold back the fire.

IF YOU ARE IN YOUR BED AND SMOKE IS HEAVY

1. Roll out of bed to the floor--less smoke there. Cover your nose with a cloth if you can. DO NOT STAND UP.
2. Crawl to the window. Open or smash it if you have to.
3. Lean out and breathe--Do not jump!

But--if there is still

time for other escape--feel doors--if hot, do not open. Open any door cautiously--be ready to slam it shut. Remember, one breath of super heated air can kill!

IF A PERSON IS ON FIRE

1. Be fast--get him down on the ground or floor. Smother flame to prevent severe burns by rolling him in a blanket, rug or coat or just rolling on the

ground can snuff out flame.

FIRST AID FOR BURNS

1. Be careful--remove clothing from the charred area. If it sticks, leave it alone--wrap it around the burned area, with a clean cloth (dry) sheet or towel.
2. Call a doctor fast! Keep victim calm, lying down and warm.

Yesterday afternoon at precisely 3:25 P.M., the Red Sox dream came to an end, and the St. Louis Cardinals became the baseball champions of the world by defeating the Red Sox 7 to 2 in the seventh game of the 1967 World Series.

It was the brilliant pitching of Bob Gibson, the key hits of Roger Maris and the all round skills of Lou Brock that gave the Redbirds their 8th World Championship. Bob Gibson, a 3 game winner, struckout 26 and gave up only 3 runs in 27 innings. Lou Brock had 12 hits and broke a World Series record by stealing seven bases. Roger Maris was the series leading run producer with 7 RBI.

The Red Sox were not without their heroes. Jim Lonborg got bombed yesterday by giving up 7 runs and 10 hits in six inings, but in his previous two starts, allowed only one run and four hits in 18 inings. Carl Yastrzemski, Boston's Prince Valiant, had 10 hits including 3 home runs.

For the Cardinals, winning the World Series was not unusual. But for the Red Sox, playing in the World Series was a dream come true.
