TAP RUNS DRY


THE BOARD OF Club 67 met on Monday, March 12, and decided to close the Senior Class Bar for the remainder of the school year.

Many factors attributed to the decision, including the difficulty in preventing minors from illegally consuming beer. There have been several reported instances of security closing the bar for this reason.

Another contributing factor was the discrepancy between the purchases and the sales. The Senior Class has been having difficulty balancing the books, the reason being lack of control over the nightly income. They were also burdened with a \$2,500 deficit inherited from last year's Senior Class, which had to be erased and cut into their profit. All these circumstances are making it most difficult for the Class to raise much needed money for Senior Week and Graduation.

Many of those responsible for operating Club 67 must now give their time in preparation for graduation activities and exams.

COMPOUNDING THE PROBLEMS facing the Club, the recently purchased stereo system, valued at \$500, was stolen earlier this week. Campus Security is now following a lead, but no arrests have been made.

A number of other activities are: a member of the housing committee, an I.F.C. representative for KAE, and a member of Who's Who.







Editorial

IN FULFILLING WHAT we consider an obligation to the student community the Editorial Staff of Monarch convened to evaluate the candidates for President and Vice President of S.G.A., the most prestigious offices in the student governing system.

Not pretending to infallibility, we have included the sketches and responses to the questions posed, which served as the criteria for our appraisal.

The answers were written in the fashionable mode of political expression, saying little, much like our national demagogues. This was expected. However, the manner of their presentation, the logical formulation of thought and the readability warranted more important consideration.

We have ascertained by their answers that each candidate emphasizes student representation rather than direct leadership. They also espouse a more meaningful student voice and greater student rights, while declaring war on apathy.

THE REPLIES WERE not without inconsistencies or paradoxes, but were sincere in nature.

Little mention was given to the school newspaper. This is a trivial in itself, but paramount in conjunction with advocacy of democracy and representation. Ask Thomas Jefferson.

The one candidate making mention of Monarch neglected to answer an important question, exhibiting a lack of knowledge in this area.

But let us not despair, for two candidates were obviously much more informed and thoughtful in their responses. Unfortunately, both are running for President.

THE DIFFICULTY OF endorsing one of these gentlemen stems from the various concepts of how the President can better benefit the student body.

If one believes the leader should possess the ability to skillfully debate the administration and effectively present the students' views, we suggest Dennis Hayes, who exhibits a much greater command of language, both verbally and written.

However, if one contends that our future lies in greater unity among students, we feel Timmy Gleason, armed with his congenial personality, could establish a greater rapport between students and S.G.A.

The preceding is a conclusion of three hours of debate. We are not saying that each is lacking in a certain skill, but giving an honest appraisal of their strengths.

WE ASK THAT each student arrive at their concept of how the President can best serve the students and vote accordingly.

Also, we endorse Kevin Callahan for Vice President.

MONARCH INTERVIEWS S.G.A. CANDIDATES

CHARLES AHERN, JR.

1. Should the President / Vice President represent or lead the students? Yes, I feel that the President / Vice President should not only lead but represent the students. He knows the people to talk with in obtaining correct and speedy information, therefore, getting results.

2. What further action would you take on the proposals that were denied this year? I would try to cover every approach in presenting the denied proposals, by getting involved with the students and asking their ideas. More of an immediate response approach.

3. How would you get more students interested in Student Government Association and its activities? I would try to spend more time in the company of the students instead of hibernating in the S.G.A. office. I would talk about new activities

to the students and ask for their suggestions in selecting the activities in the future.

4. Should the students have more voice in administrative decisions, and if so, how can this voice be heard? Yes. The students should have more say in

the decision of the administration, by having their elected officers work with the college administration. Instead of trying to fight and close our ears to ideas and their proposals for the students, we should weigh and discuss them, not reject them totally.

TIMOTHY A. GLEASON

1. I feel that the president of S.G.A. has the responsibility to at times to do both when necessary for the benefit of all. If the situation should arise that another student is better informed on a certain issue and can shed light on the issue he should be able to speak on behalf of his group with the help of the president. The job of president of S.G.A. at times may deem him a leader but not a representative as I have previously explained. Let's face reality, nobody is infallible, but if the students vote and elect someone to the office of

president, they in short are giving their confidence of leadership and representation to this one individual.

2. This past year we began the rough road of progress of student rights and responsibilities here at Saint Leo College. Also, this past year we as students have proven that we can accept responsibilities such as visitation and the organization of effective judicial systems. We were not granted all of the requests, but we did get some, and this is a start. If we can run our S.G.A. effectively and responsibly, we can be assured

of one thing: the confidence of the college and members of the Board. The cliché goes, "If at first you do not succeed... try and try again." This is my philosophy of life. I am sure, if I am elected, that within the next year the college will and must grant greater responsibilities to the students of Saint Leo College to assure a sound community.

3. I believe for the students to be interested in the S.G.A. the leaders must show that student government is and can be effective to the entire student body. We must try to gain the

confidence of the students and give them some responsibilities so that they feel needed and to be an actual part of the S.G.A. Once this fact has been established, it is up to the S.G.A. to tackle the problems that arise during the year. It is up to the S.G.A. to put the coal on the fire to ignite student opinion. "Apathy is hard to reach for it seeks no boundaries."

4. Most definitely, I feel that students not only spend a \$12,000 on college but four years of their life here at Saint Leo College to better themselves for the future. With this in mind

I most sincerely feel that the student should have a say in what goes on in his college, for it is his right.

Unfortunately we as students are not united to any one cause and have let apathy rule us. If we can patch these holes with unity and go together as one student body, not two, we will and can be heard. After seeing the last Trustee meeting, I feel that the President of S.G.A. should be able to attend any college meeting for he represents the most important part of this college: the students.

DENNIS HAYES

1. Should the President / Vice President represent or lead the students? Saint Leo College, like any other entity, has its diversity of views and interests; therefore, it is by the very nature of his position the obligation and duty of the President of the Student Government Association to be sensitive to, the varying views and interests of the students and to subsequently work toward fulfilling their needs as best he can. And the only way that the student body President can confer these needs to the administration is by being a true representative.

The concept of a leader must not be ignored, though. The student body President does not lead the students as a sergeant leads a platoon or as a coach leads an athletic team. His leadership is more subtle. Many times students are concerned

about matters of policy but have no way of expressing their feelings to the administration. In this way the President is a leader in that he senses these feelings and uses the voice of the students (S.G.A.) to accomplish whatever ends need to be fulfilled. Primarily, though, the President is a representative who must stand up for the students.

2. What further action would you take on the proposals that were denied this year? In following the representative nature of the student body President, there are two major proposals on which I must definitely take action. These include the proposal to make the President of the Student Government a voting member of the Saint Leo College Board of Trustees and the proposal that would have placed him on the President's Council, also a voting member. I believe that these two

proposals have priority in that they would not only give the students better representation and voice in the establishment of college policy, but it would also bring the students into a closer contact with the administration, something which is needed on the Saint Leo campus.

Also, for those students 21 years of age or older, I would work toward establishing a section in the dormitories in which these students might enjoy the full rights of a legal adult. With the apparent increase in off campus living, this would afford those students who cannot find off campus housing the opportunity to enjoy the full liberties that are rightly theirs.

I would like to add that these proposals passed both the student Senate and the S.G.A. Executive Board by a marginal vote. If we hope for any chance of these proposals to be made

policy, we must continue to strive for them.

3. How would you get more students interested in Student Government Association and its activities? It is impossible to go to all the students and ask them to get involved; this interest lies in the members of the Senate. Rather, by keeping the students thoroughly informed as to the activities of the Student Government Association, we could best draw interest. This information would emphasize areas of importance that would significantly affect the students and that would subsequently induce them to express concern. Students could then express their feelings in such ways as necessary student body meetings or more effectively, by personal contact with their elected leaders. When they see that students are working for students in areas of importance,

their curiosity and interest will come to the surface.

4. Should the students have more voice in administrative decisions, and if so, how can this voice be heard? Definitely so, since the nature of the S.G.A. is that it is the self-governing voice and body of the students of Saint Leo. Accordingly, the student voice should be as strong as possible.

Most significantly, the student voice can be heard more strongly and effectively if the student body President is allowed to sit on the Board of Trustees and on the President's Council with both voice and vote. Further, the President must establish the best contact with the students as possible and can thereby fulfill his representative obligation. He can then better present the needs of the students to those higher up on the echelon.

KEVIN CALLAHAN

1. If they did not I think the whole purpose of S.G.A. would be defeated. My own personal feeling is that to represent you have to lead, yet one must use his or her best judgment and lead in a way that would best benefit the common good of all.

2. If I were elected and did nothing, I feel this would be a great breach of contract on my part to the students of Saint Leo. I feel that many of the proposals will be put into effect in time - but it is also up to the student leaders to keep slugging

for the students.

3. I would say the only way to do such is to show the students that Student Government can be effective in helping the students in their needs and responding to their wants. This is a very hard task -

yet I strongly feel it can be done.

4. Yes, I feel the students should have much more say in all administrative decisions - I will only say look at the food problem we had this year on campus - we were never told or

consulted on this matter - I feel that the Student Government Association if effective is the best channel for the students to turn to. After all, the student government officers work for the entire student body.

1. Should the President / Vice President represent or lead the students? Yes, I feel the students should help as one group using the President and Vice President as spokesmen for them.

2. What further action would you take on the proposals that

were denied, this year? No answer.

3. How would you get more students interested in Student Government Association and its activities? First, I'd like to start with elections itself. Personally I was very unhappy with the turn

of voters in last year's election. If there's one thing I'd like to see that's at least 80% of the student body voting this year or in the future. Also, make it more known just what the S.G.A. is, just what it can accomplish if the whole student body backs

them.

4. Should the students have more voice in administrative decisions, and if so, how can this voice be heard? Yes, and as I said above, the S.G.A. must let it known through more boosters, flyers, and also have the S.G.A.

NATIONAL NEWS NOTES

"CONSTITUTIONAL CRISIS" MANSFIELD

Senate majority leader Mike Mansfield says that President Nixon by continuing to refuse to spend Congressionally appropriated funds risks a Constitutional crisis. Mansfield says we will just have to see if the Constitution means what it says. If it does the Congress is on good grounds.

NIXON PLANS BIG CUT IN EDUCATION FUNDS

The administration plans to spend only \$32 million of \$270.6 million in appropriated education funds. This means the administration is going against Congressional orders that the money be spent by June 30 of this year. The 238 million remaining will be spent in fiscal year '74.

NIXON FUND GETS BIGGER

President Nixon although unable to run again has amassed the largest political war chest in history 4.9 million dollars.

INTERIOR DEPARTMENT CONSIDERS LAW CHANGE

The Interior Department is considering asking Congress to change the present law which is preventing the Alaskan oil pipeline from being built. This would have the effect of widening the right of way needed for the 800 mile long pipeline. Despite claims that serious environmental damage would result from its construction, the state's two senators are urging passage of such a measure.

SENATORS ASK HALT TO ATOMIC TESTS

Thirty Senators have signed a resolution urging the President to stop underground atomic testing. Senator Kennedy said the resolution, if passed, would have only an advisory effect. It would be an expression of the Senate's desire to see the President sign a test ban treaty like that of 1963 with Soviets, stopping all underground testing.

ECONOMIC NEWS NOT GOOD

The Labor Department reports that unemployment during February increased from 5.0 to 5.1 per cent. Also reported was a 22 year high in wholesale prices. Industrial prices rose by 1.1 per cent; farm products rose by 3.9 per cent in February compared to 3.3 in January. The overall rise was 1.9 per cent which puts the wholesale price index up 8.2 per cent above last year. Thus, it cost \$12.69 to buy \$10.00 worth of February 1967 goods in February 1973.

U A.W. PRESIDENT:

Nixon budget could result in Recession. Leonard Woodcock, President of the United Auto Workers, while asking Congress to impose heavier taxes on the wealthy, said Nixon's plan to cut 12 billion dollars from the 1974 budget will choke current expansion. Woodcock suggested more spending financed by tax reform is safer than a sudden budget cut.

WHAT THE POLLS ARE SAYING

Both the Harris Poll and Gallup Poll reveal Americans are growing alarmed by the biggest prices in 22 years. Gallup found six out of ten persons in this latest survey identified inflation as the biggest problem. Harris has released results that indicate 74 per cent of the people think prices are higher than a year ago. Harris also found people are concerned that the current "good times" will not last; only 38 per cent of the people believe that the U.S. will not be in a recession next year.

GENERAL MOTORS IS SCARED

The nation's largest auto maker GM is facing what it calls a "business catastrophe." This could happen says GM if the current guidelines for emissions on 1975 autos are maintained. Ford has voiced similar concern saying it has spent \$146 million so far in good faith but it can't meet the deadline.

\$20,000/00 CALLEY COLLECTS

(CPS / ZNS) - LIEUTENANT WILLIAM Calley has collected \$20,000 in federal salary payments from the government since he was convicted of murdering 22 Vietnamese civilians in March 1971. Calley has been able to continue to collect and spend his \$10,600 annual salary thanks to a personal intervention in his case by President Nixon.

Calley was found guilty of murder charges stemming from the My Lai massacre March 31, 1971 - and was immediately ordered stripped of his uniform, stripped of his salary and imprisoned. President Nixon, however, intervened in the case and ordered that Calley merely be confined to his quarters at Fort Denning, Georgia, until his conviction could be fully reviewed.

Nixon's decision restored Calley's salary and other benefits, and since then Calley has collected a total of \$20,000 in pay from the government. A military spokesperson said that Calley will not have to repay any of the money in the event his conviction is upheld. Although the Lieutenant is under house arrest, he is permitted to stroll around his furnished apartment and the grounds outside, to keep a pet dog, and to watch his color television set. Calley's girl friend reportedly comes by each day to do his shopping and cooking.



WILL GRAY GET FBI JOB?

There is now considerable doubt in the Senate as to whether L. Patrick Gray, acting FBI Chief, will get the job on a permanent basis. Senator John Tunney of California said Gray's nomination was "Quite improbable" if John Dean, counsel to the President, refuses a Senate invitation to appear before the Senate Judiciary Committee. The Committee wants Dean to testify on matters concerning his actions in the Watergate bugging incident and his handling of FBI files. Dean is also the man who recommended that G. Gordon Liddy for the job with the Committee to Re-elect the President. Liddy is the convicted ring leader in the Watergate affair. The White House seeing a bumpy road ahead is reported to have a second choice Washington Police Chief Jerry V. Wilson.

WOUNDED KNEE II IN THE MAKING

The U.S. government has placed three hundred federal agents in armored personnel carriers to force the Indians to the "bargaining table." The government is looking into the possibility of starving out the Indians, cutting off electricity, water and telephone services in an attempt to bring them out peacefully. The federal Grand Jury has returned an undetermined number of indictments against the Indians who took over the historic village.

NIXON ON THE DEATH PENALTY

President Nixon responding to the Supreme Court ruling outlawing the death penalty last Sunday morning said: "Contrary to the views of some social theorists, I am convinced that the death penalty can be an effective deterrent against specific crimes. The laws I will propose will remove this doubt about the deterrent effect."

MUJIB WINS FIRST ELECTION

Shiek Mujib won a landslide victory and a new five year term with 290 seats out of 300 in the new parliament. A mob three days later beat to death a member of the opposition and three fellow campaign workers.

PERONIST WIN IN ARGENTINA

Peronist Hector Campora was elected President of Argentina Tuesday with over 49 per cent of the votes. This was Argentina's first election in ten years and it was the first Peronist victory since 1965 when General Peron was exiled by the military. Campora says that unless the General returns he will not serve as President.

GAULISTS. RETURNED TO POWER IN FRANCE

President George Pompidou has his right wing Gaulists won a 50 seat majority in the National Assembly. The left wing Communist-Socialist Coalition got 46.3 per cent of the votes but could not tie up the loose ends of this first time coalition.

GOVERNOR OF BERMUDA ASSASSINATED

Governor Sir Richard Sharples was killed at his residence Saturday night. This is just six months and one day after another Governor was shot. No arrests have been made and tourists were allowed to leave the island.

MORE FIGHTERS FOR ISRAEL

President Nixon in meetings with Israeli Prime Minister Golda Meir last week has agreed on terms of an agreement that would bring about the sale of some 100 F-4 fighter bombers and A-4 light attack aircraft over a two year period. The agreement also calls for U.S. aid to Israel to help her produce and design her own aircraft.

RUSSIANS EATING MORE

The average Russian, says a United Nations study, is eating more meat this year, 121 pounds compared to 63.8 in the 1950's. This figure compares with 167 for Czechoslovakia and 211 for the Britons, while Americans eat 286 pounds of food stuffs. The average Russian eats 39 pounds of fish, second only to Scandinavia, Iberian Peninsula and the Pacific.
