

This is a story as it might appear three years from today.

Saint Leo-February 16, 1970- Carmell Hall, a dormitory for male students, caught on fire and burnt to the ground. It is feared that as many as 25 students were lost when the top floor of the two story building collasped. It is believed that the fire was started by a lit cigarette which the student was smoking in bed. The fire was discovered by a resident advisor who tried to warn all the students. In the wooden-frame building, there was a shortage of extinguishers since they were being recharged after students shot them off in a extinguisher battle the week before.

This morning, rescue units from Saint Leo, San Antonio, and Dade City are going through the remains of the building for bodies. As one survivor put it; "There was a panic to get through the only exit on the the ground floor. Only a couple of students were able to get out before the top floor caved in."

Fortunately, this is only a story, but this story could come true at anytime unless certain measures are taken to prevent such an occurence. (1) An alarm system should be installed to warn the students of a fire. (2) Adequate exits should be provided in the older dorms. (3) As far as fire extinguishers, adequate extinguishers should be maintained in working condition and any student caught using fire prevention equipment should be subject to the laws of this state.

# SPOTLIGHT--- FIRE

Have you ever heard the sound of a firebell? It is a loud clanging sound that warns us of danger. Most of us have heard this sound at one time or another during our life. The sound of the fire bell is to warn people in the immediate area that their lives are in danger, and therefore, everyone should evacuate the premisis to a place of safety. The above information is provided for those people who don't know what to do in case of a fire!

St. Edward's Hall recently had a fire drill, which are scheduled to acquaint the students with the procedures to be taken in the event of such an emergency. These fire drills are for our protection and such precautions are necessary. Many students complain because these fire drills disturb their studying, card games, bull sessions, sleep, and television programs, even though these drills are for our own safety. Our point is that on February 9, 1968 at approximately 11:05 p.m., St.

Edward's Hall had a fire drill. It is a good thing the students were warned in advance of the drill, as they were, for if they were not, the fire drill would have been a complete failure. Out of the eight fire bells in the dormitory, only two work with any efficiency. Furthermore, if there is a central emergency alarm system in the building, we think it is hidden very well. It is our guess that not more than fifteen or sixteen people who live in the dormitory know where it is. Even worse is the fact that there are three exits on the first floor West and only two are adequate. The third and quickest way out, the rear exit, has no steps. Anyone coming out of this exit is subject to a three to four foot drop into a glass filled trench. Now, if this were the real "McCoy", people could have been seriously hurt or even killed because of the inadequate equiptment. We would also like to know why it has taken five months to have a fire drill. Thank God we haven't had a fire.

We believe that immediate action should be taken to correct these faults for our protection and the protection of the school. We hope that this request isn't asking too much for our safety and well-being. We would be only too happy to accept any suggestion on how to remedy these situations, please write to either Box 1791 or 152.

## St. Leo question continued

The continuing desire of St. Leo College to gain entrance into the Florida Intercollegiate Athletic Conference was once again produced a temporary setback for the Dade City school.

New head basketball coach Howard Fagan, who earlier in the new year renewed St. Leo's aspirations right before his team was to meet long-time FIC incumbent Florida Southern by making comments

that were published in at least one Florida newspaper, explained his feelings to this reporter:

"We want to get into the FIC because it is a very respectable nationally-recognized conference."

Should St. Leo be once again denied admission, Fagan has already taken steps to start a major rebuilding program at his college, a move designed to make St. Leo one of the top small-college independents in the country within the next five years.

He has recruited heavily from the Chicago area and has scheduled some of the toughest major colleges in the nation in the next two seasons.

Ken Stibler, a major college recruiter for ten years and now head basketball coach at Biscayne College, said that the current group of freshman at St. Leo (four of whom are varsity regulars) is "the best group of freshmen I've ever seen anywhere."

There is no question that the Monarchs will have in the near future, if they don't already, the athletic credentials to successfully compete in the Florida Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

Besides their up-and-coming basketball team, their total athletic program figures to be upgraded, beginning with the construction of a super-structured field house.

But it's the academic validity-end, so to speak, which concerns Stetson coach Glenn Wilkes, another FIC standard-bearer.

"Frankly, until they can present a detailed outline of their proposed athletic structure, of their financial aid to athletes, and their entrance requirements for athletes, I am opposed to such a move," said Coach Wilkes.

"Once they can accomplish this, though, the situation might change."

We of the Southern feel, provided that St. Leo College meets NCAA academic requirements for athletes, that the Monarchs should be allowed permission into the FIC—preferably by the beginning of the 1968-'69 college year.

Their presence in the FIC will add a fifth team to an otherwise ridiculously-low number of four participants in basketball, baseball, and golf, and will add a fourth contender (since Tampa University doesn't field a team) in the sport of soccer. This will, in turn, add a greater taste of competition to an already-competitive league.

Florida Southern Athletic Director Tom Greene, when asked how he felt about St. Leo's possible admission into the FIC, did not wish to make a comment.

## LOUNGES vs MACHINES

The Fact Finding Committee recently received a letter from Mr. Michael Mead asking the following:

This letter was addressed to:  
Mr. A. James Christiansen, Comptroller.  
Dear Sir:

In a letter we received from a Mr. Michael Mead on December 12, 1967, we were asked to inquire about the following:

"Could you please inquire as to how much money is budgetted to the improvement of the resident halls, such as furnishing lounges with furniture? I have been told by Mr. John Dux that coin operated machines are a necessity in Benoit Hall to serve as auxiliary finance income to improve this dorm." We would appreciate it if you could be so kind as to answer this question at your earliest convenience.

The reply, which was approved by Fr. Stephen Herrmann, is as follows:

"Sufficient funds have been budgetted to furnish and/or remodel and construct lounges in all dormitories. This is the second year this has been done.

However, when these funds must be used to repair needless damage to the College buildings, they are obviously not available for their intended purpose.

Since the Comprehensive fee is fixed sum divided to pay the costs of education, student services, admini-

stration, plant maintenance and additions, room, board, laundry, insurance and so on, an increase in any area must necessarily come from another area. No outside fund of money is available to draw on for current operating expenses, the comprehensive fee must do the whole job."

## MORE HELP! TEA FOR TWO?

Approach to system. (cont.)

9. Students who need assistance in a subject will be instructed to go directly to their professor. He will certify that the student has made the effort and is eligible for tutoring assistance.

10. Tutors will evaluate efforts of their students periodically.

11. A student chairman will work with three faculty advisors, and a student committee in directing and improving the system.

12. The program will work with three faculty advisors, and a student committee in directing and improving the system.

13. Teacher records of attendance in class will be requested recurrently so that students being tutored will be sure to get to every regularly scheduled class. Any serious infraction in this area will lead to immediate suspension from the tutoring program.

14. The possibility of individual work credit for tutoring is being investigated.

H. Possible difficulties foreseen.

1. Many potential tutors are involved in other activities and their time may be limited.

2. Some students may depend entirely on the tutors despite the required faculty signature as a check.

3. Many text books once used by tutors have been retired, and new ones are being utilized.

4. Turnover of faculty in recent years. New faculty approach to courses.

5. When students meet with difficulty they may not accept it as a challenge, but attempt to sign up for the tutoring instead.

I. Evaluation.

1. Periodic evaluation of program by tutor.

2. Occasional request for evaluation by the students being tutored.

3. Divisional chairmen, or faculty member delegated by him.

4. Academic Committee (students).

5. Committee of three faculty members student chairman (from S.G.A.) and four students one from each class.

The student will be required to file his complaint and relinquish any evidence (such as laundry ticket and article) at this time. He will be notified by mail to report to the next meeting of the court. If for some good reason he cannot be present at this meeting, he will be required to request postponement in writing, or his case will be dropped.

If clothing is damaged, you must report it immediately if you expect the court to make your case good.

Students are reminded that the laundry has been instructed NOT to launder any clothing which is not accompanied by a completed ticket. If this occurs the student will receive a bag of un-laundered clothing when he arrived in a few days.

Students are also requested not to force laundry into a pillow case, since it causes the pillow case to tear. A bill will be sent to the business office if this occurs.

When one drags his bundle on the way to the laundry the bag tears as do the clothing inside.

To resolve the problem of mildewed and torn sheets, the laundry is retiring such linens.

All meetings of the court for the remainder of this year will be open to everyone, unless otherwise stated. Notices of the time and place will be posted in the Daily Say-So, the Monarch and announced at G.S.R.
