Women's Curfew More Liberal

Last week Miss Rose Fernandez, Director of Women, announced to *The Lion* the changes in the women's curfew, which will become effective November 21. The proposed changes, a result of extensive study, were submitted to and accepted by Dr. Southard in their entirety.

There has been controversy surrounding the curfew issue for the past few years with no real steps taken in attaining a solution.

Miss Fernandez, realizing something must be done, undertook the task and set a thorough outline of research and study to attain information before attempting to reconstruct its present system.

The first actual step in securing information was to send a questionnaire to 95 colleges similar in size to St. Leo, inquiring about the information pertaining to their women's curfew.

The National Association of Women Deans and Counselors provided a list of publications and research material on the subject. The results of the survey were tabulated and along with the research information and studies, a basic program revision was made.

An observation and evaluation of the needs and past conduct of women students at St. Leo College was made and in conjunction helped in determining the newly instituted program.

The proposed change gives the sophomore, junior, and senior girls the freedom in regulating their hours. Restrictions are placed only upon freshmen. First semester freshmen must be in by 11:00 on Sunday to Thursday and 2:00 a.m. on weekends. Second semester, the week night curfew will be extended an hour to 12:00.

The sign-in, sign-out will continue to be observed. The new policy does not mean girls under twenty-one years old can live off campus. Women students wishing to spend a weekend away must continue to obtain written permission from parents and leave weekend slips with the head resident.

Security guards will remain responsible for opening and closing the doors. The doors will be closed 11:30 Sunday to Thursday and 2:00 on Friday and Saturday.

The change in curfew is on

trial basis and will be evaluated at the end of the year with the Department of Student Affairs reserving the right to make necessary modifications.

The new curfew was made public at a general meeting of women students, which followed a discussion on Women's Lib, Monday night, which started Women's Week. Women's Week continued Tuesday evening with a panel of representatives from companies and agencies to inform girls on career opportunities. Georgette Hightower, fashion editor of the St. Petersburg Times and former fashion coordinator for Maas Brothers, spoke on new trends in women's fashions on Wednesday night.

Mary Grizzle, State Representative and Chairman of the Florida Commission on the status of women, spoke about "women in leadership roles, especially in the field of politics." Also there will be art exhibits of the works of women students in the Marmion Lounge.

It seems quite appropriate that the change in women's curfew was announced after a discussion on Women's Lib.

Friday evening there will be the judging of the Christmas Card contest. The results will be announced at the formal, Saturday evening.

On the evening of December 5, Alpha Sigma sorority and the S.G.A. will sponsor the annual Winter Weekend Formal which will be held in the McDonald Cafeteria. Beginning at 8:30 p.m. there will be a champagne party followed by the dance, complete with an open bar.

Following the dance, there will be a breakfast at 2:00 a.m.

Admission to the dance will be \$10.00 per couple.

War Protest

An estimated crowd of one thousand people, including a contingent of thirty-five St. Leo students, marched through the streets in Tampa, Saturday, November 6th, in protest to the war and the nuclear test at Amchitka, Alaska.

The march, organized by the Student Mobilization Committee at South Florida, assembled in a lot behind the Tampa library and marched, in orderly fashion, to the Hillsborough County Courthouse.

Police estimated that the number of demonstrators was low. They mingled with the crowds to procure candid shots (still and moving) of marchers to identify the troublemakers as a requisite of the police department's routine.

Ahead of the marchers was a contingent of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW). They revised mock "search and destroy missions." The bloodied bodies of volunteer victims were stacked for an "official" body count.

Leaflets were distributed en route to the courthouse envisioning Tampa as a Vietnamese village. They contained such abhorrent phrases as: "Shot your dog," "Raped your wife and daughter,

before they killed them." "Destroyed your home." "Burned your crops and town." "Killed you."

The thirty-five St. Leo Students followed the Lion Banner to the courthouse where all listened raptly to the commencing rally.

Scott Camile, regional coordinator for the VVAW, played a tape of an army surgeon prisoner of war urging termination of the war.

Job Hobb, U.S.F. wheelchair student, voiced his disgust and anger with the war. His face was covered with war paint which he said symbolized there "would be no peace at home, until there is peace in Vietnam."

Otha Favours, black militant from Tampa, expounded upon the interference of integration with black self-determination.

Mrs. Ruth Colby, a national coordinator of the National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC), condemned President Nixon's policy in Southeast Asia and the wage-price freeze.

The only marring incident of the day was the arrest of Pete Rooney, a U.S.F. SMC leader, for "malicious trespassing" while distributing leaflets at the National Guard parking lot. His trial is scheduled for November 24.



New Health Center

The new Saint Leo Health Center which has replaced the old Saint Leo Dispensary is now open twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

This is a remarkable improvement in school health services, for last year the old dispensary's hours were from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., five days a week and on weekends whenever it was necessary.

This year, students have full use of the former abbey infirmary. This is due to the kindness of the monks of Saint Leo Abbey.

The health center's personnel include registered nurses, who are on duty from 7:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m., five days a week, and 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on weekends. At all other times there is a nurse's aid on duty.

Dr. John Buckingham, from Saint Joseph's Hospital in Tampa, comes on Mondays from 9:30 to 4:00 p.m. The students are required to make appointments to see the doctor as you do in an ordinary doctor's office or clinic.

Dr. John Buckingham interned

at Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota. He received his public health degree from John Hopkins University. At present he is head of the emergency room at St. Joseph's.

There are additional charges for additional services such as laboratory tests run at St. Joseph's Hospital and some medication. These fees are approximately one-half of what a student would pay in a regular clinic or doctor's office.

Members of the college community are invited to drop in at the health center to see what is available.

This health center is something that the college community has needed for the past few years. The medical services need more money for further plans. As Sister Lucy, Dean of Student Affairs, has said, "We have come a long way in health services in one short year. We are continuously evaluating our present program and projecting plans for next year. Money is an important factor. Medical services are very expensive."

A motion was made that the three freshmen on the campus court have a right to vote. The motion had been voted upon and it carried a unanimous vote.

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
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Season Ends for Monarchs and Seniors

As the 1971 St. Leo soccer season ends, so do the careers of three seniors, who last Saturday played their final game in the SLC Green and Gold against Florida Technical Institute of Melbourne. The three seniors are: Arthur Bucci from Byram, Conn., Peter Morris from Fairport, New York, and Jimmy Martins from Col Roma, Mexico.

During their college careers they have seen the St. Leo soccer program grow from such early beginnings as a minor sport in 1968 to the level of a major sport in 1971 with the recognition of the NCAA. Combined these seniors have played in a total of 100 soccer games minus practice games and averaged just under 1500 hours of practice.

Pete Morris completes his fourth year in a SLC uniform with numerous accomplishments to his credit. In 1969 after a dismal season in which the Monarchs won three of sixteen games, Pete was selected to the All Conference Second Team at the halfback position.

In 1970, Pete scored five goals and six assists to lead the Monarchs to a 2 and 12 record overall. At the end of the season he was again selected to the All Conference Second Team at forward.

So far in 1971, Pete has a total of eleven points to lead the Monarchs in scoring. Probably he will be selected to the All Conference Team.

Jimmy Martins, a 5'7, 140 pound speedster from South of the Border, has played in 40 games for the Monarchs. He has


been hampered by leg injuries which plagued him in 1969 and 1970. A knee injury in 1970 forced him to play only five games for the Monarchs, as the team slumped in winning only two of fourteen games.

So far in 1971, Jimmy has averaged a point a game for the Monarchs who after a slow start, in which they lost four of five games, are now playing solid soccer. Jimmy, Carmen Santoro, Pete Morris and Steve Erbe combine to give the Monarchs a solid front line that has provided the fans with a season ending four game winning streak. The Monarchs' final record of five and six is indicative of the fact that the Monarch booters won 4 of their last 5 games.
