Peace Corps volunteers must be 18 years minimum age, United States citizens, and have no dependents under the age of 18. Other requirements are a college degree and a skill or trade. Foreign language qualification is not a prerequisite.

College juniors can train during the summer between junior and senior years in order to start work immediately after graduation.

Peace Corps volunteers normally serve from 24 to 27 months--- which is inclusive of the training period.



## EDITORIAL

Although registration for the winter trimester last week was a trying experience for some persons, it seemed to have been well organized and for the most part ran smoother than previous registrations. Lines were usually shorter than one half hour when in the past four or five hour stand-ins were not uncommon.

The partial solution to the usual red tape seemed to have been requiring the students to obtain signatures of any teacher of any course he or she chose to drop or add thus permitting the individual teachers the choice as to the number of students in a class along with the wavering of prerequisites to better adopt to a students needs.

Pre registration which took place prior to Christmas vacation afforded an opportunity to every student the possibility to take any course desired. Add and drop forms indication no charge were included in the bundle of goodies each student received (upon satisfact-

ory completion of all debts to the college) when a conflict in scheduling was discovered by the records and admissions department.

The cost of ten dollars to drop and or add a subject only partially pays for the expense to the college the cost of changing I B M records and class rolls. Many colleges and universities allow only one day instead of one week to iron out the conflicts and charge as much as twenty-five dollars if the students makes a change in their course selection after pre-registration.

It is hoped that the few individual problems encountered by students and professors alike this registration will not occur again. If the Records and Admissions Department improves as much next time as they did this time, maybe someday no one will have any problems or conflicts at all...

# Monarchs Drop One - Now 5 - 1

Following the Monarchs first defeat of the season, Saint Leo will try to get back on the winning track tonight at the Dade City Armory when the Monarchs host the Florida Institute of Technology.

Florida Southern played the role of the ungracious host last Saturday night at Lakeland when the Moccasins beat Coach Howie Fagan's squad 88-64.

"They taught us how to play basketball," says Fagan. "In too many games previously we were able to stay with a team and come on and beat them even though we had way too many errors.

"In the Southern game, we gave them the ball numerous times. But, unlike previous teams we've faced, Southern took advantage of our mistakes."

The Monarchs (5-1) trailed the Mocs by nine points at halftime. Following intermission, the margin was narrowed to seven. However, the next five times the Monarchs got the ball they either turned it over or took what Fagan termed "a poor shot."

Rollins will be the Monarchs' next opponent following the battle with the

Engineers. Fagan and his squad will bus to Winter Park, Tuesday for a meeting with the Tars that evening. The Monarchs return home January 27 for a meeting with Huntingdon of Alabama.


