The main purpose of the



Jonathan Kay, a Freshman from Glenview, Illinois, along with Wayne Heiser, a Pasco High School Junior from Dade City, saved the life of Dade City resident, William Wilder, who lost control of his car while traveling west on Highway 52 on Saturday night, November 2nd.

Traveling in the opposite direction, Jon and Wayne observed Wilder's car skid off the road and flip over three or four times, and stopping their car, they rushed to the wrecked car and pulled the unconscious Wilder from his car only seconds before it burst into flames – thus saving Wilder's life.

Jonathan Kay and Wayne Heiser merit recognition from Saint Leo College and Dade City for their act of bravery in risking their lives to save William Wilder. 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## Faculty Problems

Recently, the faculty of our college issued warning slips to those students who did not attain the academic standards of the college. By issuing these warning slips, the faculty showed the students the courses in which they were having difficulties or problems. *The Lion*, on behalf of the students of our college, issue our warning slips to the faculty in the areas in which they are having difficulties or problems.

The Humanities Department of the Division of Fine Arts should be commended by all Sophomores and Juniors for their ingenious system for taking attendance. This has been accomplished by hiring a woman with a doctoral degree and placing her at the entrance of the auditorium to check off each student as he or she enters. This method, however, has raised a few problems which the College and the Humanities Department should look into. First, the college could have saved thousands of dollars if it had hired someone other than a doctor to take attendance. An illiterate person could perform the same task just as well for a nominal fee. Secondly, by employing such a method, ten to fifteen minutes of every class are completely wasted and the students are losing valuable time and knowledge.

The Humanities Department is not alone in this area of attendance. Each department and professor have what they consider to be their own fool-proof method of taking attendance. Some professors spend so much time in taking attendance that we often wonder whether the purpose of attending class is to be taught or to be counted. If the professors of Saint Leo College would only realize that the students, by paying their tuition, are paying for a service and therefore, it is the student's prerogative to determine his attendance in any given class.

*The Lion's* solution to this faculty problem is that the faculty should stop counting heads and start spending more time filling them.

Another faculty problem is in the area of class presentation. Instead of beginning their lectures immediately, some members of the faculty like to give lengthy monologues on such pertinent topics as being on time for classes, taking notes and keeping quiet in the classroom. To stress and enhance these various topics, the professors usually inform the students that they are wasting their money, that they came here to learn and that if they don't like it, they may leave. Again, the students pay to listen to lectures on the course and not lectures on the above mentioned topics. If professors must lecture outside of their given field, they should do it on academic offenses such as cheating, plagiarism, misuse of equipment and damage to college property, and if they cannot confine themselves to this area and to their particular field, then, *The Lion* suggests that the faculty heed the words of a student who last year said, "We pay you to teach—not to preach."

"When you start acting like college students, we'll start treating you like college students," is the quotable quote of certain faculty members. They utter this statement every time they feel the students warrant it. To this faculty problem *The Lion* has a simple solution—these certain faculty members should stop acting like elementary school teachers and start acting like college professors.

*The Lion* presents this editorial not for the purpose of criticizing our faculty, but in order to make the faculty members of our college more aware of their problems as they make us more aware of our problems.

## To Share Our Achievement

The Student Government Association and the newly formed Senate of Saint Leo College have grown a great deal since the beginning of the academic year. Suffering only from slight growing pains, as we of the newspaper staff have experienced, they have given the College an outline for collegiate government which is commensurate with any institution in the South. We feel that this achievement should not go unnoticed. The President and his staff should strive for even higher goals and more involvement on behalf of the collegians. Our achievements can be shared and new ideas conceived by seeing what other colleges and universities are doing. The Editors propose that the Student Government Association apply for membership in the Southern Association of Universities and Colleges, Student Government Association. Through this organization, Saint Leo College can visualize other institutions' student governments and other institutions visualize our system of government. We have something of commendable value to share with them and they in turn with us.

## The Lion's Forum

At the present time the United States seems to be in the grip of a very severe epidemic. This epidemic is so contagious that no one is immune. The symptoms are observed in the curled lip scorn which projects verbalizations as "no matter how good things are, they are lousy and going to get worse."

I grow concerned that this country experiencing prosperity, social change and growth, never before experienced in the world, should be burdened by the insidious and destructive virus of negativism.

This attitude of chronic discontent must have its roots in the freedom from want of the irreducible needs. Apparently when man's basic needs for survival are met he harangues himself and his neighbors because he needs nothing and is still unhappy. I am sure that our primitive ancestors and even our recent parents who were ill-fed, ill-housed and ill-clothed did not spend their time asking themselves whether or not they were happy. However, they instinctively felt that they would be happy when they were well-fed, well-housed and well-clothed. And yet, most people in the United States today have their irreducible needs met without recognizing their good fortune. Consequently, when they fail, as they must, in their search for completeness, they blame and attack an abstraction generally

referred to as "The Establishment."

Perhaps we need to consider being able to get up in the morning and walk to the breakfast table rather than being carried there as rewarding in itself. Perhaps we need to inquire of ourselves how we can become a partner in the vitality of a country which wants to grow, but is losing its chance to become a civilized nation because of the corrosive attitude of its people.

Perhaps it is true as Chicken Little said, "The sky is falling." But, perhaps it is also true that each of us stands on the verge of utilizing our country's potential for greatness. But we will never be able to do this unless we see all aspects of life positively.

Obviously all things may not be as we wish but, I wonder, if we ask ourselves what positive things we are doing to change the bothersome irritants we all face.

The next time we feel constrained to criticize our country, our home and our school we should stop and ask ourselves what good will come of negative criticism. Another way of asking this question might be "What can I do to build" rather than "What can I do to destroy."

Unless all of us start looking for that which is inherently good in all things we will end up finding only that which is inherently bad in all things and become so engrossed in that which is bad that we could very easily destroy ourselves in this contagious epidemic of negativism.

**Baseball—A Surprise in '69**

As St. Leo's baseball team practices this fall, many things have been noticed, one of which is that this year's team is an all-around stronger one than last year's.

In the pitching department, Coach Meyer has six experienced pitchers who last year did a whale of a job in helping the pitching staff compile a 2.07 ERA, which was one of the best in the South. This fall, hurlers Ray Korn, Fred Cambria and Kevin Carlin looked very strong along with Pope Junior College transfer, Bob Case. Meyer thinks that the pitching staff is the real strength of the club.

Now, what about hitting? Having a relatively poor team batting average of .207 last year, the Monarchs should improve immensely because of the experience gained last year. Most of the team last year was young and hitting comes along with maturity, as I'm sure this year will prove.

Now looking at the team's defense, let me be as quick to the point as Coach Meyer was. Last year's team compiled a very good fielding average of .893 which is good in any coach's book. Since most of the defense will return, the Monarchs should improve and certainly they have few problems here.

In the infield, Dan Leitzell, a Freshman, has been impressive along with returning upperclassmen Phil Hopkins, Ken Kamradt and Mark Plisko. They should make up a strong infield. They are, however, being pressed to hold their jobs by

five strong Freshman candidates.
