An Idea: A Proposal . . .

Director of Men
Mr. Norm Kaye:

We, the members of the Villa Residence Hall Program, do hereby propose, by a unanimous decision, the initiation of a woman visitation program in this dormitory. The following will be the rules under which this program will be regulated:

1. All women entering the Villa will ring the doorbell and wait in the main lobby until a member of the dormitory escorts her in.
2. All women, before entering the main part of the dormitory, must first sign in and then have the member of the Villa sign his name next to first.
3. The hours for the women's visitation will be daily from noon until each individual woman's curfew.

We, the members of the Villa, firmly believe that this program will be totally feasible. Therefore, we have set down some safeguards:

1. Each member of the Villa program is individually responsible for every woman that he escorts into the dorm.
2. Any violation of the Villa program rules will be subject to the decision of the Villa Judiciary Council.
3. The program moderator, Father DeFord, and the floor director, Richard Lessard, will be in residence in order to arbitrate any emergency which might arise.

In Re: Visitation Program

Dear Rick:

The Visitation Program proposed by the Villa men was presented to the President of the College at his Staff meeting on Wednesday, September 4, 1969.

The Staff felt that the commitments to the Priory, under which the building was obtained, must remain; that is, that we meet the present philosophy of the College, including its present rules and regulations. Also, we must take into consideration the philosophic and theologic ideals of the Priory.

For your information, the Senior women have already requested that the Villa be returned to them. We do intend to study the feasibility of continuing the Villa Program, but since it is only set up for this trial year, it might well be returned to the women next year.

Finally, as you may know, the College is embarked on a self study prior to a visit from the Accreditation Committee from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools during the 1970-71. One of the things to be included in this study is a re-examination of the social programs of the College.

A Report On Campus Security

When returning to school this fall, the students found themselves caught-up in drastic changes which had occurred over the summer especially the changes in the law enforcement.

Problems such as, (1) entry of school officials into the students' rooms, (2) parking regulations, (3) actual authority of the law enforcement officials, (4) road blocks, (5) the raise in tuition, were the chief concerns of a majority of students.

Seeing the dissension rising among the students, I went and interviewed Mr. Kaye and the chief security official, Charles Gordon, to find some answers to the above mentioned problems. The following are the answers I received.

—Officials can enter rooms in an emergency, for maintenance and by order. Order meaning the permission of Dr. Zaitz and Mr. Kaye. In the case of their absence, officials must try to contact either the SGA president or the prefect of the dorm where the room is under suspicion before entering. They will have one of these individuals escort them to the room to see that the procedure is carried out correctly.

—If a student illegally parks, the first offense is a \$1.00 fine, the

second \$5.00, the third \$10.00 and the fourth is the expulsion of the student's parking sticker. If a student feels that he has been over charged, he may issue a complaint to the Student Government and it will be handled from there.

—The only official who has authority off campus is Charles Gordon for he is also Deputy Sheriff of Pasco County. All other officials are limited just to the campus.

—When the raise in tuition was made public, students thought it was because of the enlarged security force. When I asked Mr. Kaye about this he replied, "the security force has the same budget this year as last and if it is increased it will not affect our tuition."

—The road block which occurred on Saturday, September 6, was not by the security force but by the state police. The state police has the right to set-up a road block whenever and wherever it pleases.

After going over my findings, I feel that the "security force" are here for the safety of the students but if any student feels that he has had his rights violated, he should inform a student representative and he in turn will see that the proper steps are taken to remedy the situation.

Editorial Policy

Nor will *The Lion* become a clearing house for organizational free publicity. Organization events will be given coverage only when deemed newsworthy by *The Lion*.

The Editors wish to state that we will do our best to: (1) Be mindful of the wishes of all, although we won't necessarily heed them; (2) respect most persons on campus—those who deserve it; and (3) fear no one.

The Campus Book Store: A Dilemma

For the umpteenth time, the major problem faced by the students in trying to return to the normalcy of college life has been the difficulty that they have had in purchasing their textbooks during the first week of classes. This difficulty was not that the book store had ordered a limited supply of books—although this was the case in some instances—but rather the system employed in issuing books to the students.

In the past, the students have had to wait in line for their books. Although this system left much to be desired, it was somewhat organized. This year a new system was employed which can best be described as a Russian roulette type system. This system produced only chaos, confusion and ill-tempered students, especially when the book store closed for an hour for lunch and two hours for supper. Through the intervention of *The Lion* and Dr. Zaitz, the Russian roulette system was dropped and the old system restored, but chaos, confusion and ill-tempered students still prevailed.

A new system and book store are needed desperately. The size of the present book store is entirely too inadequate and must be enlarged by next trimester to such an extent that more than one line can be formed and so that the books can be issued smoothly and quickly.

During the past few years the managers and controllers of the book store have been informed of this dilemma but have only shrugged, which is the gesture of those who know no solution. As stated in *The Peter's Principle*, one tends to rise to the level of his incompetency and *The Lion* hopes this is not true of those in charge of the book store.

The students do not need shrugs but they do need a new book store and system for issuing books—and they need it now!

The rejection of the Villa's Visitation Program (see page 1) by the President's Staff and voiced by Norman D. Kaye (see page 1) is a clear indication that Saint Leo College has no intention of changing its basic rules and regulations governing dormitory life. Saint Leo's administrators are content with the archaic system that they have imposed upon the students—this is sad for the students are not.

Apparently, Saint Leo would rather stagnate in its own backwardness than to light the way of the future or, to be more exact, to come out of the 18th century and into the 20th. If this is its goal, Saint Leo has been successful for it is rapidly fading into oblivion, however, Saint Leo should not be congratulated for this feat, it should be pitied.

Why was the Villa's Visitation Program rejected? The reasons can be found in Mr. Kaye's letter. "The Staff felt that the commitments to the Priory, under which the building was obtained, must remain; that is, that we meet the present philosophy of the College, including its present rules and regulations. Also, we must take into consideration the philosophic and theologic ideals of the Priory." This is no reason for rejection. Rules and regulations can be changed and, at times like these, should be changed; and probably only God knows what the philosophic and theologic ideals of the Priory are but whatever they are, they too can be changed.

In the last two paragraphs of his letter, Norman D. Kaye prates in the manner that only he possesses. All his letter lacks is a pat on the back for himself.

Saint Leo administrators please admit that the waters around you have grown and accept it that soon you will be drenched to the bone. If your time is worth saving, then you'd better start swimming or you'll sink like a stone—for the times they are a-changin'.



Be A Debater






The Graduate VS Goodbye, Columbus

The advertising blurbs for "Goodbye, Columbus" have indicated that it is a second "Graduate." I take this to mean that the two movies are advertised as having the same basic theme and tendency; however, I strongly disagree with this analysis.

The two movies do have certain conclusions in common, for example, the fact of the generation gap and the falsity of the materialistic values of the older generation.

We have a temptation to say that because the movies are similar in this respect, they are similar in all others. But like almost all other generalizations (including this one!) this is not the fact. My own view is that the movies are fundamentally different because the main character in each movie (Dustin Hoffman in "The Graduate" and Richard Benjamin in "Goodbye, Columbus") acts from completely different motives. I found Hoffman's character admirable, Benjamin's character despicable.

In "The Graduate" Hoffman is a confused, immature young man who rebels against the values of his parents, yet is led to maturity by love. Along the way he is seduced by the famous "Mrs. Robinson"; however, he raises himself out of this sordid affair because of his love for Mrs. Robinson's daughter. At the end true love prevails. A trifle unreal, I admit, but nonetheless satisfying and admirable.

But what about Richard Benjamin in "Goodbye, Columbus"? I find him a thoroughly selfish person. He actively seduces Ali McGraw — repeatedly and in her own home. There is no Mrs. Robinson here. In fact, the character in "Goodbye, Columbus" corresponding to Mrs. Robinson is Ali McGraw's father, whose values are decidedly materialistic, but whose love and concern for his daughter are evidently sincere. Ali is an object of lust, not love, to Benjamin; he is much more interested in her birth control device than he is in the act of love. When she experiences deep feelings of guilt because of her betrayal of her parents' values, he does not walk away with her, as Dustin Hoffman did with Katherine Ross in "The Graduate." He walks away from her. Can we say that what he felt for her was love?

To me, the basic difference in the movies is that, under the impact of many circumstances — especially the affair with Mrs. Robinson and love for Katherine Ross — Dustin Hoffman matured, he "graduated." The tragedy of "Goodbye, Columbus" ("Columbus" stands for a stage of immaturity) was that Benjamin did not grow under the impact of circumstances, his lust did not change to love, he remained the same selfish person he was at the beginning of the movie. The tragedy of "Goodbye, Columbus" was that Richard Benjamin did not say goodbye to Columbus.

Baseball '69—What a Year! Ranked 8th in U.S.

The year 1969 was a year of firsts for our Monarch Baseball team. It was the first team to win 21 games, the first team to have a player sign with the pros. The first team to play the big three of Florida, University of Florida, Florida State and Miami. Also the Monarchs beat all three of them: Florida 5-4, Florida State 3-2, and Miami 11-10. I guess about the biggest first to have been gained by a team was that they were ranked number eight among the nation's top small colleges. It sure is a credit to the boys and of course Coach Bill Meyer and assistant Tim Crosby.

Although they won 21 games they did lose 15, 90% of which could have been won. So, you see, there is much room for improvement.

I think Coach Meyer summed it up rather well when he said, "Although I wasn't entirely satisfied with the 1969 season, I feel it was a successful one in many respects in that we were able to defeat the traditional big three of Florida, achieve a national ranking, and set a school record of 21 victories."

One may think that after all the "firsts" achieved by the Monarch Squad of '69 that Coach Meyer might be a hard man to please but remember with all those glories, fifteen losses is pretty hard for any coach to take.

Leading Monarchs in '69 would have to be Mark Monnerat, Fred Cambria, Ray Korn and Danny Leitzell. Monnerat, who now is a senior, led all hitters with a .327 average, not counting Cambria who had a sizable less amount of at bats. Mark had 41 hits in 125 trips to the plate, scored 34 runs along with 12 R.B.I.'s. It must also be noted that he only struck out three times.

Fred Cambria, who is now signed with the Pittsburgh Pirates but is completing his education at St. Leo, was another big factor in '69. Fred had a 0.73 E.R.A., but only appeared in seven games as a pitcher. His record of 1-3 certainly was not indicative of his performance. The one win was a big one, beating Florida State 3-2 on a cold, windy Sunday afternoon. Since his arm gave way toward the middle of the season, coach Meyer positioned him at first base to make use of his hitting. He finished the season with a .354 average with 23 hits in 65 attempts and he also led the team in homers with three.

Varsity Club News

The members of the Varsity Club cordially welcome all our fellow students back to St. Leo.

Fred, who is signed with the Pirates as a pitcher proved his worth in the minors this summer. In class AA competition with the York Club he pitched a perfect game and compiled a 9-2 record along with an all important E.R.A. of 2.2. Watch for this boy quite soon in the Major League.

I know no one will forget 1969 graduating hurler Ray Korn. Ray was the workhorse pitcher of the staff as he pitched in 15 games, 12 of which he started, and he completed seven. His won-loss record was 7-6 but his E.R.A. was more indicative of his strength at 2.13. Ray struck 99 batters and walked 49 as he pitched 92 2/3 innings. Needless to say, we'll surely miss him as well as Cambria.

Surprises were many last year, but one of the most pleasant had to be Freshman sensation Danny Leitzell. "Leitz" batted .323 with 42 hits, the most on the team. He scored 31 runs, second in this department again. Dan, it can be noted, wasn't an easy man to strike out either, whiffing only 15 times in a 130 trips to the plate. He is only a sophomore now so look out for him.

Let me mention, of course, that these were not the whole team, not by a long shot. There was Ken Kamradt, now a junior who batted .291. Joe Sice, now a senior, who batted .23 and threw out many base runners from his catching position. Mark Plisko who batted .299, batting only .201 through the first half of the season. The pitching staff had other heroes as well. Bob Case with a won-loss record of 3-2, Kevin Carlin at 5-2 and Dave Korczkowski at 3-0. I guess not many will forget the performance Dave gave in the Miami game when he came on in relief in the second with the Monarchs trailing and pitched eight scoreless innings giving up only three hits. In the meantime, his mates picked 11 runs on 17 hits to give him and the Monarchs an 11-10 victory before the roaring packed house at Massey Field. There was also freshman Ken Warning who in his first appearance as pitcher, being converted by Coach Meyer last year, shut out a tough University of Connecticut squad 1-0.

The Monarchs on the whole batted a fine .273 as a team with a respectable .949 fielding average, an improvement from 1968.

Well all but four of the team are back, and I understand there are quite a few bright newcomers so it looks good for 1970!

Our main purpose this year will be in promoting school spirit concerning all varsity sports along with many projects which we hope will support our purpose.

We hope that the student body will come out and help us support the soccer team in their upcoming season.

Let's all give a 100% this year.
