Parents and students alike can take a break from academic endeavors to enjoy sports events such as the Parent's Son-Daughter Golf Tourney and the Dad's Softball Game.

For the adventurous, a bus will provide transportation to Busch Gardens on Tuesday.

A Freshman Variety Show and the college theatre's first production, "A sleep of Prisoners" will offer Parents a look at student talent.

Class Officers to be elected

Passing of a referendum to allow "the Freshman Class to elect four male resident students and two female resident students to the S.G.A." was voted on and passed by the student

body last Tuesday, October 17.

The delegates shall be elected during the first two weeks of the fall trimester.

In order for the refer-

endum to have been passed, 690 students must have voted. A total of 706 voted.

Class officers for the Freshman Class will be elected next week. Students interested in becoming officers or representatives should pick up a petition from Mrs. Fowler's office in Saint Edward's Hall. The petitions are to be returned to her office by 10 a.m. Tuesday with at least signatures of not less than ten (10) per cent of the freshman class. Campaign posters can be put up on campus, only after the petition has been returned to Mrs. Fowler's office. No posters can be placed on the windows of the Campus Store, the Snack Bar or anywhere in the upstairs of McDonald Center. Also, no nails are to be used. Any signs smaller than 15" x 15" must be mounted on poster board. All signs are to be removed by noon on Wednesday.

The election will be held Wednesday and run-offs will take place on Thursday. The election results will be announced Thursday evening at the Freshman Parents Son-Daughter Banquet.

WHAT IN THE WORLD-*"riding the trigger"*

National

President Johnson, Wednesday night, gave new voice on his stand on Vietnam. The Presidential statement came amid rising protests against the war and after visiting Prime Minister Lee Kuan Yew of Singapore, urged U.S. restraint.

His statement as to "riding the tiger" means the U.S. will see through it's Vietnam commitment no matter what.

From this, we can only see more blood shed and a higher cost of life to American motherhood in the persons of their sons.

Congress

A new way of figuring the federal budget, aimed at ending the present confusing system in which 3 different sets of budget figures are used, was prepared by a special presidential commission.

The new system, the commission said, would provide a more accurate measure of the impact of governmental activities on the economy and make it easier for Congress to evaluate the consequences of it's votes on government spending programs.

This came only after Congress had refused to pass the 10% Surtax unless the administration cuts back on its budget. Our Congressmen are really doing their job.

Vietnam

No one is certain how many refugees there are in South Vietnam. Equally unsure is how much of the American money, meant to help them, is getting down to their level.

The U.S. is giving more than \$25 million to the South Vietnamese Government this year to aid re-

fugees and will give more than \$30 Million next year.

Government figures show there have been more than two million refugees at one time or another during the past two and a half years. Of this number, 700,000 remain in refugee camps and temporary shelters.

If something is not done to help these people, we may end up "tripping over" and "stepping" on our allies to free them.

England

Prime Minister Harold Wilson declared himself 100% convinced of the U.S.

Government's desire for a Vietnam peace and warned Hanoi against a power build up during any new halt in the American bombing of North Vietnam.

The British leader, at the same time, said his country would be against any invasion of the Communist North by American troops.

Latin America

Last week, the death of Ernesto (Che) Guevara was confirmed by Bolivian officials. Che had been taken prisoner after a battle in Quebrada del Yuro. When captured, he was alive but wounded. The next day, he was executed, even though Bolivia has no death penalty. This was done so that other Latin American Countries would not have guerrilla uprisings.

Now, after many years of mystery, the truth of Che Guevara is known.

Cairo

Jordan's King Hussein conferred with Egypt's President Gamal Abdel Nasser on a tour of world capitals, including Moscow and Washington, to seek a solution of the Middle East crisis.

The talk between Hussein and Nasser was their second in three weeks. The Jordanian king stopped off in Cairo before flying to Moscow last month. He plans to visit Washington next month for talks with President Johnson.

Fresh Look at B-ball

Coach Howie Fagan's rejuvenated basketball squad has been weight lifting, distance running and sprinting itself into top physical condition for the upcoming season.

Fagan comes to Saint Leo from Mount Carmel High School in Chicago where he earned quite an illustrious reputation in basketball circles. Since 1961, his teams scored a total of 150

victories against only 45 defeats, including an 81-8 tally over the past three seasons.

Rich Wallace leads the list of returning lettermen including Bob Hartv, Charlie Knudsen and Dan Makosky. Jim Caboy, inelligible last year because of his transfer, also joins the Monarch hoopers.

Several athletic scholarships were granted to Fagan hopefuls. They are: Larry Moore, a 5' 9" 165 pound Prep-school All-American from Mount Carmel; Dave Lewis, 6' 5" 222 pounds, also from Mount Carmel; Mike O'Brien, 6' 7" 215 pounds; Kevin Connors, 6' 4" 195 pounds; Pat Monogue, a 6' 2" 185 pounder with All-Catholic league honors from Chicago; Greg O'Connell, 6' 7" 215 pounds, an All-State from Connecticut and Clyde Alexander, a 6' 6" 220 pound two time All-Stater from Florida.

Coach Fagan refused to make a prediction on the '67 '68 season but allowed that the Monarchs have a respectable schedule.

"We won't be content with a .500 season," he stated. "We plan to go into each game fresh with no other thought than to win that game."

In what the coach believes is Saint Leo's first step toward becoming nationally recognized, a broader, tougher schedule has been devised for next season. De Paul University of Chicago, Lewis College, Northern Illinois University, Fairfield University and the Coast Guard Academy have already been booked for 1968.

As for the present, Fagan likes to stress the importance of school spirit.

"No athletic program can succeed without a highly enthusiastic student body," he points out, "I would like to see the spirit at Leo rivaling the pride of the Marine Corps!"

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

Perhaps some of our readers did not agree with our column last week; however, in our opinion, ours wasn't the worst farce on that page.

We were "impressed" with the report by the Grievance Committee, which listed the reasons for our woes, and after comparing the grievances of the students and the responses from the administration, we believe that they are subject to further comment. The acceptance of such reasons without criticism only illustrates the caliber of our "representative student government."

Since "the school needs more money," all students are charged a language fee regardless of whether or not they are taking a language. The logic behind this statement is clear, but acceptance of such a reason borders on the ridiculous. It is inconceivable that any community regardless of size can levy such a "tax" without stating the purpose or use of the fee. Although our pockets have already been drained and we are powerless to remedy the situation, we are still to criticize.

Concerning transportation, "students have no bus service this year." However, on page twelve in the Saint Leo Catalogue it is stated under Services: "Transportation--on a regular run basis to San Antonio and Dade City." This appears to be a direct violation of the student-college agreement. According to the Grievance Committee Report, the Board of Directors of Saint Leo discontinued bus service because the cost for operation this year would be \$21,000. The question the committee failed to answer is: why does the bus service cost so much? Is it a result of the cost of gasoline, of paying bus drivers, or is there a toll charge between Dade City and San Antonio? Again, we are powerless to remedy the situation.

Finally, with regard to the food situation, our SGA has been working diligently to correct this evil; therefore, we will leave this matter in their "capable" hands, and perhaps within a few years their efforts will be fruitful.

It appears that the Grievance Committee attempted to report complaints from the student body, but they failed because they neglected several important incidents, one of which seemed to be a direct infringement upon the

property rights of the co-ed members of the student body. In a recent episode on the "Hill," the unoccupied rooms of several co-eds were entered and thoroughly searched.

At approximately 11 p.m. October 9, 1967, a dorm meeting was called for all girls residing in the Priory. This meeting was to take place on the second floor of the Priory, but the advisors complained about the excessive "heat" on that floor and suggested that the meeting be held on the lower level. When the girls were assembled on the first floor, the advisors the first floor, the advisors informed then, "We love you." The advisors further stated that they would never enter any of the girls' rooms and search for stolen property. However, at this same time while the girls were being deliberately detained with the meeting, another team of advisors was busy entering the unoccupied rooms of the girls in search of alcoholic beverages. Secured doors were unlocked; rooms were completely searched. Even personal articles such as purses, jewelry boxes, boxes containing personal letters, etc. were inspected. Finally, personal property was removed from the rooms. After the completion of the inspection, the meeting ended, and the co-eds were told to return to their rooms. Those who had locked suitcases in their rooms were ordered to unlock them for purposes of inspection." The following evening many of the girls were instructed to report to the Priory Lounge, but were forced to wait for hours in the stairwell. At approximately 9:30 p.m. these girls were told to write a statement in defense of themselves, but they were not informed of the charges brought against them. Separately, these girls were called before a council consisting of the same "loving" advisors and the advisors who searched their rooms. Each statement was read, and every girl was interrogated. Finally, accusations were brought against these girls for violations of college policy with regard to possession and consumption of alcoholic beverages. The girls were then instructed to return to their rooms and wait for further action to be taken. At

approximately 12 p.m. the first girl was again brought before the council but it wasn't until two o'clock in the morning when the last sleepy and confused co-ed came before the council and received a recommendation for punishment. Some of these recommendations were based on the "fresh smell" of alcohol in empty containers found in rooms; other recommendations were based on the "coldness" of the containers. Those who were not charged with consuming alcohol in their rooms were charged with possession. However, some of the girls charged with possession had nothing more than empty bottles or cans. The recommended punishments ranged from suspension to being campused. However, after lengthy appeals through many channels, these punishments were changed to range from probation to being campused.

On the following day during General Seminar, the same type of search was conducted in the other co-eds' dorms.

We believe that if rooms must be "inspected," the occupant should be present. However, to search personal property without a search warrant is illegal. Also, the removal of private property without consent of the owner is not only illegal but unconstitutional. Furthermore, we feel that the deviousness and hypocrisy with which this unorthodox program was conducted is unethical, intolerable, and of a dictatorial nature. To convict and to sentence these students on purely circumstantial evidence is unlawful.

The illegal search and removal of private property is as much a violation of law as the illegal possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages. Therefore, we believe that those responsible for this injustice owe an explanation and an apology not only to these girls but to the entire student body as well.

In conclusion, we believe that we have listed

obvious violations in "our" student-college agreement, violations of personal rights of the student body, and inconsistencies within the college structure. Yet, the administration expects us to abide by "our" agreement which they seem to ignore. We have been reminded in CSR's of our responsibility to the school--in particularly STUDENT SERVICE. We have also been reminded of the penalties for not upholding our portion of the contract. The college has a right to expect from the students, but in return, the students have a right to expect from the college, yet it appears to be a one way street.

According to John Locke's Theory of Government, the purpose of government is to protect the natural rights of life, liberty, and property. The ruler must agree to rule justly; the people, in turn, agree to obey the ruler. However, if the ruler fails the people, the people have a right to revolt.

In comparison, we believe that if we are to obey the rulers in this community, we must be ruled in accordance with consistency and justice. Furthermore, if the college violates its portion of the contract, the students, in turn, may consider the contract void. We believe that infringements upon our rights have been made; therefore, "our" contract is invalid.

According to the pre-season polls, Notre Dame, Texas and Michigan State were picked to finish ahead of Southern CAL. But USC has disregarded the pre-season ratings. Three of their five victories have been against Notre Dame, Texas and Michigan State. Instead of being behind them, USC ranks on top as No. 1.

Speedy Duncan, of the first place San Diego Chargers broke an A.F.L. record last Sunday, by running 101 yards for a TD on an intercepted pass, as the undefeated Chargers whipped the K.C. Chiefs 45-31. It was the second loss of the season for the Chiefs. If they want to repeat the A.F.L. champs, the Chiefs better start working on their defense.

In the N.F.L. three games were decided in the closing moments. Minnesota upset Green Bay when Fred Cox kicked a 12 yard field goal with eight seconds left and the Atlanta Falcons gained a tie with Washington on Wade Traubham's 31 yard field goal with only two seconds left. And in New York, Fran Tarkenton's 59 yard TD pass to Joe Morrison off a triple reverse gave the Giants a 27-24 victory over the Steelers with only a minute remaining.

The University of Tulsa has had it easy the past few weeks. In their last two games, Tulsa has scored 135 points while holding their opponents scoreless.
