

# Nader To Speak At '72 Commencement

Ralph Nader, America's most famous and most effective critic, muckraker, consumer crusader and public defender will address the Saint Leo College Commencement Exercises for the Class of 1972 on Sunday, April 30.

Nader and his study group have written many books in connection with his work. Among them are: "What to Do with Your Bad Car", "The Chemical Feast", "The Interstate Commerce Omission", "Old Age - the Last Segregation", "Vanishing Air", "The Water Lords", "Water Wasteland", and "The Workers". All attempt to expose

the doings and undoings of the business industry.

In 1965 Nader wrote his most controversial book entitled "Unsafe at any Speed" which in the preface states, "A great problem of contemporary life is how to control the power of economic interests which ignore the harmful effects of their applied science and technology. The automobile tragedy is one of the most serious of these man-made assaults on the human body. The history of that tragedy reveals many obstacles which must be overcome in the taming of any mechanical or biological hazard."

"Unsafe at any Speed" was a

scathing indictment of the auto industry for the production of unsafe vehicles. His charges are acknowledged to be responsible for the enactment of consumer protection laws, for the elimination of unsafe additives to food products, for the recall of defective automobiles and for the countless other advancements in the areas of safety, sanitation and pollution control.

Nader has taken such tough stands against the automobile industry in Detroit, President Nixon's economic policies and the credibility of the advertising business. His documented criticisms of the government and industry have had widespread repercussions and as TIME magazine noted, "he is the U.S.'s Toughest Customer."

The New York Times said of Nader, "What sets Nader apart is that he has moved beyond social criticism to effective political action."

His book "Action for a Change" is a student type manual for the organizing of public interest. Written in 1971, the book is a practical step-by-step guide to forming Public Interest Research Groups like Nader's own. The purpose of the book was to make the student fully aware of his role in beginning and organizing political groups that can be affective.

Nader was born in 1934 and was raised in Winsted, Connecticut. He graduated magna cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa from Princeton University in 1955. He received his law degree from Harvard University in 1958. He first became interested in automotive safety while an undergraduate and he wrote several articles for the Harvard Law School newspaper, one of which was later expanded to form the basis for his first book. Working in his modest one-room Washington office for up to sixteen to twenty hours a day, often seven days a week, Nader is an infinitely dedicated, inexhaustably persistent crusader whose entire waking life is devoted to the causes he champions.

Our presentation includes chanting, dancing, experimental theatre, transcendental rock and folk music, light show, and visual projections, mind and spiritual feasting on ancient Yoga food.

## Students Unhappy

### Food Uprouar Again

People must always have food for thought, but for some people at St. Leo there are always cynical thoughts about the food.

The latest cries of outrage seem to find their roots in the cafeteria's new cash card system. It seems that some students think that under the new system they are receiving less for their money.

Responding to student concern over the new system, "The Lion" sought to ascertain whether the newest cries of cafeteria discontent have any foundation. With this objective in view, "The Lion" confronted Mr. Marshall Briscoe, Cafeteria Manager, and Mr. Thomas Piazza, Comptroller of the College, who together worked out the change of policy. Mr. Piazza and Mr. Briscoe were most cooperative, as they each granted "The Lion" an

informative and elucidating interview.

As a result of said interview it became apparent that the main reason for the change was to satisfy the request for a more equitable system of payments.

Under the old system, the heavy eater was being indirectly subsidized by the light eater. Meals may have seemed to cost less under said system, but the actual money being payed to the cafeteria was equal to that being payed under the new system. The apparent difference was made up by the student who did not eat a given meal. For example, an average of about 200 students, who ate breakfast during the week, were able to eat more for the same amount of money they would spend this semester, because over 500

## Power Structure Embraces Ecology Movement



At the last Senate meeting of Semester 1, while describing the new meal card program, you stated that students would be charged fifteen cents for the first glass of milk, and every glass of milk thereafter would be without charge.

I am not questioning the rationale behind the existing prices, nor am I questioning the right of the cafeteria to operate in the black.

What I do take offense to, is the fact that one statement is made publicly to the student official legislative body of the collegiate community, and, without explanation or apology, another course of action is taken.

Also, the fact the cafeteria is charging ten cents for two slices of bread, and one cent per tab of butter is carrying things just a little too far. The only thing the cafeteria isn't charging for is water, and if trends continue, that day will be upon us shortly.

## Out of State Absentee Registration

All Saint Leo College Students who are from the states of Arizona, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, Missouri, New Mexico, New York, Ohio, Texas, or Wisconsin will have the opportunity, next week, to register Absentee so that they may take part in the upcoming primaries and general presidential elections of November.

This service will be arranged by the Student Vote Committee of the Student Government Association.

During the week of January 24-29, an absentee registration booth will be opened daily from ten o'clock in the morning until three in the afternoon in the lower level of the McDonald Student Center. All you must do is come by and give us your

name. You sign a form letter addressed to the registrar or your home county requesting application for registration, and the Student Vote Committee will cover the cost of mailing. Shortly thereafter, you shall receive necessary forms from your local registrar. You simply fill out the forms and bring them by our office at a designated time when we shall provide free notary public services and free return postage.

Remember, you can't vote unless you register. And you can't register unless you take the time to do it. And what could be easier than simply signing your name next week at the Student Center.

So get INVOLVED and do your thing. You and the other twenty-five million potential youth votes of America can change the world.

students were not regular breakfast goers.

Now a student only pays for what he eats. It is indeed surprising that such an inequitable arrangement was not corrected sooner.

Some students will take this change to mean that now everyone is being cheated to the same extent. This claim is totally lacking support. The food at St. Leo College is sold at a price which barely covers the cost of production, if indeed it does that much. Some students have been complaining, for example, about the price of milk. It seems that some have the idea that they are being milked by a gang of "capitalistic pigs". However, this is not true. The cafeteria purchases milk at \$1.05 per gallon which would make the purchase cost of one serving over 12 cents for the milk alone. With the cost of the cup at over a penny, the cafeteria must pay almost 14 cents for the product. If one were to add the cost of handling, breakage, etc., one would hardly be able to see much profit on a cup of milk

which is sold to the student for 15 cents.

St. Leo's Cafeteria does not get special buys on its food, as do some large state universities. The cafeteria must purchase its foods at the same prices as most restaurants.

When one compares the price of items sold in the cafeteria with the price of comparable items at most restaurants where there is usually a 27% profit on the average item-one begins to wonder whether people who constantly complain have ever

eaten at a restaurant other than "The Salvation Army Kitchen".

The reason the cafeteria is able to sell the average item at a substantially lower price is that its purpose is to serve the college community, not to profit from the students. To illustrate this, it should be pointed out that the cafeteria operated at a deficit of \$39,450 last year. This year there is a projected deficit of at least that figure.

It really seems like such a terrible pity to deprive the grippers of the most vital issue.


In the ceremony the parents asked that their son be blessed

"Future Shock" is becoming a very widely read book. Many young people as well as old are interested in the future so "Future Shock" sounds as if something shocking might happen in the future to persons living life in general.

This book is mainly concerned with things that are happening today which will be the cause of a whole new life style to be found in the future.

There are several points that are brought out in "Future Shock". The first is that we are living in an age of transience. A person sees more and experiences more things in a lifetime than ever before. All things come and pass.

The second is that our society is a disposable one. People are attached to other people and things for shorter periods of time. Objects, such as goods, are made to be used for a short period of time and then thrown away. These are called disposables. For

example, a young person might buy five pairs of shoes for \$50, whereas an older person would buy one pair for the same price to last 10 years. This is the whole new trend of relationships that develops into the generation gap. While old people are still in their own world, young people are adapting readily to the very fast technological changes in society.

The last point I'll bring out in the book, however is the mere fact that people can't keep up with the fast pace of life, e.g. the new research in science and medicine. It is almost blowing their minds. In an age of population explosion people are stressing the limitations on births but on the other hand (contradictory) new discoveries are preventing people from dying.

There is experimentation with a newly discovered "youth pill" which prevents body cells from eventually dying away! Congestion causes psychological breakdown in people.

There are so many different thoughts brought in this book, which are super-interesting. It is well worth the time spent to read it.

On December 9, 1971, shortly before Christmas vacation two migrant houses in Pasco County caught fire and burned.

The two houses in Darby are five miles west of San Antonio belonging to a Mexican migrant named Rodriguez. The family consisted of four adults and thirteen children. Their main occupation here in Florida is orange picking, and then later on they go to Ohio to pick tomatoes. The age of the family

ranged from eight months to eighteen years, and they are expecting a new baby.

Dr. Horgan asked for clothing in a few of his classes, with students and secretaries responding with over fifty pounds of useable teen-age clothing brought from home.

The family is still in need of clothing during the orange picking season.

The Director of Men, Mr. Timothy Crosby reports 20 new resident men for the January

semester, 10 of whom are Freshmen, 5 are transfer students, and 5 who have reapplied.

Mr. Crosby has also reported an increase of 12 day students, 8 of which are reapplicants, and 4 are transfers.

The new resident students come mainly from New York and New Jersey with even a student from Tokyo, Japan.

Sister Lucy, Dean of Student Affairs, has appointed Kathie Schrader her new secretary to the Dean of Student Affairs replacing Mrs. Nadine Fowler.

Miss Rose Fernandez, Dean of Women, is urging all women students to write now to their U.S. senators to vote for the passage of the equal rights for women amendment without change. The amendment will be before the senate by February 1972.

The Security Personnel at Saint Leo College were formerly directly responsible to the Department of Student Affairs.

Effective January 5, 1972 Dr. Southard directed that Security would become directly responsible to the President.

This modification is in keeping with the common organizational structure among colleges. The basic reason for this is that the function and responsibility of Security transcends the student personnel that is Security functions with a college-wide responsibility of which Student Affairs is but one of these functions.

Traffic with its many personal changes, breakups and regrouping have come out with their fifth album, and it is one of their best to date.



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## The Era of Era's

With silver gleaming, the tall six foot high basketball trophy now adorns the UCLA trophy case symbolizing the best college basketball team in America. Rightfully so the crown has belonged to the Bruins for the last five years in a row. Beginning with the Goodrich-Hazard era of the early 1960's, continuing through the Alcindor years and finally climaxing with the Wicks-Rowe-Patterson era of the late 70's, the Wooden coached teams have won seven of the last eight NCAA National Basketball Championships.

For UCLA fans this dominance has been overwhelming to the point of monotony as with each new four year period, a new era begins and a new champion takes its place among UCLA greats.

The 1971-72 Bruin basketball fan is faced with the Walton era, which is in its first year and shows signs of becoming a dynasty typical of the past. Only time will tell if the skinny six foot, eleven inch giant can place his team and himself among the UCLA immortals of old.

Each year among the various sports trade magazines the college basketball predictions flow like butter off a hot waffle iron and this year is no exception. The obvious choice is for the Bruins to repeat as national champions but within the setup of the NCAA hundreds of college basketball teams will be making a run at the coveted prize.

These are a few teams that might make it to the top of college basketball in 1972.

One such team is the Maryland Terrapins, who under the skillful coaching of Lefty Driesell, have risen to a position known as "the UCLA of the East." Not bad for a team which was 14 and 12 last year and 6 and 22 the year before. All the talk centers around a Mansfield, Pa., kid by the name of McMillen, who even in high school was being raved as the best college basketball player ever.

With the McMillen era in its first year, the Terrapins will win the ACC but to go further they will need alot more than what Driesell has to offer. The coaching of this team of individuals is below par and in the regional tournament the superior teams will advance; and the Terrapins will be left like a sailor without a ship.

Over at Marquette, the Chones and minus Meminger era is in its second year after a stunning 28 and 1 first year. The Warriors had a 37 game winning streak snapped by Ohio State in the NCAA Mideast Regionals last year and this year Coach Al McGuire will wish he had Dean the Dream back. I doubt that Marquette will get as far as they did last year but in the NCAA anything is possible.

The "UCLA of the South" is definitely North Carolina who, under the guidance of Coach Dean Smith, will seek to improve on last years NIT Champions. With four starters back the Chamberlain-McAdoo era has set the wheels in motion for the long train ride out to the coast where the NCAA Tournament will be held. Depending on their astrological signs, the Tar Heels could achieve greatness or failure depending on what quarter the moon is in.

Among the teams fighting, there are still countless numbers that are not mentioned, here is a few more.

The Florida Southern Mocassins invaded St. Leo, yesterday, next week the Crugars of Birmingham Southern College are here and then two days later the Tigers of Towson State College arrive from Baltimore, Maryland. For the Monarchs, who have won only one of eleven, these clashes are looked on as only, "a continuation of a dismal cage season." A season in which Head Coach Norm Kaye had hoped would be around the .500 mark or better. But now the Monarchs are 1-10 and the possibilities of winning only two or three more are extremely rare, at this point in the season.

The 1971-72 Monarchs are scoring an average of 75.4 points a game. On the other hand they are giving up 92.3 points to their opposition. The difference is roughly 17 points a game, and this year the Monarchs have lost by some wide margins. Forty-one points to Florida Southern and the University of Hartford; between ten and twenty points to teams like Bethune-Cookman, Otterbein College, Florida Tech, and Florida A.M. The lone win was over Benedictine College of Illinois by eight points on January 8. This win stopped a six game losing streak and the Monarchs have currently lost

four in a row.

Last year's team scored an average of 79 points a game and gave up 75 points a game. The 1969-70 team scored an average of 83 points per game and the opponents scored 82 points a game. It seems the Monarchs are scoring the same, but giving up more and enjoying it less. This is anti-typical of a Norm Kaye coached team which is founded on the rock of defense. Norm Kaye has always taught basics and fundamentals as the first thing you learn when playing basketball. If his players show nothing at all after four years of basketball, the one thing they show is basics and fundamentals

Another amazing statistic is that the Monarchs are turning over the ball an average of 21 times a game. This is 21 shots that the Monarchs did not take, and therefore since the team is making 45 percent of their shots, this is roughly 22 points that the Monarchs did not have. "Most of the turnovers come in the first half," Kaye said, "when the game is at its decision points."


"The first ten minutes of the game tell the whole story of whether a team will win or lose," Kaye stated while leaning up against the counter. He was decked out in blue striped bellbottoms and a checkered

pullover, not showing any signs of the strains associated with being Athletic Director or coaching for twenty years. The disastrous first halves, that have plagued the Monarchs, have been the chief factor in some of the losses. Against Florida A+M, the Monarchs were behind by 16 at half but came on to outscore the Rattlers in the second half to eventually lose by 10, 107 to 97. Against Bethune-Cookman, in the second game of the season, the Monarchs were behind by 20 at half, but put together a good second half to lose by the score of 98 to 88. Against Otterbein College, the Monarchs trailed by 23 at half and eventually lost by 16. Still it was a good second half as the Monarchs lost to this smaller, more experienced team from Ohio.

Some of the games have been out of reach at the beginning and end that way, but still with two good halves of basketball, St. Leo could have won a few more. Along with the turnovers there is the statistic known as loose balls. In this category, the Monarchs have a total of thirteen (13) in eleven games. This seems incredible because usually a good team will get its share of loose balls. Both turnovers and loose balls are direct products of the inexperience and youth that prevails on this years team.

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# What Can You Say About Our Team

What do you write about a team which has lost ten of eleven games? That they were bad? That they loved Bach, Beethoven, or the Beatles?

Do you say that they have lost all close games? (The opposition has beaten St. Leo by an average score of 18 points per game.) Do you say that they were inexperienced? (The five starters on the team average only two years of college among them.) Do you say that they were small? (The team has a 6'4 center and averages only 6'2 per man.) Do you say that the opposition was just extra large? (Bethune-Cookman had 6'11 and a 6'10 man, Florida AM with a pair of 6'11's and Florida Southern with a front line averaging 6'6 per man.)

That they did not have the home court advantage? (Eight of the first eleven St. Leo games were at home.) That they did not have good coaching? (Norm Kaye has never had this bad a record in 20 years of coaching.) Do you say that their is no winning tradition at St. Leo? (Last year's team won 16 of 23 games and brought to an end the highly successful O'Brien-O'Connell era.)

Do you say that they did not have any talent? (Guillermo Cancio-Bello is possibly the best

overall guard in SLC history; and Greg Weidemann, a good rugged forward, could have started on last year's team; and John Conley, a fast good shooting guard who could score at least 25 points per game if needed.

Do you say that they were poorly prepared? (Kaye's season begins and ends with drills and fundamentals.) That they played in a poorly lit, dim arena? Bowman Activity Center is the best sports complex in Central Florida.

Do you say that injuries have wiped out the starting five and poor old Norm is forced to play with two football players, a third string freshman basketball player and a member from the student body, like Notre Dame this year? In truth, except for sophomore Jim Kiley's ring worms and a few sore ankles, the team has been relatively injury free.

In a poor season fans, players and coaches suffer. And we at Saint Leo can only dream of O'Brien-O'Connell of last year and try to look forward to next year.

One bright outlook on the horizon is that Kaye the Coach will pull something out of his magic bag of tricks in time for the 1972-73 season.
