## Working Drawings Approved - Kiefer Named Fund Chairman

Saint Leo College has given authority by its board of directors to obtain working drawings for its proposed combination Student Activities Center.

Hammer Building, Incorporated, of Tampa, has been commissioned to produce the drawings for the College by May 15 for the structure, according to

Rev. Stephen Herrmann, O.S.B., president of the College.

Dade City Pharmacist Alfred O. Kiefer, Sr., a trustee of the College and Mayor of the Town of Saint Leo, has been appointed general chairman of Pasco County's campaign for funds to aid in building the proposed Center. Kiefer will launch his campaign with \$60,000 already contributed in advance gifts and pledges toward the Pasco County goal of \$100,000.

Named by Chairman Kiefer to serve on the Pasco County committee are Ernest L. Griffin, Tampa Electric manager in Dade City; Aubrey R. McLelland, vice president of the Bank of Pasco County; Arthur H. Schrader, Jr., owner of the San Antonio Lumber Company; Bill Bailey of Radio Station WDCF, Dade City; Pasco County Rancher Danny Cannon; and Melvin H. Hansen, district supervisor for the Atlantic Airline School.

If Saint Leo College's board of directors approve the working drawings and give the go-ahead for construction, work on the new building can begin by mid-summer. Goal for completion of the building will be in December, in time for the season's first basketball game.

The proposed building will be able to seat 4,000 persons as an auditorium, or two basketball games can be carried on simultaneously with adequate room for spectators. As an auditorium, The main building is proposed as the home of the Saint Leo College-Community Artists Series.

The latest cost estimate for the building complex is around \$800,000. So far the College has received slightly more than \$200,000 in gifts and pledges. In addition, the College has applied for a federal government grant which will cover a third of the total cost. So far, the request for federal aid has been approved by the State of Florida and a final decision is expected from Washington.

The main building will be of decidedly novel construction. It will be built around a substantially prefabricated steel framework. From the ground to twelve feet height, the exterior will be of masonry and masonry-column construction. From the masonry to the topline, horizontally around the building, the exterior will be covered with steel paneling. PIO

## NEW PROMOTIONS ANNOUNCED

The Rev. Stephen Herrmann, president of Saint Leo College, has announced the promotion of two key faculty members at the College.

Norman Kaye, 36, who has served as director of athletics and acting dean of student affairs, has been elevated to the position of dean of student affairs. He also retains his position as athletic director.

Kaye, who lives at Lutz, holds a bachelor and a master of science degree from Northern Illinois University and has pursued his studies further at the University of Indiana. He is a Chicago native.

Kaye, an exuberant young man, displays his ability to lead in every phase of his life.

After graduating from college, he began his master work. He coached the freshman basketball team at the University of Indiana and also taught several courses for a year.

Service filled his next two years as he was stationed in Germany. During that time the basketball team kept him in good condition.

Lincoln Junior College in Illinois was a real challenge to Mr. Kaye. He was hired as the basketball coach and then promoted to Assistant Dean of Students. He later became the Assistant President of the College and was a counselor for seven years.

After visiting Florida, he was asked to the director of the resident program for Bay Campus in St. Petersburg. It is a branch of South Florida. He also took the responsibility of heading the Peace Corp training for Venqula.

The following year, Mr. Kaye was employed at Saint Leo.

Earl Grauer, 36, has been promoted from acting director to director of the college's division of fine arts. Grauer, who lives in Dade City, holds a bachelor of music education degree from the University of Southern Illinois. Grauer is native of Meridian, Miss. Before coming to Florida, he served as a choral director of Hillcrest High School in Dallas, Texas for seven years, as choral director of music in several churches. One of the most outstanding accomplishments of Mr. Grauer was the selecting of 400 voice children's choir from a 1,500 voice high school mass choir. They performed the Prologue to Boit's opera Mefietofele with the Dallas Symphony Orchestra in 1964. He has conducted many works with orchestra.

Mr. Grauer is a member of Phi Mu Alpha Simfonia (National Honary Fraternity in Music) and the Association of Choral Conductors.

Kaye, a bachelor, will be responsible not only for the rapidly growing Saint Leo College athletic program but will also be in charge of programs fostering the student government and student clubs, the student service (to the college) program, and events affecting the social and religious lives of the students. Both the deans of Men and Women come under his supervision.

Grauer, who serves as director of music for the First Methodist Church in Dade City, lives with his wife, Margaret, son Earl III, 4, and daughter, Lisa, 11 months, at 23 Happy Hill Road. His division

of fine arts at Saint Leo College includes the areas of music, art, theater and humanities.

Grauer also is director of the College's Summer Institutes. PIO



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# Monarchs on Five Game Winning Streak

The Monarchs are on a five-game rampage after whipping talented West Georgia in the series opening doubleheader at Massey Field on Wednesday and sweeping a three game series (all shutouts) from Biscayne in Miami last weekend.

Ray Korn, Fred Cambria and freshman Kevin Carlin hurled strong shutouts in the Biscayne set, picking up where the team left off in last tuesdays rain-shortened contest in tampa.

Saint Leo was leading in that game by a 3-0 margin after four and a half innings of play when the skies darkened and the Tampa boys stalled for time. The downpour began, spoiling Cambria's bid for his first win of the young season. He had allowed only two hits and aided his own cause with a run producing single in the second up to that point.

Korn fired a fine 7-0 whitewash last Friday giving up only one hit. Cambria finally picked up his intitial victory in the twin bill opener on Saturday zipping a 4-0 one hitter. The tall righthander was effective in his two previous outings but lacked offensive and defensive support. Carlin displayed winning form and complete recovery from his December leg injury in the nightcap by whiffing 13 Biscayne men in the seven inning encounter. He recorded his first win against no losses in the 7-0 rout.

"Kevin has got great potential," explained Coach Meyer, "He makes

this team stronger on the mound and at the plate. We were pleased that he had no stiffness in his legs on Sunday."

The well-coached, well-rounded West Georgia squad came to town on Wednesday for a six game, four day series. Last years' leading collegiate defensive team arrived boasting a 4-0 1967 record against the Monarchs.

"We feel strongly about losing four games to them. We think the hitting is improved and the pitching is deep enough for us to take the series. The boys are up for this, especially the lettermen who have been looking forward to West Georgia since last year." This was Meyer's Tuesday morning speculation.

On Wednesday afternoon Ray Korn beefed his record to 3-0 with a four hit 5-1 triumph. Captain Ernie Robinson provided all the offense needed with a two run poke to left in the fourth chasing Ken Kamradt and Mark Monnerat across the plate. Robinson later scored the inning's third run when he romped home on a passed ball.

Carlin got off to a shaky start in the second game on Wednesday won by Leo's 2-1. Eddie Czek, the freshman moundsman from tampa made his college debut in the third inning in a relief role. With the bases loaded and one out, the 5'11", 175 lb. righthander put out the fire with a strike out and a pop up. He ran into trouble in the sixth and Cambria was called in from his left field position for relief duty with two on and no outs. Fred let up a run on a basehit followed by a stolen base and an r. b. i. single. He settled down to end the game in the seventh and last frame by whiffing the east two to end the game.

The Monarchs scored in the first on an unearned run and again in the fourth when Robinson walked, took second on a passed ball and raced home on a tremendous double to left center by firstbaseman Mark Plisko.

Meyer seems to have his squad performing more smoothly than at the outset of the campaign. The hitting is coming around and there are fewer damaging errors committed.

"Carelessness in fundamentals hurt us in the Florida Southern and first University of Tampa game, Meyer explained. "The day after we made eight errors in one game, we held a strenuous drill, working on basics. Our defense has

definatly improved -- we committed only two errors in the Biscayne series," the freshman coach pointed out.

The pitching statistics indicate excellence! For 69 innings in nine games: 44 hits, 13 runs, five earned runs, 18 bases on balls, 75 strikeouts, and a combined earned run average of 0.64.

Offensively the Monarchs have tallied 35 runs and 50 hits for a team batting average of .203 and a won-lost record of 6-3. Lead-

ing hitters are sophomore shortstop Gary Bond -.400: the clutch hitting Ken Kamradt - .316; and freshman center fielder Larry Sorenson- .310.

At this writing, Ben Maciocio is scheduled to pitch in thursday's single game with Cambria taking the honors in Friday night's 8 p.m. event. Dave Korczykowski and Eddie Czek and Kevin Carlin will take the mound for Saturday's double header. Korczykowski, the freshman southpaw from Chicago, makes his first starting appearance for Leo's. He has worked two innings in relief previously.
