Mr. Robert B. Mautz, Vice President of Academic Affairs for the University of Florida, was the guest speaker at last Tuesday's Saint Leo Scholarship Convocation. Mr. Mautz is a member of the American Bar Association and the New York Bar. He is a graduate of Yale University and did graduate work at the University of Mexico.

Mr. Mautz, speaking to the assembled students of Saint Leo College congratulated the forty-six members of the student body who made the Deans' List this September.

In his speech the professor defined the term student "...as a person who savors life". He urged the students of today to go out into the world and to build their own standards. For Professor Mautz told them, "The standard by which you will be remembered will be one of your own design".

Professor Mautz, 52, is a brigadier general in the Air Force Reserve.

NEW PROGRAM NEW DUTIES

The main purpose of college is to help each student become a responsible citizen, which includes making decisions and assuming responsibilities. This year the residence hall program, headed by Dean Rodwick and Sister Maura, attempts to achieve this goal. By using students, in adult staff positions, a feeling is created which helps that person become a responsible citizen of the college community. Last year's sign-in procedure has been changed so that the student now has the opportunity to assert greater individual freedom, and therefore is forced into assuming the responsibility for this freedom. All that is asked of any male resident is that he sign a daily check sheet. This creates a system where by certain College staff personnel, friend or relatives can be notified in case of illness, physical or psychological problems or an emergency in which a student must be contacted.

The focus of the residence hall program this year, is on "personal responsibilities to one's self, others and God."

Liturgical Changes on Campus

The fuse of recent changes in the church has been ignited on campus. At the 5:15 p.m. mass on week days in Benoit Hall chapel, members of the congregation have been receiving communion under both species. Some of the participants feel more at home, and more acutely aware of what they are commemorating. Individuals have received the body of Christ with their own fingers, contrary to the conventional practice of what we may call, passive reception. The reality of the change from bread and wine to Christ's body and blood has become more authentic to the individual. Thus, there has been more active participation in

the mass, and consequently, the congregation is no longer a group of receivers, but rather RECIEVERS. Since these changes have made the mass a more personally significant experience, one is more likely to ASSIST than to ATTEND.

The Hootenanny Mass has become increasingly popular this year; the newly accepted members of the monastic community have taken over the direction of the musical arrangements. These masses will be celebrated in the Abbey Church, at 5:00 p.m. and at the Holy Name chapel at 7:00 p.m. on alternate Sundays. This Sunday the Hootenanny Mass will be in the Holy Name Chapel.

BETTER READERS HERE

This year at Saint Leo College the English Department has initiated a new experimental reading program. This program is to aid the student in reading. It is not a remedial course.

Brother Meinrad, who is teaching at Saint Leo for the first time, is in charge of this course.

The main objective of this class is to help the student become a better reader. Brother Meinrad hopes that "the students who enroll in this class will read more and will enjoy what they read".

At the present time, two hundred freshman and transfer students have been asked to take this course. These students were chosen from the group that took the reading test, which was administered during Orientation week. This class will benefit the average

student most. Being a non-credit class it will meet two or three times a week for fifty minutes. A \$10 fee is charged.

Next trimester a similar class of instruction will be offered. All work is done in the newly remodeled laboratory with special machines.

When asked his opinion of this course, Brother Meinrad replied, "It will be a fine course. Also it should be interesting and helpful. It will not discourage a student from reading but will encourage him to do so. We urge people to take it for their own benefit. It is most important to read with comprehension. Education is comprehending what has been read".

ELECTIONS

According to the Harris Poll, Governor George Romney of Michigan has slipped back to number four as a possible opponent of President Johnson in 1968. The three men ahead of him in order of popularity are Governor Nelson Rockefeller, Richard Nixon, and Governor Ronald Reagan.

Rockefeller said he was "very flattered", but would not seek the Republican nomination.

EDUCATION

The Detroit Federation of Teaching and the Detroit School Board came to a tentative agreement Sunday night which would bring 11,000 teachers back into the classrooms.

The agreement was ratified Monday and the school-aged children of Detroit reported back to school on Tuesday after 13 days of a teacher strike.

In New York, the teachers

have refused several proposals presented by the Board of Education. It looks like they are going to hold out for the wage increase with no compromises.

MOSCOW

The leaders of the Soviet and British Communist parties are urging preparations for a "Communist and Workers Parties" summit conference in a statement that accused Red China of hampering efforts to help North Vietnam.

The Soviets have been pushing for such a meeting in order to repair the damage caused by the Sino-Soviet split. Such a meeting would probably isolate Red China even more from the international movement by condemning the cultural revolution and deploring Communist unity.

The summit meeting will probably be held in Moscow during the 50th Anniversary of the Russian revolution in November. All Communist nations, except China and

Albania, are expected to attend.

UNITED NATIONS

The General Assembly will be in its regular session this week. Holding high priority on the list for discussion is the Middle East crisis. Perhaps we will get a solution to the problems of the Arabs and Israelis.

ECONOMICS

Last week, seven leading economists came before the House Ways and Means Committee to support the Administration's call for a 10 per cent surtax. Well over 300 academic economists added their written endorsement. Then came business-

men declaring that they were taxable and a host of Administrative officials pleading for higher taxes.

It appears that we may have a 10 per cent surtax by April 15.

VIET NAM

Bombers off the carriers Oriskany and Coral Sea rained bombs on the port Cam Pha. Cam Pha is only 46 miles northeast of Haiphong.

After congressional pressure on President Johnson to hit North Viet Nam harder, he gave the go-ahead to hit Cam Pha. The Navy scout reported that the port was damaged seriously. Cam Pha was the only money making port left in North Viet Nam.

SPOTLIGHT---

JIM GARRISON

This is the first of a weekly column in which we hope to bring to the attention of our readers several of the popular and controversial figures of our time. The first in this series of SPOTLIGHT will be concerned with the driving District Attorney of New Orleans, Jim Garrison.

In February of 1967, a New Orleans newspaper discovered that Garrison had spent over \$8,000 investigating the assassination of President Kennedy and flooded the newsstands with innuendos, "that perhaps Mr. Garrison is merely saving new information that will bring him national exposure." Garrison countered by confirming that an investigation was under way and further startled the nation by stating, "My staff and I solved the assassination weeks ago."

Overshadowing this event was an announcement to newsmen by David Ferrie, to the effect that the D.A. implicated him as the get-away pilot in the plan. Four days later, Ferrie was found dead in his downtown apartment, ostensibly from "natural" causes.

Undaunted, Garrison announced the arrest of a prominent businessman, Clay Shaw, on the charges of conspiracy, and declared that "Shaw was Clay Bertrand." (the shadowy queen bee of the homo-sexual underground in New Orleans)

On March 14, a panel of judges granted Garrison's case a preliminary hearing to determine if there was enough evidence against Shaw to bring him to trial. Perry Russo, a former "roommate" of Ferrie, testified that in September of '63, he attended a meeting at F Ferrie's apartment where Shaw, Oswald and Ferrie discussed assassinating J.F.K.. While a second witness, Vern Bundy, said Shaw passed a sum of money to Lee Harvey Oswald at a later date. On this evidence the judges ruled to lold the defendant for trial.

A Harris poll in May revealed that 66% of the American Public believe Garrison to be an important contributor to what they hoped would be a new investigation and reopening of the Warren Report. Despite the popular support, the District Attorney has run into one obstacle

after another. Three key witnesses fled the state and his office was refused the right of extradition. In early June came a second and by far the most crippling blow. A NBC special launched a blistering attack on Garrison's ethics, charging bribery, perjury, and planting of evidence. The broadcasting company even went so far as to name a burglar, whom they claimed was employed by the D.A. to place incriminating material in Shaw's home.

Garrison denied all such charges and was suprisingly granted an hour of prime television time by NBC to repudiate their claims. This gives rise to the belief that the first special was less than truthful.

It is inconcievable that a man such as Jim Garrison, with one of the most outstanding records of any person ever to hold such a public trust should be assaulted to the degree which we have witnessed. It is our opinion that Mr. Garrison's record needs no defense. For too long the American public as been inwardly troubled with conclusions drawn by the press and the Warren Report. It is unjust to claim that a public servant who disagrees with the accepted formula must be soley interested in personal publicity or political gain nor is it feasible to believe that any man would risk his public life by trying to deceive the nation with the cheap plots of which he has been accused.

'67 IFSC Champs

No one is looking forward to the forthcoming season of I.F.S.C. football more than Kevin "Bear" Briordy, Head Coach of the Sigma Beta Gators.

During a recent interview with the "Bear" we found that "The Team" is working quite hard to uphold their championship status. The coach was extremely pleased with the strength and depth of this years squad. "These qualities paired with a hardy spirit were evident in the season's early workouts", said the coach.

The Gators feel that with the strength and brotherhood established within the fraternity during the past years that they have a good chance at the title, "I.F.S.C. Football Champs of 1967."

The trial of Clay Shaw, alias Clay Bertrand, will come before the Bar in October, and no one has even tried to say whether or not the D.A. can come through as he has said he would. However, Mr. Garrison did have enough evidence to hold Shaw for trial and this fact shocked many non believers into agreeing that the accepted Assassination theory could be wrong. Even though more people are agreeing that perhaps he hasn't "staged" the whole thing, Mr. Garrison will be going up against strong opposition next month. There has been a great deal of time and money spent to discredit his witnesses and his case; yet he is still, what appears to many, over confidently repeating that he will win. "We are going to

win this case," says Garrison, and "anyone who bets against us is going to lose his money."
