Tour Europe - Receive Credit In May Session

A course in Comparative Government (Pcl 323) for the May session is being taught abroad.

During the 21 days of May, students can have the opportunity to travel in Europe. Portugal, Spain, France, Great Britain, Ireland and Italy are on the agenda.

Travel will be from New York to Lisbon by air, then with a Eurail Pass by train from Lisbon to London via Madrice and Paris. From London to Dublin and return a British Rail pass returning to Lisbon via Rome on the Eurail Pass- and then back to New York.

The cost of the trip will be approximately \$775 without personal spending.

Government centre, interviews with responsible government officials, visits to the Parliament, and hopefully an audience with Pope Paul will keep the students busy.

The course requirements are reading on all countries visited in area of government, course meeting each day, and a written essay about the tour or on government. Also a final examination will be written on the return air trip.

Professor Harry Gill will be available for any questions that might need answering.



Impressive Week Sees 5-8 Results

The Monarchs dropped a 6-0 decision to Duke U. last night capping an impressive week of baseball which found them victors in five out of eight games.

The opener of yesterday's day-night doubleheader with Rollins resulted in a 4-4 tie after 12 innings and the 7pm curfew.

Ben Macioco worked the first game letting up all four runs (only one of them earned) on 11 hits until he was taken out in the 10th for pinch-hitter Gary Bond. Eddie Czek finished the game (which will not be rescheduled) by whiffing three and allowing three hits in the final two frames.

Leo's tallied eight hits and also registered only one earned run.

Ray Korn suffered his first defeat of the season against Duke last night and now stands 4-1. He allowed all six runs on nine hits with seven strikeouts and five bases on balls.

The Monarchs threatened only twice. Ernie Robinson in the second inning advanced to third on an error and was thrown out by catcher Jim Hysong on an attempted passed ball advance. Korn singled to lead off the third, Larry Sorenson forced him at second, Mark Monnerat and Fred Cambria were then issued free passes; but the rally died on a ground out and a flyout.

Phil Wilhelm pitched a fine five hitter for Duke and picked up 11 strikeouts en route to victory.

Macioco and the Monarchs were beaten last Thurs. by a 9-5 count in the in the third game of the West Georgia series after clinching Wednesdays

doubleheader.

The tall senior hurled only four and a third innings giving up seven hits and seven runs. Kevin Carlin and Dave Korczykowski finished up allowing a run each.

Fred Cambria registered 13 strikeouts in his 2-1 Fri. night triumph over West Georgia. He showed pin point control, picking up his second win in only one week. He also contributed offensively with an eighth inning base hit which led to the tying run.

Tennis 4 - 7 3 Games Left

The Monarch tennis squad plays host to Stetson U. tomorrow at 2pm.

The team record is 4-7 after last Saturday's defeat bt Applachian State U. 9-0. Applachian, from Boone, N.C. boasts a 42-2 record over a four year period.
