## Need A Job-Placement Office

Saint Leo College has initiated a placement service under the direction of Harry C. Hamner, Jr. The Placement office is located in Saint Francis 16. The primary purpose of the Placement Office is to assist graduating seniors and alumni in choosing a career and in the location of desirable employment. In addition, assistance is offered to students in obtaining part time and summer employment. At the present, the Placement Office is making contacts throughout the nation to arrange for representatives of business and industry to come on campus for interviews with interested seniors. These interviews will commence in late February and continue through March. It is suggested that seniors frequently consult the bulletin board and make appointments in the Placement Office.

With respect to summer and part time employment, the Placement Office maintains contact with a variety of local employers and, in addition, will attempt to procure information pertaining to summer employment in other parts of the country. As job-openings occur, they will be placed on the bulletin board in the Placement Office.

To obtain the Placement services for summer and/or part time employment, simply fill out a brief application card which are in the Placement Office. For seniors interested in assistance in employment after graduation, they should complete a Placement Data Form and other related forms that are available in registration packets in the Placement Office. It is strongly recommended that all seniors take advantage of this opportunity.







He was discharged in 1958 and resumed his pro career with Oreando in the Redlegs' chain until he entered the University of Missouri. Meyer also did graduate work at the University of Illinois and plans on attending U.S.F. this summer for his Masters in School Administration.

Every four years brings an extra day, a Presidential election, and to the sport fan, the Olympics. Come Tuesday, the Tenth Winter Olympic Games will open in Grenoble, France.

The U.S. team is younger and somewhat better than our last team but it will still be outclassed by the stronger teams from Russia, Scandinavia, and those European nations fringing of the Alps.

Our only solid gold medal favorite is world figure skating champion, Peggy Fleming. Miss Fleming is without doubt, the best female skater the U.S. has ever sent to the Olympics.

In addition to Peggy, the U.S. has other potential figure skating medalists

in Tina Noyes, Gary Visconti, and U.S. men's champion, Tim Wood.
