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## St. Leo Opener Er.. Uh... Exciting

SATURDAY NIGHT, SEPTEMBER 23, 1972, will go down in Saint Leo history as a night to remember. The inexperienced, but competitive, Monarchs, under the influence of head club football coach, Joe Sico, exhibited guts and determination against a proven and almost overpowering University of Tampa Junior Varsity football team.

The score, 40-0, was not that important, as the 33 man Monarch team took the field in somewhat of an historic encounter. Historic in that almost 30 years ago to the day, Saint Leo took the field in a high school football game. Another reason is that for College President Tom Southard and Athletic Director Norm Kaye, it was the final realization of a dream. A dream of an expanded Saint Leo College in all collegiate

activities from sports to the library.

Concerning the play of the athletes, Kaye said in an interview that "the game was a class affair," further stating that "Saint Leo could have let down in the second half after trailing at halftime 27-0, but they did not."

KAYE LATER SAID, "They only scored 13 points in the second half, and this was a tribute to their determination and the will not to give up." Coach Sico in a pre-game talk termed the team's play as "above average for a team which had only practiced 18 days." "It was one of the best performances I

have seen," he later added.

Many fans at the game, including myself, agree that it took a lot of heart and courage to get out there on the gridiron against an experienced and very hard hitting Tampa team. Most of the players participate because of their devotion to the game, not because of scholarships or athletic grants.

Tampa's freshman coach termed the game "a good test and was frankly surprised at the ability of the Monarch eleven." Later in a Channel 13 T.V. interview he called the Sept. 23 game "a good test."

NOT ONLY DID the Monarch team not give up, but the enthusiastic fans behind them did not give.

Many stayed until the final gun, when amid the roar of applause both teams left the field.

About "1,000 people" Kaye stated were in the general stadium area. He stated that about 350 season tickets had been sold, and around 550 individual tickets were sold at game time.

For being the initial football game organized by A.D. Kaye, the facilities and the stadium were termed excellent by the Tampa coach. The field was properly lighted and the game was a "fan's" success, in that most spectators viewed the game from behind the 40 yard lines.

THE PLAYERS RESPONDED to this fan support by giving at least 200% in a brutal game which saw the officials give out 300 yards in penalties for both teams. Tampa incurred about 230 yards in penalties and Saint Leo rolled up about 80 yards.

On the field many players had to go both ways, and in many cases players were helped off the field only to return on the next play. In particular was freshman corner back Jim Zakoor and junior Bob Pote, both of whom limped off the field in the 3rd quarter, only to return later; thereby showing not only their courage and determination but setting the tone of the game for Saint Leo.

## Frosh Elections

ON SEPTEMBER 18, in Selby Auditorium one hundred freshman students gathered to hear sixteen fellow students give election campaign speeches. The following day elections were held. John Blank and Rosa Espinosa were elected as judges, Chris Lamb and Joe Grund became class senators by acclamation, Kathy Donellen was elected as treasurer and Clarissa Fay was elected as secretary. A runoff had to be held for the following positions of Vice President and President. Tom Altieri was elected as President and Inez Cruz as Vice President.

Many supporters for Mahony for President believed the election to be

unfairly held. In defense of Mahony, senior Tom Brown wrote to the executive board of the Student Government Association. Tom Brown stated explicit examples of unfair election procedure. The board judged these complaints to be legitimate and rescheduled the runoff for the twenty-sixth of September. The results of the second runoff were: John Mahony, President, and Inez Cruz, Vice President.

The S.G.A. feels at fault for neglecting the election committee, but elections were held before the initial senate meeting. Action has been taken by S.G.A. and a permanent election committee has been set up.

## Monday Morning Comments

LAST SATURDAY NIGHT, Saint Leo played its first football game ever in the history of the College, attended by President Dr. Thomas B. Southard, who threw out the first football, Coach Sico, and other chief administrators of the College.

Dr. Southard, who is a graduate of one of the country's leading colleges in football, Ohio State University, had this to say: "I am certain I speak for many of the fans attending Saint Leo's first football game Saturday night when I say I am proud of every member of our team and coaching staff for their outstanding display of sportsmanship and courage in a contest well played.

"MAY I ALSO express appreciation for the spectacular backing and participation. I am certain that with this fine support our team will continue to make us proud."

Mr. Allan Powers and his public relations office distributed cards which read, "I was there," in honor of the game. It was noted that the event was as historic as the day in November 1967 when Saint Leo College was accredited. On that day

the "I was there" cards were first distributed.

The support from the local communities, faculty, students, administration, and alumni was so evident that it will do more to weld the Saint Leo family and community as nothing has ever done before.

MR. CHARLIE GORDON of security, also

attended the game. He is also an avid football fan and had this to say:

"The team did an outstanding job in holding the more experienced team of the University of Tampa to a 40-0 scale. Those of our boys who played showed a 110% effort.

"I was pleased with the turnout and support that the students gave the team from beginning to end."

### Plans Being Discussed For

## Green Acres

A CAMPUS INNOVATION is in the primordial stages of development as Saint Leo College student organizations await details from campus administrators explaining "Green Acres," Saint Leo's land venture.

The College offers a forty acre tract of land, a few minutes drive from the campus, in plots of about one acre per organization. The costs per club cover necessarily incurred expenses, but not the value of the land itself.

A board of governors pondering the future directives of "Green Acres" views the prospects encouraging and as soon as they fully research utilities expenses, they will announce which organizations have agreed to take land options.

The current contract prohibits construction of permanent buildings, however, the board plans a temporary structure located on a central "Commons" area.

## Crime Against Humanity

THE WAR IN Indo-China has been condemned as immoral by many including churchmen, politicians and students.

On November 17, 1971, the Catholic bishops of the United States adopted a resolution declaring that "At this point of history it seems clear to us that whatever good we hoped to achieve through continued involvement in this war is now outweighed by the destruction of human life and of moral values it inflicts."

But not all of the bishops have agreed with this resolution. Many bishops and priests maintain that wars have been fought for just causes, and have condemned Father Berrigan and others for their unobjectivity saying that they have ignored the guilt of the North Vietnamese for their invasion of South Vietnam in April.

FOR THEOLOGICAL WORKS on war, one must read the writings of Saint Augustine on the "just war." He went on to write in these same works, about "those who wage just wars" for peace and that they are not opposed to peace except to the evil peace (peace at any price), which our Lord came not to send upon earth." (Matthew 10:34)

Senator George McGovern, Democratic nominee for President, is vehement in his denunciation of the "corrupt and unrepresentative Saigon regime of General Thieu." He seldom, if ever, expresses himself about the unelected military dictatorship of North Vietnam.

He has also declared that American troops are extremely unpopular in South Vietnam, saying, "The people of that war-weary land wish that all Americans would let them alone."

COMMENTING ON THIS, *The Arizona Republic* said editorially, "South Vietnamese peasants had the opportunity to demonstrate their hatred of American troops and the Saigon leadership when the Communist North Vietnamese soldiers began to pour through the demilitarized zone to the south. If ever the war-weary peasants had a chance to welcome Hanoi's "Liberation Army" to their war-torn land, this was it. Instead, within hours, tens of thousands of peasants were fleeing south to the sanctuary offered by the U.S. and Saigon."

Jim Giggins, NBC television newsman reporting from South Vietnam, said that as civilian refugees were fleeing from Quang Tri to escape from the North Vietnamese army, Communist soldiers ambushed the column of refugees killing over three hundred of them.

President Nixon, in one of his television addresses a few months ago, stated that when the Communists held the city of Hue in 1968, they rounded up and murdered thousands of the people of that unhappy city, dumping their bodies into mass graves. Captured Communist documents indicated regret that only 5,700 people were killed.


**SENATOR MCGOVERN SHOULD** think about: If the Communists succeed in conquering South Vietnam, will the dead be numbered in the thousands or hundreds of thousands?

Everyone knows the record of butchery and bloodshed when a nation is captured by the Communists — though nobody knows the full extent of terror and atrocity and violent death. Millions were slaughtered in Russia, more millions in China.

Who is really guilty of the crime against humanity?

COMMUNISTS, WHO HAVE historically declared that God does not exist, may feel no need to obey God's commandment, "Thou shalt not kill," but why should God's people, as the Berrigan brothers claim to be, be helping an enemy of Christianity?

One further question: Just how immoral is it to protect people from being murdered by the thousands and dumped into mass graves?


Bill Owens

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# Will Watergate Incident Hurt Nixon?

IN EVERY PRESIDENTIAL year we have to expect a certain amount of hanky-panky, but the seventy two campaign is providing us with an unusual amount of scandal. This year the Democrats found five men with the electronic surveillance equipment in their national party headquarters at the Watergate complex in Washington, D.C., in the wee hours of the morning on June seventeenth.

Accusing "the committee to re-elect the president" with blatant political espionage and invasion of privacy, former National Democratic party chairman Lawrence O'Brien filed a one million dollar law suit against the Nixon committee two days later.

On September 11th the Democrats expanded their complaint to include former Commerce Secretary Maurice Stans, now Nixon campaign finance chairman and High Sloan, Jr., former Nixon campaign treasurer. The two men are charged with paying 114,000 dollars in Nixon campaign contributions to five men to bug the Democratic National Headquarters. The Democrats have also upped the price tag for damages to 3.2 million dollars.

THIS HAS ALL upset the GOP very much, and the Nixon campaign director Clark MacGregor responded to the Democratic law suits making a countercharge which accused Larry O'Brien of "perverting the federal judiciary for political gain" and with invasion of privacy on the Constitutional rights of the Republicans. He is asking for 2.5 million dollars in damages.

The next day Maurice Stans filed his own libel

suit charging that O'Brien has falsely accused him of "larceny, burglary, espionage, and violations of federal criminal statutes relating to electronic surveillance."

The Justice Department investigation into the matter brought forth grand jury indictment of the five men caught in the Watergate. In addition two former White House aides were indicted. They are E. Howard Hunt and G. Gordon Liddy. All of whom plead innocent to charges of breaking and entering to steal documents and set up bugging devices.

THIS ACTION BY the Justice Department terminated its three month probe into the case. Assistant Attorney General Henry Peterson said the investigation had failed to reveal the true reasons for the break in, or to identify any other parties who may have been involved. He conceded further that the indictment against the seven might just as well have been returned six months ago.

Hunt, a former CIA employee and aide to Charles Colson, President Nixon's chief political advisor, has been linked with another of the defendants, Bernard Barker, in whose bank account was found \$114,000 in Nixon campaign contributions. Hunt and Barker met two weeks before the break in and also exchanged numerous long distance phone calls. When Hunt was informed that he had been implicated in the case, he disappeared. The FBI search for him was discontinued after Hunt promised to turn himself in on August 19. In answer to a question concerning his whereabouts on June

17 he took the Fifth Amendment.

Barker's Miami bank account showed four checks totaling \$89,000 drawn on the Mexico City account of a well to do Mexican attorney and a \$25,000 check from a Minnesota investor. Each of these checks had come

through the Nixon campaign office in Washington.

Liddy was implicated after Barker's telephone records showed that he placed a number of calls to Liddy at his office in the Nixon campaign headquarters in Washington. Liddy was also second in com-

The Student Affairs Committee of the Board of Trustees held its first meeting on Monday September 18 in the Student Affairs Conference Room from 11:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. with a break for lunch. The trustees in attendance at the meeting were Mr. Thomas Welstead, who chaired the meeting, Mr. James Altman, and Mr. Fred Campa. The main topics discussed at the meeting were: Housing facilities for men and the need for major renovations in the men's residence halls; counseling services; job placement services; academic counseling; and the need to offer more courses to students to better prepare them for available jobs after graduation. Mr. Patrick Seery, President of Student Government, briefed the committee on Student Government activities planned for the coming year. These particular trustees show a vital interest in student life at St. Leo.

mand at the Nixon headquarters as far as raising finances was concerned. Thus he had access to the 114,000 dollars in Nixon funds that were found in Barker's account. Liddy was fired by Mitchell for refusing to answer the FBI's questions and the General Accounting Office (GAO), the Congress Monetary watchdog, said that he had refused to discuss "any matter" with them.

BECAUSE IT IS illegal for foreign monies to be used in federal elections, the House Banking Committee has come into the investigations. A preliminary committee report said that Stans himself knew of the transfer of Mexican funds and that a bank

charter to the donor of the 25,000 dollar check was granted by the Federal Reserve Board "in an unusually rapid time."

A federal court this week said that the five men caught on June seventeenth could not be named in the same suit with Stans and the others. This came as a result of a GOP motion to dismiss the entire suit. The court said O'Brien could not name all registered Democrats as plaintiffs, but only those who had used the Party's telephone between March 1 and June 17. The trial itself could not get underway before the November 7th elections, however, a verdict is not expected for some time....

2) Purchase a mesh bag to use instead of paper bags when you go shopping.

3) BUY BEER AND soda in returnable bottles, use drinks from aluminum cans as a second choice and recycle them. There is an aluminum collection box in front of the Jiffy Store, and another near the Security Office on campus.

4) Buy laundry detergent which is biodegradable. The A&P in Dade City sells "The Un-Polluter" which costs approximately \$.88 for 49 ounces.

5) If you have a pet avoid using plastic flea collars on them. A nerve gas--dichlorovapone--if often contained in the collars.



HOPING TO RECEIVE accreditation from the National Council of Social Work in Washington, D.C., the Department of Sociology has placed twenty-seven students in a full-time social work practicum. In a practicum students received supervised observation and training in community, state, or private agencies. Students have been placed at various centers in the surrounding communities: Jane McKecknie, Karen Chas, and Bernadette Coyne work with the Neighborhood Service Center in Lakeland; Randy Long and Jerry Enat work

with Adult Probation and Parole. In addition several serve as counselors in the Division of Youth Services: in Dade City - John Palermo, Cathy Terry, and Pam Catri; in Lakeland - Jerry Seevers and Michael Lombardy; in New Port Richey - Charles Durian and Ken Nardone; in Brooksville - Glen Sweete and Dave Arnold; in Brandon - Bob Shea and Frank Healy; and in Tampa - Bill Callan, Michael Scourby, Angela Fraterangelo, Bab Gatti, Ed Paulen, Thomas McGovern, John Nunez, Ed Hay, and Ken Forte. Elsewhere in the program,

Floyd Stephanski is with the Public Relations Division of United Torch Services in Cleveland; and Dennis DeDomenico is with the State Attorney's office in Dade City. The practicum supervisor is Mr. Edward Kren.

The students in the practicum work thirty hours a week for 14 weeks and earn 15 credit hours for the experience. Students are placed according to their interests. Last year 15 students were in the program, working in such varied fields as medical social work, child welfare, youth services, adult probation and parole, mental

health, and neighborhood services.


## Guys And Dolls


IN THE FIRST quarter the Monarch defense played well and held a rugged Tampa passing attack in check. After a sustained drive the Spartans finally scored two yards out at 9:30. Saint Leo exhibited mistakes that would be common to any team that had started practice 18 days ago.

In the second quarter Tampa broke through for three touchdowns on runs of 4 yards, 47 yards and 2 yards. The Monarch defense despite 3 scores managed to hold Tampa in check through the air and Tampa led at halftime 27-0. With 8 seconds left on the clock Saint Leo recorded their first first down of the ballgame.
