Dr. Southard feels like he is returning home to his own liberal arts college, where he knew the president and tried to model himself after him. He feels now, that he can finally realize his lifelong ambition.

In conclusion, he stated, "I hope that Saint Leo, through the family of the Abbey, students, faculty, and administration, will provide a model of a completely rounded life for four years, and this attitude will carry over to other campuses."

A.W.S.: A Proven Voice

The Intercollegiate Association of Women Students is a national organization of over 200,000 members formed in 1913 for the three-fold purpose:

(1) That the higher education of women requires the existence of a special organization to meet their unique needs;

(2) That women must identify, explore, develop, and utilize their individual potential;

(3) That women should fulfill their role as educated and competent persons throughout their lives.

During the 1969-70 school year in the wake of the growing complexities of society which challenge the stereotype roles women traditionally play, the women of Saint Leo College

organized an association of women students to uphold the principles of womanhood in an institute of higher education. The AWS consists of three governing branches:

(1) The Executive Board with a president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer; (2) The Senate with one representative from each floor of each of the four women's dormitories; (3) The Judicial Branch consisting of ten judges — one freshman, two sophomores, three juniors, and four seniors.

Since the establishment of the AWS, the women have sponsored and participated as an organization in many college functions. They sponsor the annual Valentine's Day Dance for the benefit of the student body. They also

sponsor the annual Christmas Dinner and Fashion Show for all the women students. They sponsor a resale of textbooks at the start of the second semester and they also participate in the annual Christmas Card Contest. They periodically invite various speakers to address the women on important topics of discussion.

Because of Saint Leo's proven interests in improvement and advancement of womanhood on campus the AWS has just recently gained national recognition in the intercollegiate association of women students. This is the first time in the history of Saint Leo College that women have attained national status in any organization.

Frosh Elect Officers

On Friday, September 24, the 1971-72 St. Leo Freshman Class conducted the voting for its class officers. As *The Lion* went to press the two elected winners were Carl Atilia, receiving 116 votes for Vice President, over Paul Higgins' 62, and Patty Donohue's 89 votes for female representative over Janet Kutza and Madeline Cipriano.

In the presidential race there was a runoff between James Cavanaugh and Paul McKean, since neither polled the necessary majority.

Quite a few people won by acclamation. They were Bonny Faye, secretary, Kevin Callahan, male senator, and Dennis Bogle, treasurer. Freshman members of the Campus Court are Stuart Arnett and Scott Spradley.

Not too much can be said for the whole campaign. The speeches were the general trite rhetoric heard all too often from people running for office. The only redeeming element of this whole farce was that the promises were not as superfluous as one generally hears. However, no one mentioned that the elections meant nothing, that the tenure of total, ultimate power lies with the administration, and not to any legitimate degree with the students.

Food Sucks!

And Rationing, Too?

As in previous years, the cafeteria system at Saint Leo College has failed to live up to its expectations.

This is not to say that changes within the cafeteria system have not occurred over the last few years; they have; but what seems astounding to this writer, is the fact that with every change more problems developed.

A point, in reference to the above, concerns the renovation of the McDonald Cafeteria, in which new milk and tea concessioners were added and counters formerly at the side walls were moved to the middle of the floor. During lunch hours the cafeteria now offers a snack line where sandwiches and drinks are served.

All of these changes have helped; but when one looks at the system more closely, one finds many inadequacies.

The fact that the student is paying \$270.00 for the privilege of not being allowed by the "system" to eat as one so desires; referring to the policy of the cafeteria of not allowing students to receive a second serving of food is both chaotic and tyrannical.

The cafeteria system, for the first time, has imposed sanctions in regard to the amount of bread, butter, and crackers that may be eaten by a student at dinner and lunch.

Last year, let's face it, the food was abominable to say the least. But when the system regulates the amount of food that can be eaten and then has the audacity to regulate the amount of bread, crackers, and butter to be served with a meal, then the system has gone too far. This is not to mention the practice of some busboys, who clean up in the McDonald cafeteria, of taking bread that has already been served to one student and placing it back on the serving tray for another student to have. Not only is this practice unsanitary, it is also a health hazard.

In regard to the food served: it is no rumor that it's never going to get better. That problem has yet to be solved and at the rate the rationing of the food is going, just to get some food, no matter what it tastes like, is a blessing in itself.

How blind can a cafeteria system be when so many students decided not to even eat there this year because of last year's inadequate food, and chose, rather, to be reimbursed for their meal card.

The time has come for the Student Government Association to see that these practices cease; and cease soon. Being the representatives of the students, they claim to be, the Food Service Committee should be reactivated immediately to see that these rationary policies are stopped, before they get out of hand.

Meanwhile, the cafeteria system has once again endeared students to itself by imposing the sanction mentioned. Who knows, in years to come, one might see a St. Leo student sharing a tea bag with three fellow students.

Whatever the case, one fact predominates: the cafeteria system has proved once again that pleasing the student is the last of their aims.

The 1971-72 Student Senate was officially called to order at 3:02 on Tuesday, September 21, in a closed meeting. The purpose of this meeting was to elect a President Pro-Tem of the Senate and to set up the Senate committees for the coming 1971-72 fiscal school year.

Dennis Hayes was elected President Pro-Tem. The new student committees are as follows:

The Resident Hall Committee is composed of Mike Conway, Bill Stewart, Scott Spradley, Charles Durin and Bill Darcy. The chairman is Edward Carhart.

The Social Programs Committee is as follows: Patricia Kuhn, Karen DeNunzio, Joan Redpath and John Quigley. The chairman is Penny Dresser.

The Food Committee chairman is Wanda Spisto. Beth Dempsey, Sharon McCarthy and Nancy Domelly are also members.

The Library Committee is under the responsibility of Rita Silvestro and Judy Kane, who are in charge of financial affairs.

The Liturgical Renewal Committee is composed of John Frank, Mary Arneiter, Nancy Domelly and Jeff Hergen. The chairman is Denis DiMisa.

The Constitution and Student Rights Committee is chaired by Bill Bouffard and the other members include John O'Rourke, Diane Johnson and Karen Chao.

The Development and Public Relations Committee is composed of Tom Brown, Maggi Shaw, Dori Bostwick and Joanne Briarton. The chairman is Bernie Coyne.

The very important Teacher Evaluation Committee is headed by Colleen Murphy with other members including Donna De Lucas, Michele Protomastro, John Vallero and Bill Bouffard.

Janet Jones is charged with the responsibility of the Records Review Committee.

The Academic Affairs Committee and the Academic Council will be set up at the next Student Senate meeting on the 28th of September.

Judy Kane, President of Club '67, and the senior class, has received a letter of authorization from Sister Lucy Faciane, Dean of Student Affairs, stating that the Club may operate a carry out service of six-packs.

Please take note of the following rule for the good time of all concerned.

Since College policy prohibits the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages on campus, including all buildings owned or leased by the College (this rule can be found on page 50 of the Student Handbook), the carry out service is for off-campus functions only. If this rule is obeyed this student privilege will not be revoked.

Each person who obtains a six-pack from the Club, must show an I.D., sign for the purchase, and take full responsibility that it is not consumed, distributed, or stored on campus.

This new service is designed primarily to give 21 year olds more responsibility. Each person will be held responsible for his or her own actions. We have been given another privilege by the administration and by the officers of the Senior Class. "Now is the time to prove ourselves that we are worthy of trust," says Senior Class president Judy Kane. This service will be made available during regular Club '67 hours, beginning Friday, September 17, 1971.

Eighteen Year-Old Vote

We have heard students asking about the eighteen-year-old vote and about the requirements in the state of Florida and in other state and local elections.

A few guidelines:

(1) You must be a resident of one state only. If you are a student at Saint Leo, but your legal residence is in New York, you must cast an absentee ballot in your home state of New York, unless you have given up your New York residence.

(2) If you wish to change your residency, you must register in the county office of the state in which you wish to claim new residency.

(3) To vote in municipal elections, you must be a resident of the state of Florida for one year and of said municipality for six months. You must show your birth certificate when you go to register.

Music Scene

Who's Next - The Who. *The Who's* first album since "Live at Leeds" has to be considered one of the finest rock releases this year.

All of the songs, except "My Wife", are composed and sung by talented Peter Townsend, who plays guitar and must be considered the leader of the group.

The album boasts nine great tunes, starting with Baba O'Riley and concluding with the eight and a half minute "Won't Get Fooled Again". All songs are rock, except for "The Song is Over" and "Behind Blue Eyes", which project the softer side of the group.

Master of Reality - Black Sabbath. Black Sabbath's third attempt has the difficult task of following their smash second album "Paranoid".

The album comes with a poster of the group, and the lyrics written on the back cover. The lyrics, like the first two albums, are written in the strange Sabbath tradition.

Master of Reality contains eight songs, two are short instrumentals, written and played by guitarist Toni Iommi. The remaining contain Black Sabbath's hard guitar riffs, with the exception of the pleasant sounding "Solitude", which resembles "Spanish Caravan" from the "Paranoid".

The vocals are well handled by lead singer Ozzie Osborne, who helps create the mood he did so successfully on their first album.

Monarch Soccer Team "Great Defense"?

September 8, 1971 — In an interview Coach John Swart said, "One of the strong points for our 1971 team will be the defense."

September 24, 1971 — Coach John Swart in an interview said, "We were tough on defense." These words uttered after a well played defeat at the hands of South Florida, clearly stated the defensive power of the Monarchs.

Against Embry Riddle, the Monarch goalies Charlie Wooters and Richard Harmon made 21 saves and the visitors took 35 shots in a 7-3 loss.

Against South Florida, Richard Harmon had 27 saves in a game in which the Brahms took 41 shots on goal.

Swart said after the U.S.F. game, that St. Leo's defense was the best and tightest it had been in recent years. The Monarchs lost to the highly rated Brahms 5 to 1, but not before Bob Baker scored the first goal, 16 minutes into the game.

Early in the 1971 season, so

far the Monarch scorers are: Bob Baker with two and Bohdan Shashkewych and Steve Erbe, each with one.

Upcoming games are with Stetson University (Oct. 2) and University of Miami (Oct. 15) both at home. Also the Monarchs travel to Lakeland to play Florida Southern on Oct. 8.
