Pat Seery Elected S.G.A. President



NEWLY ELECTED — Students in elections held March 28 selected the new S.G.A. Officers, for the upcoming 1972-73 school year. The newly elected officers are eagerly awaiting next year and a chance to return student government to the effective position it once held.

On March 27 and 28 the Student Government Association Elections were held for the 1972-73 school year.

The student turnout was small with only 39% of the students voting.

The presidency of the Student Government was won by junior Patrick Seery, this year's treasurer of Student Government Association, over Tom Brown. William Callahan was elected Vice-President, Colleen Duffy was elected treasurer, and Rita Silvestro was unopposed for secretary.

In the senior class, Bernadette Coyne was elected president; Bill Tully was elected vice-president, Joanne Briarton-secretary, and Linda Diana-treasurer.

In the junior class, Charles Ahern was elected president, with Lisa Stryker vice-president; and James Mulligan treasurer. The

secretary will be appointed.

In the sophomore class, Joan Redpath was elected president, with Peggy Russell vice-president, Betty Romano secretary and Mary Ann Stevens treasurer.

For campus court judges Richard Hopkins, and Bob Shea, were elected from the senior class, with Roseanne Sone as the alternative.

Junior class judges are Charles Ahern and Tim Gleason, the alternate is Matt McConnell.

Sophomore class judges are Denise Donlin and Jim Loracono, with Claudia Waldrep elected as alternate.

In the senate, Ray Hughes was elected senior senator. Tim Gleason was elected junior senator, and Kevin Callahan received the nod as sophomore male senator. Female senators are Pat Spinella, senior; and Kate O'Connor as sophomore senator.



In addition to her many duties as President of the Court, Miss Murphy has found time to serve as Head resident in the Priory, to remain active in the




