

# IBM To Aid Scheduling

Saint Leo College will receive a new IBM Model 1130 computer in April to assist in the constantly growing problem of processing the thousands of items of information kept on student and college activities.

Principal feature of the new computer will be a changeable disk storage unit capable of storing 512,000 words, supplemented by a "core storage" of an additional 8,000 words.

The vast amount of data is available on individual print-out upon request to the computer. In terms of maximum output, the machine will be able to print 60 recorded courses for up to 4,000 individual students.

The Model 1130 computer receives its instructions

in a "program language" call FORTRAN (for Formula Translation). This language was originally devised for engineering and scientific programming; but it now has been adapted for use in business and other record-keeping operations.

Dennis Seibert, manager of the College's Computer Center, says that the new machine will provide sufficient flexibility and efficiency "to enable personalized individual records."

Seibert said that the computer will store and retrieve information about alumni records, records of contributions to the College, finance and accounting data, student fee billing, students records, course scheduling, registrar's records and reports, and records of students' grades.

The computer also will store coordinative information about courses offered in the College catalogue.

Saint Leo College's Computer Center is under the supervision of Comptroller A. James Christiansen.



Recently, I was reading an article in Reader's Digest, titled, "What Cigarette Commercials Don't Show," by Hugh J. Mooney. It showed the reality of cancer country from one who has been there. I thought it was quite an alarming article and I felt all students who smoke should have the benefit of knowing exactly what cancer can and has done to persons afflicted with this dread disease.

Instead of boring you with facts and scientific back-up statements, I will just relate to you some excerpts from the article.

"It was supertime, and the patients were eating... These men stood by their beds and carefully poured a thin pink

liquid into small glass tubes... The fluid drained down out of the tubes through a thin clear plastic hose which disappeared into one nostril.

"They had to eat this way because throat, mouth, tongue, and esophagus had been cut away in surgery. I could actually see the back wall of their gullets.

"Many of them were waiting for plastic surgery to reconstruct their faces and necks... For this extra pieces of flesh were grown... One patient had flesh growing out of the side of his neck in a tubular U, like the handle on a suitcase. Another man had one growing from between his shoulder blades over his right shoulder

to a spot in his throat just below the chin. It must have been 18 inches long."

These are excerpts from a ward in which throat cancer patients are treated. Truly they are grotesque facts of life. Of course, not everyone will get cancer, and even if you smoke, chances are good you won't get it, but you can get it.

I wonder how many people would continue smoking if for a commercial they featured a patient with his throat, mouth, tongue, etc., cut out, or chose a man growing a flesh pedicle for surgery; better yet, the addict who was smoking by holding the cigarette to the hole that led to his windpipe.

Nuff said.

## BY-LAWS OF THE S. G. A.

### ARTICLE I THE DUTIES AND AUTHORITY OF OFFICERS.

SECTION 101. The President of the S.G.A. shall:

- a) Preside over all Meetings of the Senate;
- b) Uphold the Constitution of the S.G.A.;
- c) Appoint chairman and members of all committees, subject to the approval of the Senate;
- d) Initiate any position or committee deemed necessary for the general welfare of the S.G.A., subject to the approval of the Senate;
- e) Retain the right to remove from position anyone appointed under Presidential authority;
- f) Veto any decision of the Senate;
- g) Authorize the expenditure of funds up to twenty-five (25) dollars from the SGA treasury at any one time;
- h) Appoint an Executive Secretary with approval of the Senate;
- i) Preside over the Executive Committee meetings.

SECTION 102. The Vice-President of the S.G.A. shall:

- a) Act on behalf of the President in his absence;
- b) Act as chairman of the Student Executive Advisory Board under the authority of the Dean of Student Affairs;
- c) Act as supervisor of all special committees.

SECTION 103. The Corresponding Secretary of the S.G.A. shall:

- a) Be responsible for all correspondence deemed necessary by any officer of the S.G.A.;
- b) Provide all bulletin boards with a copy of the minutes of the Senate meetings not later than one week after such meetings.

SECTION 104. The Treasurer of the S.G.A. shall:

- a) Be responsible for all funds and their disbursement;
- b) Report the financial state of the S.G.A. at every regularly scheduled meeting and to the student body once a month.

### ARTICLE II MEETINGS

SECTION 201. All meetings shall be open unless closed by the President.

SECTION 202. A valid quorum shall be 50% plus 1 of the elected members.

SECTION 203. A special meeting may be called by the President.

SECTION 204. Three unexcused absences may result in censure.

### ARTICLE III EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 301. The Executive Committee shall excuse all absences, control S.G.A. student service, and propose an agenda for the Senate meetings.

### ARTICLE IV ELECTIONS

SECTION 401. All elections shall be presided over by the Chairman of Elections who shall be a delegate to S.G.A.;

SECTION 402. There must be a restricted polling place;

SECTION 403. There can be no campaigning within ten feet of the polling area.

### ARTICLE V STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 501. The President shall create with the approval of the Senate standing and Ad Hoc Committees.

### ARTICLE VI THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

SECTION 601. The Executive Secretary shall take minutes at all Senate meetings;

SECTION 602. The salary for the Executive Secretary shall be \_\_\_\_\_.





# WHO NEEDS HELP ?

I am reproducing my proposal for the centralized Student Tutoring System so that each student may be aware of what advantages are available to him.

At present, we are in the process of organizing this program, and expect to be prepared within the next five weeks. Not until our tutors are completely trained in the necessary communicative methods and teaching techniques, will the program be formally initiated so that the time of all involved will be well spent.

It is our sincere desire that this program be successful and will grow likewise. Therefore, tutoring service will not be available to all areas, since the need is not as great in some fields as it is in others.

With the guidance of Dr. Joyce Gamewell, Dr. James Horgan, and Mr. Ralph Pendexter, who have pledged their valuable assistance to our cause, as have many other faculty members, we are certain that this program will meet our expectations.

I am confident that you, the students, will also pledge support by your serious participation in this worthwhile opportunity, and under these circumstances, you will find the benefits to be limitless.

## I. PROPOSAL

1. It is proposed that a centralized student tutoring system be organized under the direction of the Student Government Association in cooperation with the faculty and administration of Saint Leo College.

## II. REASON+

1. A major purpose of this institution is to educate the average intelligent student.

## III. NEED

1. The large number of students on academic probation and the even greater number of borderline cases defines the need of such a program.

## IV. PURPOSE

1. The purpose of this system is to aid the student who has made the required effort, but is having some difficulty in understanding a given subject

## V. NAME

1. This organization of tutors shall be called the Tutorial Society of Saint Leo College.

## VI. OBJECTIVES

1. To help alleviate an unfavorable academic situation.

2. To develop inter-student communication. Students who have achieved academic success would acquire a greater understanding of the less fortunate ones as they assist them. At the same time, the tutors will develop leadership qualities as they earn the respect of their students.

3. To serve as a motivating force for students who hold defeatist attitudes subsequent to poor educational experiences.

4. To establish deeper interest in personal goals and more mature outlook on life.

5. To stimulate school spirit. Individuals will be united toward a common goal.

6. To supplement professor's time.

7. To provide the student tutors with an opportunity to apply the knowledge they have acquired. To reinforce previously learned material is more valuable than the initial learning process (according to experiments by Eisenhardt).

8. To provide teaching experience for some capable and interested students.

9. To provide active participation in a more authentic and productive student service.

10. To encourage students to attempt difficult courses, and accept it as a challenge.

## VII. APPROACH TO SYSTEM

1. Divisional Chairmen will recommend to the board two students in each area of concentration who have demonstrated proficiency in a given subject area within the past year, and who, in their opinion, could become successful tutors. The board will interview these students and, with the assistance of the academic committee, select those who have the best qualifications.

2. These students selected for this honor will be advised of the operational procedures, and the advantages and disadvantages for them.

3. The tutors will meet periodically with divisional chairmen, and other members of the faculty and administration for discussions and seminar workshops dealing with difficulties in teaching, methods of communication, and other topics pertaining to their work.

4. The professors will have frequent meetings with the student tutor to discuss the curriculum and progress of the class.

5. The professor will assist the tutor if the latter has insufficient background, or has difficulties in communicating with the student.

6. Student tutors will be given a subscription to the Phi Beta Kappa Magazine entitled, The American Scholar, or Daedalus.

7. This tutoring organization will be coordinated as a unified honor society and it will be a distinction to belong. Pins will be issued to members.

8. Student tutors will receive recognition on their transcripts for this service and honor.

During the first trimester, the sophomore class held five class meetings whereby new ideas developed. The sophomores conducted the Freshman initiation. Also the class constitution of 1970 was ratified and passed at one of the regular class meetings. Dances were held in order to make a profit and also to provide the school with entertainment.

Four different committees were drawn up and each have unique purposes:

1. Emmett Scully--Finance Committee
2. Joe O'Clearly--Social Committee
3. Dan Paddula--Public Relations
4. Mike Gauloski--Sports Committee

These various committees will go in to effect this semester.

# DEGREE OR NO DEGREE?

The Student Academic Affairs Committee met on January 25th and again on February 1st to discuss the possibilities of a centralized tutoring system proposed to the board by Mr. Michael Mead, a senior student here at St. Leo College.

After completing the preliminary studies of the program, Mr. Mead presented it to the student body during G.S.R. in hopes to gain their reactions to this new step in improving our academic atmosphere. As a result, our students seem to feel that the proposed program is worth a lot of merit but are somewhat apprehensive as to whether or not it will be successful.

The Academic Affairs committee looks favorably upon the Tutorial Society and at Mr. Mead's request, will work very closely with it as it develops.

The Committee also received a letter in the form of a petition from the women students enrolled in the Secretarial Science program. They feel that they have been unjustifiably notified that the college cannot award to them an Associate Degree in Business Administration and that they may not take part in the college's commencement exercises.

The committee unanimously decided that their petition was justifiable and letters have gone out to the proper college authorities requesting that administrative measures be taken.
