Meeting students “where they are”: Saint Leo University’s education centers

Most people have a clear view of the typical college experience. Move into a dorm at a four-year university, attend classes every day, join a club, and hang out at the campus coffee shop with friends. However, this experience is not possible or ideal for every type of student.

This is where Saint Leo University’s education centers come in. These centers make a college education possible for many by offering flexible classes and personalized support to those whose lifestyles may not fit into the “traditional” university experience.

Saint Leo boasts six different Education Centers—five in Florida and one in Savannah, Georgia. One is even in the heart of the university campus.

While these centers may be situated throughout the southeastern U.S., they all come together for a common purpose—providing a flexible path to gain a quality Saint Leo education.

The students who attend Saint Leo’s education centers are not the typical “right out of high school” students. Most who attend the centers are adult learners who work full-time, have families, or are members of the military.

“Many of us are not traditional students—we’re veterans, active-duty service members, reservists, contractors, civil service personnel, and working adults—but we are still part of the Saint Leo community. These centers bridge that gap and make higher education accessible and manageable,” said Haven Greene III, a student at the Key West Education Center graduating in May with a bachelor’s in computer information systems.

Because two of the centers are located on military bases, understanding and working with military members and veterans

pursuing higher education is very important.

“Working with veterans ... is a really big deal for the education centers and making sure that we help them where they are,” noted Alaina Forehand, director of learning and operations at Saint Leo, who previously served as director of the Key West Education Center.

This means that classes and schedules are structured a little differently than one might see on the university campus, but the curriculum is largely the same. For instance, classes are all offered after 5 p.m., taking into consideration the number of adult learners who work regular, full-time jobs.

“So, for the most part, all of the centers have some of the same degree programs. I can speak on Key West in particular, but we have associate degrees, bachelor's degrees, and we also offer a master's degree here as well,” said Jeff Hite, Director of the Key West Education Center.

The centers also offer both in-person and online classes to meet the needs of different students.

“You still get that traditional experience with ... other classmates, and they're in the classroom with you. The teacher might be virtual, the teacher might be present in the room, but you're still able to gain that college experience,” said Hite.

In short, it’s the same meaningful Saint Leo education, just delivered in a bit of a different way.

What’s not that different, though, is the sense of community still present at these centers. According to Hite, the Key West Center, for example, boasts great partnerships with companies like Margaritaville and Keys Electric.

“This community has kind of just welcomed us with open arms,” said Hite.

Not only is the surrounding community extremely supportive, but so are the people.

“That is what makes Education Centers so important. They provide a human connection in what can otherwise feel like a very impersonal process,” said Greene.

Faculty and staff tend to wear many hats at the Education Centers, serving as advisors, admissions officers, financial aid advisors, and more.

“Our footprint as an Education Center is small, and because it’s small, you know, sometimes the staff is also a smaller footprint,” said Forehand. “Whereas at university campus or online, people have specific roles, the Education Center staff are going to do it all, from prospective students to current to continuing to alumni.”

While the centers are extremely impactful, they can face some challenges compared to the university campus. One of the biggest challenges is the physical distance from the main campus in Dade City. Not all problems have the ability to be

solved on university campus, so staff at the centers often have to act as a “liaison” with the main campus and maintain good communication with them to help students with their needs. Another challenge lies in the size and reach of the Education Centers. Because they are smaller, marketing can be difficult.

“Because the footprints smaller, the budgets are smaller for marketing ... you also have to be creative in how you get your name out there,” said Forehand.

And that is the beauty of Saint Leo’s Education Centers—they adapt, boast flexibility, and maintain the quality of education that Saint Leo is known for. As the horizons continue to broaden for Saint Leo, so does the outlook of their Education Centers around the country.

“I know our new leadership is looking at opening new education centers as well, so that opportunity to create close relationships is monumental in people's lives, in ways that you know sometimes you'll never know,” said Forehand.

Students don't always need a job or a 40-hour internship to make their professional presence stronger. It is important that, if you don't get a job or internship, to not stress but use it to your advantage. Work on your tools that will eventually get you a job after you graduate.

A résumé is key for a college student; it is where we write down all our accomplishments and experience. The very first thing your résumé needs is to look professional even without the professional work listed.

For example, it needs to be in the correct format: one page, black and white, with no pictures or colorful designs. It should have easy readability, and most of the information should focus on your college experience.

Career Services provides Handshake, a resource on Okta that provides many tools for students such as setting up meetings for interview practice, job and internship applications, and résumé formats for different majors. There are a few things that you can add to a résumé easily over the summer such as getting certified in a field of your choice.







For those majoring in English, it is important to get certified in skills such as journalism with the help of free courses that are easy to find. This can also be said for many other majors. For example, business majors should look for certifications in management or entrepreneurship.

"Employers care about what you can do, not just what you've taken in class. Even something as simple as expanding your Excel skills, improving communication skills, or taking on a leadership role at work can set you apart," said Tonya Mazur, professor of business and management.

If you are unable to get an internship in your dream career fields, reach out to the company to volunteer or shadow them for a day to gain experience in your field.

Dr. Audrea Maxwell, student success coach, agrees that volunteering is beneficial over the summer and says it's good for students to learn new skills and open potential networking opportunities.

Here are some ideas for all different majors that can be done in the summer virtually.

-  Create a podcast
-  Write a book
-  Sell your products
-  Conduct a survey or do a research project
-  Start a blog or create content of some sort
-  Start a non-profit organization
-  Take a class over the summer
-  Help a company market their business

A lot of students have created various things and projects, but have nowhere to show their work; this is where a portfolio comes in. Use the summer to create a portfolio that has the work you created for your aspired career.

This is different from a résumé which tells employers about your experience, while a portfolio shows examples of your work. Make your portfolio your own; it should showcase your creativity and who you are!

A portfolio should have a home page with your name, an "about me" section that includes a headshot, examples of your work, and your contact information. All of these should be tabs on the home page that are clickable and can transport someone to the information right away.

LinkedIn is a great resource offered to show your professional presence.

"Don't overlook LinkedIn. Add a professional photo, write a strong headline, and start connecting with professionals in your field. Even small improvements can make a big difference when you're applying for jobs," said Mazur.

For your bio, list your major, what you aspire to do, and two adjectives that describe you.

Fill out the "about me" section, and put in your experience whether it is work, interning, or volunteering. Put your education

and the activities you do on campus, and for the skills section, make sure you have at least seven.

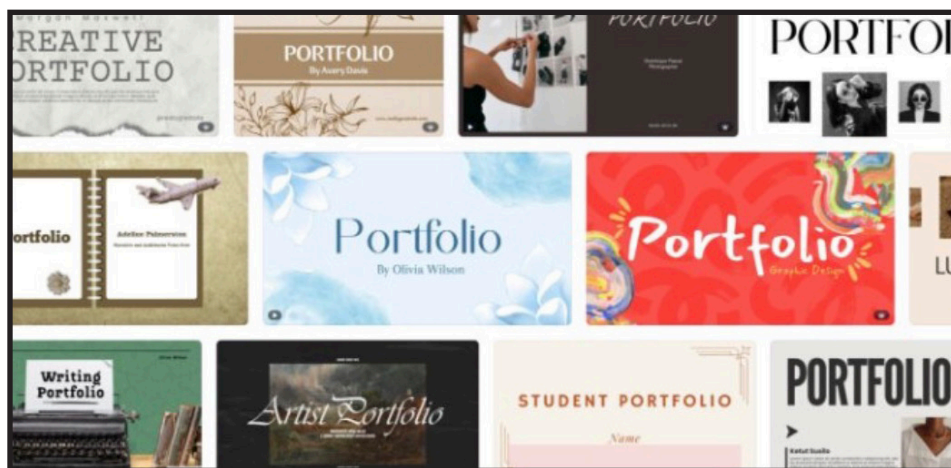
The most important part of having a LinkedIn is to be active on it! Post what you do on campus, post links of content you create, and post photos of events you were a part of. When job recruiters look at your account, they are going to want to see an active account.

"I also highly recommend taking advantage of IBM SkillsBuild, which is something we're actively supporting at Saint Leo. It offers free, industry-recognized learning in areas like AI, data, and professional skills, and those credentials are absolutely worth adding to your résumé and LinkedIn," said Mazur.

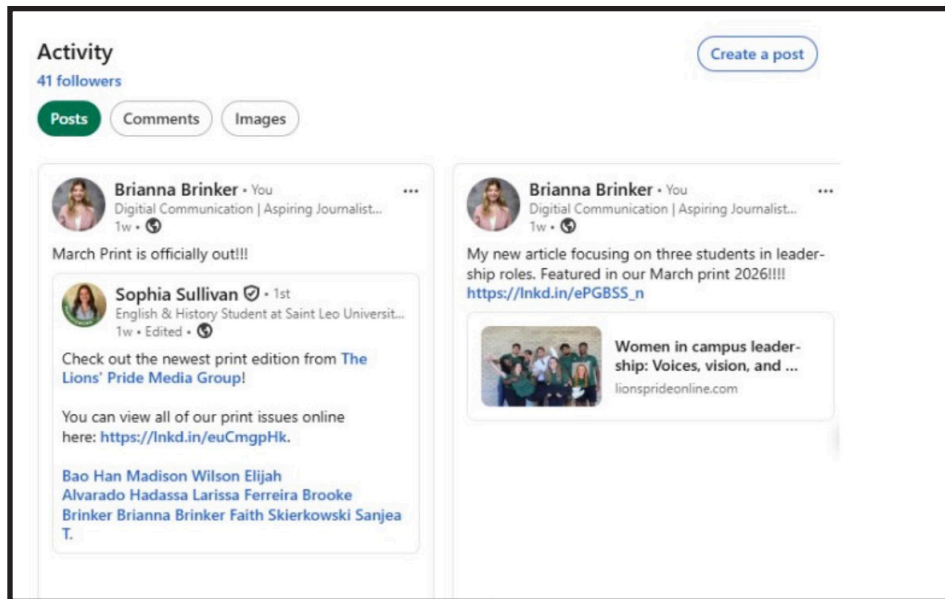
Also, writing your goals down will help you achieve them. Make it fun, and turn it into a bucket list for the summer.

Saint Leo University launched its first ever Women's Flag Football program in Fall 2025, led by head coach Eli Taliaferro. As interest in flag football continues to grow nationwide, this new addition by the

athletic department is a major step in providing opportunity for female athletes. On March 4, Saint Leo hosted the University of Tampa for the first home game of the season at Saint Leo Turf Stadium.

Sports can be highly competitive, especially at the collegiate level, as many athletes try to continue their careers professionally. High standards are being set in the Sunshine State Conference (SSC), specifically in women's sports.

On Feb. 10, Jessica Harclerode, a senior majoring in elementary education and goalie for Women's Lacrosse at Saint Leo University, set a new level in the SSC, breaking the record for career saves in Women's Lacrosse.

According to Saint Leo Athletics, she passed Florida Tech's goalie Stephanie Stuart, who previously led the conference with 504 career saves. Achieving a milestone can have different effects on everyone, but it is a step forward. Harclerode has finished the regular season with 614 career saves.

match against Rollins College, Saint Leo Women's Basketball set a new program record for most three-pointers made in a single game: 15. The record was previously set on Dec. 4, 2018 at 14 three-pointers.

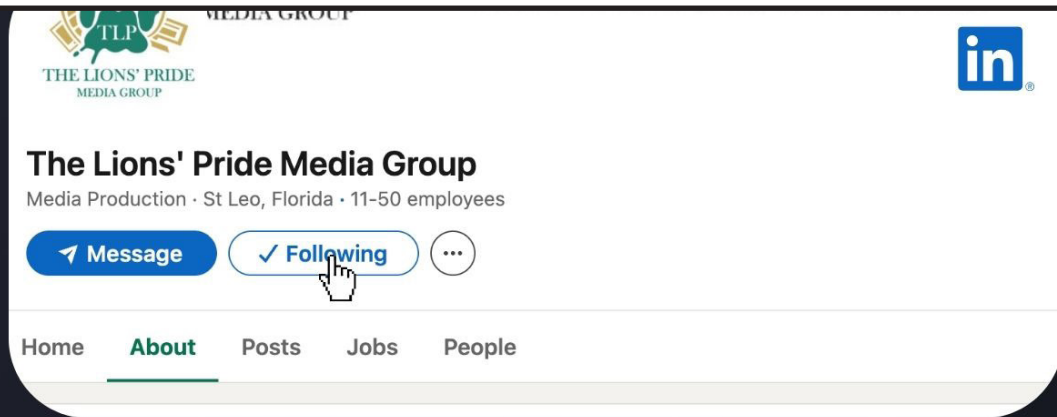
Perfection is challenging but not impossible. To be perfect, it requires practice, and in most cases it's about team chemistry

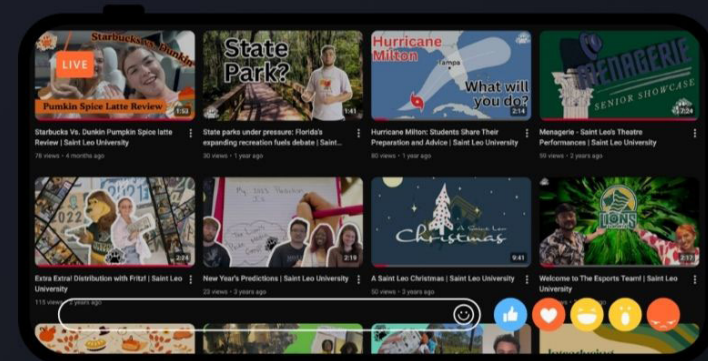


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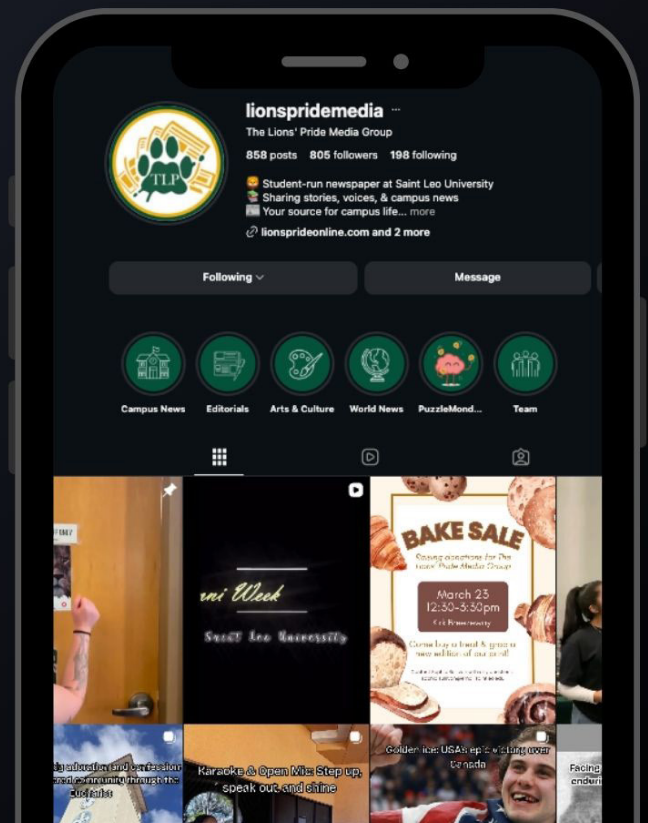
Did you know?

Diploma in hand, future in limbo: What comes after graduation for international students?

Many international students arrive at the moment of graduation with the feeling that they are not ready yet to leave this country. They love this new place they are now very familiar with, the new friends who have become family over those four years, and the opportunities they created and know that can be ahead of them.

Although many international students do not see graduation as the “end of their line” in their U.S. journey, they do not know what their options are if they want to continue in the United States. for a little bit longer, or even for life.

Therefore, it is important for international students to be prepared ahead of time and understand what their next steps should be if they want to continue to live in the United States.

The first option, and the most common one, is Optional Practical Training (OPT), which, according to the USCIS’s website, is a 12-month work authorization program for F-1 visa students to work in the United States in their field of study after graduation.

Important things to have in mind when considering doing an OPT are that a student cannot have completed 12 full months of F-1 Curricular Practical Training (CPT), the student must be a senior to apply, and that the best time to apply is around 90-120 days before graduation, since it takes a long period for it to be approved. Also, different from CPT, the OPT is not curricular based; therefore, to apply for it, students do not need an internship credit or an official job offer.

It is also important to understand its costs. The primary fee is \$410, which is paid to USCIS for the I-765 application, and, since February 15, 2026, Saint Leo University is charging students a \$300 Annual Maintenance of Status Fee, totaling the amount of \$710.

Paige Ramsey, the executive director for the Center of Global

Engagement at Saint Leo, stated, “I think that students on the F1 visa should be aware of all options available to them and consider those possibilities when they are making decisions about their future career or educational path.”

“The regulations as they stand now allow one year of OPT following each degree level (you can only claim the OPT after that degree level, and if not applied for, you cannot go back later to claim it). If you choose to go on for the master’s degree, you can apply for a year of OPT following that degree, but you can’t go back to recoup the one year following your bachelor’s degree even if you didn’t apply for it,” said Ramsey.

Another option international students should consider after completing their undergraduate program is applying for a graduate program, such as a master’s or even a doctoral degree. If that is your preferred choice, it is important to start preparing for it in your junior year since graduate applications should be complete and ready to be submitted by the end of a student’s senior fall to secure good scholarships or GA positions.

The reality is that most institutions start distributing scholarships and conducting GA applications at the beginning of the Spring Semester, so it is always good to be prepared if you want to have as much financial aid as possible.

Beyond that, it is important to remember that to transfer to a new program, an international student must provide proof of financial capacity for at least a full year of studies, which can be provided as a combination of scholarships and financial support from parents or guardians, for instance.

“The student really needs to look at their future goals and see what makes the most sense to them. Does the practical training help in moving up in that position, or is a higher degree required for that? I recommend working with the Career Services office as well to see more information about what the future employers are looking for and if they have recommendations

about moving to the next degree or going straight into the work world,” added Ramsey.

It is also crucial to remember that the F1-status is a non-immigrant intent type of visa. However, there are ways of legally securing a longer stay in the United States, or even a permanent residence, the green card status, through an employment sponsorship.

When talking about employment immigration opportunities, many students think about the H-1B visa. According to the USCIS, the H-1B visa is an employer-sponsored type of visa that allows an immigrant to stay in the United States for up to three or six years, as part of an employment opportunity.

To qualify, a candidate must have a bachelor’s degree and must be applying for a position that requires a bachelor’s degree or higher as a minimum entry requirement. An international student cannot petition this type of visa by themselves; the U.S. employer must file the petition for a non-immigrant worker with the USCIS, since this is also a non-immigrant intent type of visa. However, according to the University of Maryland, an H-1B can lead to a green card when combined with an EB-1, EB-2, or EB-3 visa.

The H-1B is a great visa because it allows an international individual to keep their legal status in the United States while being able to work full-time, without having to be under a CPT or OPT, since it is a whole new visa, unlike the F1.

Nevertheless, the disadvantage of this visa is that it is a lottery system type of visa with only 85,000 visas available. Meaning that, according to this annual Cap Registration analysis provided by the USCIS, only one quarter of applicants get it, since more than 300,000 people apply most years. Moreover, the lottery only opens once per year, between March 4th and 19th.

Therefore, it is always good to have in mind a more reliable solution, which is the E-B3 visa,

which, according to the USCIS, is also an employment-based visa that allows immigrant unskilled and skilled workers to obtain permanent U.S. residency. Similar to the H-1B, it also requires a permanent full-time job offer from a U.S. employer, who will be the petitioner in favor of the immigrant with the USCIS.

This is a highly regulated type of visa since it has immigration intent, meaning that you are directly applying for permanent residency. However, it is not lottery based; any student who finds an employer who meets employment requirements with the Department of Labor can apply. Additionally, it is a longer process that can take up to 4 years, in which applicants must keep their legal status in the United States.

The fact is that living abroad has the power to change someone’s heart profoundly.

One who leaves their homeland to explore a new one for such a long time, such as the undergraduate period, is changed into a citizen of the world, with two places to call “home.”

This makes it harder to say goodbye when the time comes. This is why international students need to know what they can do to legally stay in the United States. after graduation.

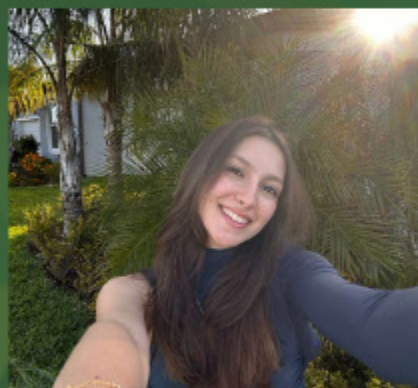

AI in the workforce: Is it positive or negative?

For years many have wondered whether robots and automation will end up affecting job displacement and resulting in less jobs for humans. With the advancement and increasing prevalence of artificial intelligence, however, this question is more relevant than ever before.

AI software like Copilot and Claude has been changing how the workplace functions. Some are excited about what this new technological integration brings, while others are concerned about the effect AI will have on the job market.

Abhinav Kamtam, who earned his master's degree in computer science at Saint Leo and is now the senior coordinator of Saint Leo's Student Accessibility and Career Services, sees how AI is changing the workforce for both better and worse.

Kamtam highlighted how automatic performance of tasks helps teams in the workplace to

move forward and focus on the most important concerns and believes it will continue doing this in the next five years.

"You can say that it's [AI] improving workplace efficiency by automating a lot of routine tasks, data entry, or basic analysis scheduling," Kamtam said.

Users can increase workplace productivity with AI. Kamtam also emphasized how the simplicity of using AI software maximizes efficiency.

"It could be as simple as using Copilot for your emails," Kamtam stated.

Regarding the harm of AI being implemented in the workforce, Kamtam discussed how prioritizing AI in jobs contributes to job displacement, like how automated customer support services minimize human staff.

Kamtam also shared a recent concern about how AI is beginning to track work activity in some workplaces. This causes uncertainty regarding workers' rights to privacy and stress due to a

sense of digital micromanagement.

"To certain people, it might feel like you're being micromanaged by a computer, which would bother me," Kamtam added.

Despite these concerns, however, Kamtam is against the stigma that using AI tools is bad, especially in the workforce.

"It needs to go because everyone's using AI. And why should we not be utilizing the sources we have?" Kamtam asked.

Kamtam added that whether use of AI in the workplace is appropriate comes down to whether it is ethical. As a computer science degree holder, Kamtam addressed the concern computer science majors have regarding AI job displacement in their field.

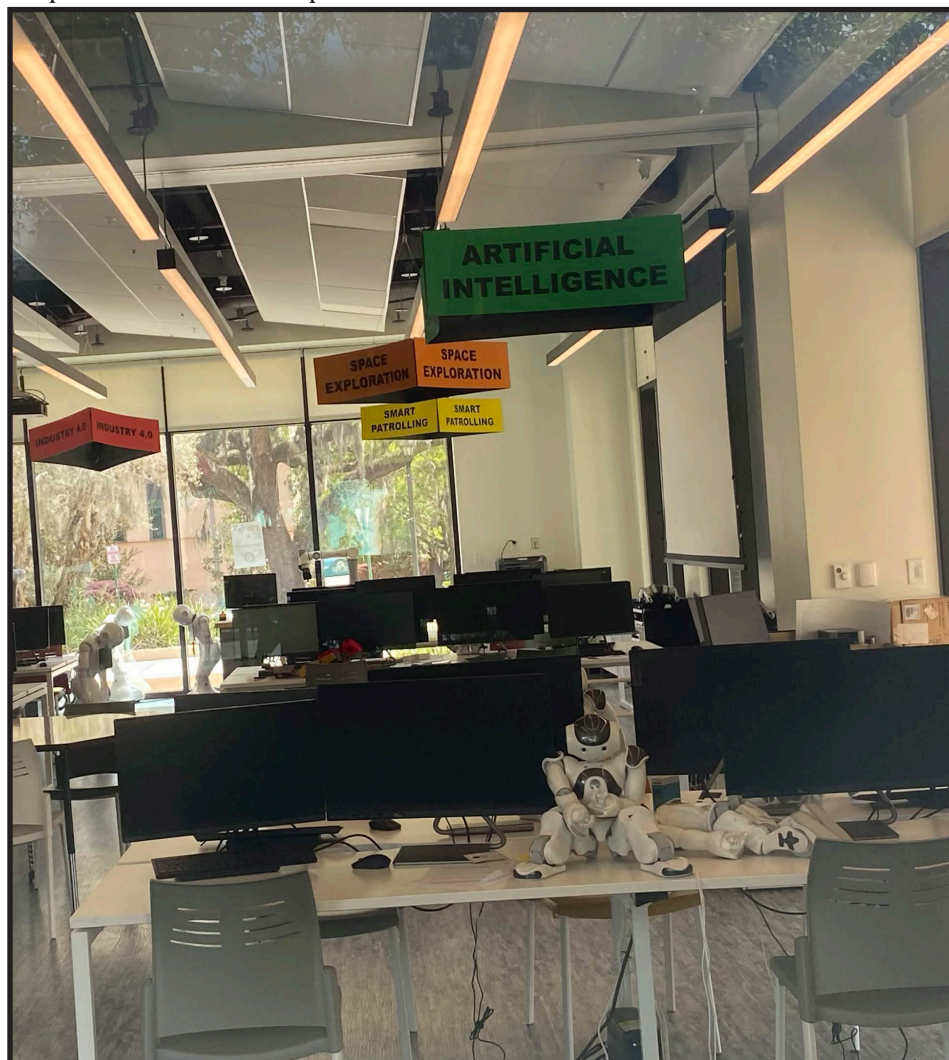
"Is [AI] going to be heavily used? Yes, but at the same time, as

a computer science student, your job would more so be maintaining or fine tuning those programs," Kamtam said.

"Or if there are new processes, integrating those new processes into the program," Kamtam added.

So, will AI take future jobs? AI may likely not have a great impact on the labor market, but it does affect the need for some roles. Kamtam also mentioned that new positions have risen as a result, including AI specialists, data analysts, and related jobs.

It seems promising that AI will simplify workloads by taking care of smaller tasks. Currently, companies are using AI as a tool to increase productivity, and as technology advances, demand for certain positions shifts rather than disappears.

As the 2025 season comes to a close, Saint Leo University's Men's Soccer Captain Anel Crnac has completed his final chapter with the Lions, notably leading his team to the Division II Sunshine State Conference Playoffs for the first time in a number of years. The center back has just wrapped up his fourth year on the team, having developed from a young, but promising, international arrival to a trusted leader on a highly diverse team.

For Crnac, the decision to move halfway across the globe to Saint Leo University was easy. He was drawn initially by the warm weather and palm trees of Florida, a drastic change from his icy homeland, Olafsvik, Iceland. That decision was solidified after a virtual conversation with Head Coach Brett Parker and a risky promise made.

"I told him I could only do this for one year, pay to go to college for one year... He said that that's not a problem and if I would perform that he would increase my scholarship," said Crnac. "That's exactly what he did, he stuck to his word."

A defining feature of Saint Leo Soccer, according to Crnac, is the presence of so many internationals alongside American players. This diversity is what makes the program special, as it allows players to get to know different cultures and work in unison on a scale that is rare and distinct. This year alone, the team includes players representing approximately 13 different nationalities, and meeting players from these varied backgrounds has helped shape Crnac on a personal level.

His growth extended into his leadership role as captain. Crnac admits that learning how to be a captain and balancing the necessary responsibilities takes time. He notes that the role involves many upsides, such as gaining recognition, but there is essential work that must be done behind the scenes. He emphasizes that he has learned a lot in his leadership journey and is still

continuing to learn every day.

Reflecting on his journey, Crnac provides key advice to younger players:

"Don't get too comfortable."

He recalls coming in as a freshman feeling really cocky and very arrogant because the collegiate level initially felt easy. He also notes that "down spells" are a real and humbling thing, and he has experienced them firsthand. Learning from that experience, he now hopes his successors heed his advice.

Among his four years of memories, one moment stands out for Crnac: the scoring of his first collegiate goal. This unforgettable memory occurred during his freshman year, he believes, to have been against Rollins, where the then-freshman scored a header off a corner kick crossed in by teammate Alexander Mollinedo. The memory is a sweet one and will always hold a special place in the senior's heart.

Anel Crnac reflects on his four years at Saint Leo University by relating his experiences to the University's core values: excellence, community, respect, personal development, responsible stewardship, and integrity.

Although he feels that his journey is connected to every one of these principles, Crnac feels the most strongly connected to two specific values: community and respect.

He highlights this connection by mentioning how, no matter where he is walking on campus, he frequently encounters four or five people he knows. "You can't really demand respect without giving respect," said Crnac. A principal quickly applied.

He emphasizes the necessity

As a senior, Crnac's final games have come and gone, but he admits the reality of his time ending hasn't fully set in. Even after his final home game, the senior still holds on to the last few weeks of the spring semester and doesn't want to think about his college experience being complete just yet.

What he anticipates missing most about wearing the Saint Leo jersey is playing on the field with some of his best friends and experiencing the on-field brotherhood brought on by collegiate soccer.

Crnac feels supported by the university and the Athletic

Department, citing the dedication of staff like Frank Orlando, Faculty Athletic Representative and Instructor of Political Science, who Crnac is convinced knows every athlete by name. He is deeply appreciative of everything the Saint Leo Men's Soccer program has done for him, noting that it has taught him much that he will carry throughout his life.

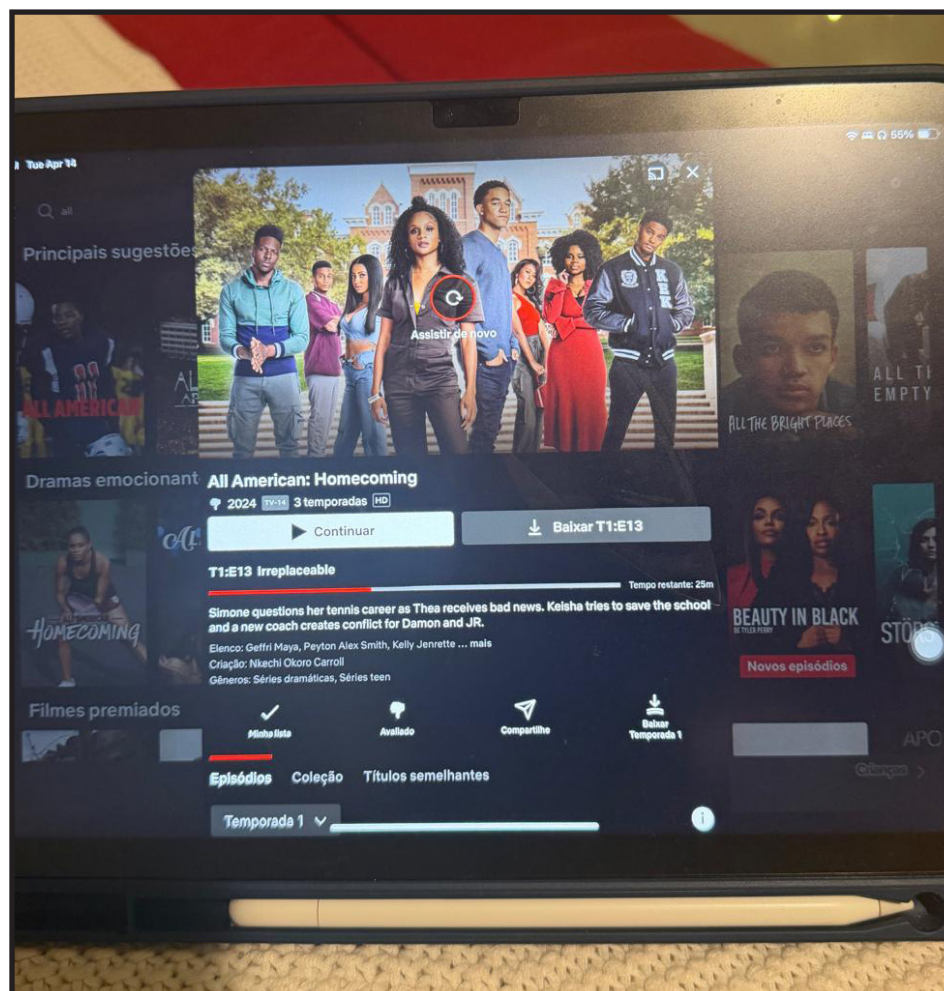
Moving from screens to headphones, there are also good
